

# SCHOOL POLICY

(cont'd from brige 1) ter schools unon certain practices and nolicies. It was decided that the board is to make arrangements for a new election at the close of terms of respective members. and shall supervise the election in any district to fill a vacancy. This board will have the privilege of determining the curriculum and to employ instructors; therefore, it will also be responsible for curriculum contents and for acts of its teachers.

Each instructor employed in schools shell have a certificate issued through the office of sumerintendent of center schools. Such certificate will be issued to the teacher upon the board's recommendation.

The board will assume responsibility to file in the office of the superintendent a list of the schools, giving their location and names of their instructors and principals. Information regarding number of munils enrolled in each school, their name, and attendance record of nunils 18-years of age or under shall be filed at the board office. The project director also stated that minutes of all meetings of the board shall be kent on file in its office and oven for inspection.


