MT POSITION OF JUSTICE

The Administration received this week from the Department of Justice a release stating the Justice Department's position at this time in connection with the rescinding by the Western Defense Command of the Army excludee and segregee orders. The statement as released by the Department of Justice follows:

Following the War Department announcement that the department and the Western Defense Command have terminated military controls of persons of Japanese ancestry previously excluded from the West Coast, Attorney General Tom Clark made known that approximately 6700 resident Japanese have been ordered interned by the Attorney General either at Justice Department camps or at the War Relocation Authority segregation center at Tule Lake.

"The action of the military authorities," Clark said, "will have no effect on the status of these persons."

Included in the group to which the Attorney General referred are approximately 5500 persons of Japanese parentage born in the United States who have renounced their American citizenship and are presumed to be nationals of Japan. The balance are foreign-born Japanese interned as alien enemies for the duration of the war.

"These persons," Clark said, "will be continued in internment pending final

RECORD NUMBER-315-MAKE PLANS

Tule Lake Center residents have set a record so far this month in initiating and completing plans for resettlement.

When the relocation offices closed for the night Wednesday, Sept. 12, the Relocation Division asnounced that 315 rersons had completed resettlement plans since Sept. 1 and either had left the center

review of their cases by the Attorney General and approval by the military authorities of the removal of hostile Japanese nationals to Japan."

In addition to the 6700 interned Japanese who are residents of the continental United States, there are in Department of Justice internment camps approximately 1000 Japanese nationals from Hawaii, Alaska and various Latin American countries and apvolunproximately 2000 tary internees. An additional 2500 Japanese aliens are on parole orders issued by the Attorney General and have their activities supervised by the Immigration Service.

NEW RELOCATION OFFICE AT 720

The Relocation Division announced this week the opening of a new Relocation Office to handle the resettlement planning of re-sidents of wards I, II, III, IV, and VII.

The new office is at 720, occupying the entire space of the former Block 7 special mess hall, conveniently located adjoining the firebreak between wards I and IV.

The Leave Office, Evacuee Property Office, and some other administrative functions will remain at Gate #1, but all planning and discussions with relocation advisors will be at 720 for residents of wards I, II, III, IV, and VII, and at 7801-A for residents of wards V, VI and VIII.

Appointments with the Leave Officer at Gate #1 for arrangement of transportation are being scheduled for resettlers as plans are completed at 720 and 7801-A.

S 3000 DAMAGE SUFFERED AT BLOCK 38 MESS HALL FIRE

The assignments were made with consideration for family groups and to allow the shortest walking distances for aged people and children.

The Administration began this week a survey to determine as soonas possible how many Hawaiian evacuees are in Tule Lake Center who are eligible to return and who wish to return to the islands, and the number of other people who desire to resettle in Hawaii and have valid reasons, such as family ties,

for doing so.

The Relocation Division has asked that Hawaiian evacuees and others who have contemplated Hawaiian resettlement cooperate by reporting their names and the names of family members, together with their reasons for desiring Hawaiian resettlement if they are not Hawaiian evacuees, to Pauline Bates Brown, who is in charge of the survey at

Special clothing grants for persons planning relocation are issued only in cases of real need and are meant to be an addition to insufficient clothing, according to John Neal, head Welfare counselor.

Those whose resettiement plans are definite and who feel they must have added clothing for the first two or three weeks should get a note from their relocation advisor at the time plans are made and should present it to their proper district Vel-

The Velfare Office in making grants will need to know accurately and truly what clothinga person possesses, where they are going, and what kind of a job they will have, Clothing grants are kept as low as possible and are meant to meet needs until the first pay check comes in.

In beginning the survey the Administration pointed out that residents who have renounced their citizenship and thus are on the Justice Dept. Stop List, are not eligible for return to or other resettlement in Hawaii, although members of their families may be listed, and Hawaiian parolees may be included.

The survey will be used in determination of priority of passage for persons desiring to go to Hawaii.

MORE HOUSING

6 NEW HOSTELS NOW OPERATING

Numerous new hostels and other facilities for service to resettlers recently have been placed in operation, the Administration has been informed, most extensive of which is the Milwaukee Resettlement Association's big "Hospitality House" at 1426 North Prospect Avenue, of which Mrs. Ujio Niwa, formerly of Los Angeles and Manzanar, has been chosen manager.

After Justus Olson, president of the Resettlement Association, announced that the Milwaukee hostel would be ready for occupancy Sept. 1, among the first to make a reservation was Hisashi Kumasaka of Tule

"Hospitality House" is a three-story graystone building containing more than 20 rooms and surrounded by a large yard, on a hill overlooking Lake Michigan and about five minutes! bus ride from downtown Milwaukee. It previously has been operated as a boarding house, has a dining room seating 30 persons at a time, and kitchen and other equipment to provide service for comparatively large groups.

Evacuees will have priority in occupancy of the hostel for the next 12 months, after which it is expected the Resettlement Association will maintain the building permanently as a shelter for dislocated people. Present rates are \$1 a day for unemployed and \$1.50 for employed adults, and half rates for children.

Members of the Metropolitan Church Federation of St. Louis have extended a welcome to resettlers at the new St. Louis Hostel, 2427 South 18th Street. Miss Sumiye Tashiro, who has an excellent knowledge of Japanese and who taught English to Issei while she was a resident of Poston, has been named director. The hostel accommodates 25 persons. Rates are the same as in the Milwaukee hostel.

THOSE ON SHORT-TERM LEAVE STILL BOWA BIOT RESIDENTS

Taking cognizance of erroneous reports which have been circulated in the colony, t. K. Holland, relocation program officer, stated today that short-term leave does not change the status of the person taking it when he or she returns to the center.

"Reports which someone has circulated in Tule Lake Center that persons who go out on short-term leave to

investigate resettlement possibilities or for any other purpose are required, upon their return to the center, to pay for board and lodging until they depart on terminal leave definitially are not true," Holland declared.

Persons on short-term leave remain bona fide residents of the center unless they convert to terminal leave while they are out, which they may if they choose in most cases. Persons who return to the center from shortterm leave enter not as visitors but as residents, and they retain all the privileges of residents until they depart on terminal leave. Persons who terminate of course then cease to be residents, and if they return later for visits, the rules applied to visitors then are applicable to them."
