SCHOOLS TO CLOSE FOR VACATION

Center schools will close for the spring vacation from April 1 to 9.

Also first report cards for the year will be issued tomorrow.

LEAVE HEARINGS RESUMED; TO COMPLETE SEGREGATION

As means of completing the War Relocation Authority segregation program, the holding of leave clearance hearings has been resumed at this center.

Any resident of the center to whom leave clearance has not previously been denied is eligible to receive a leave clearance hearing. The purpose of these hearings is to enable persons who are loyal to the United States, and who are at present in this center for reasons other than lack of loyalty to the United States, to establish the true facts. Hearings will be based upon each applicant's complete record.

Any person who did not fill out Form WRA 126 or DSS 304-A at the time of the Army registration early in 1943 should now fill out Form WRA 126 in order to receive a leave clearance hearing. If this form has already been filled out a letter written now to the Project Director asking for a leave clearance hearing will enable

Best Announces Ruling On Family Employment

Since there are entire families that have not been employed for several months and with job opportunities still somewhat limited, it

has been deemed necessary to reduce the number working in any one family to not more than two persons, according to a statement issued today by Project Director Raymond R. Best.

The statement reports, "We hope that by having not more than two in any family assigned to work, we will have terminations which will materially assist in the re-employment of evacuees in other families." (cont'd on page 2)

JAPANESE SCHOOL POLICY RELEASED BY DIRECTOR

Administration policy concerning operation of Japanese Language Schools within the center was released today by Ray R. Best, Project Director. He stated that the administration manual and center policy provide that schools may be operated by evacuees if they so desire. This authorization is subject to two restrictions. Expense of operating and maintaining of schools will be entirely the responsibility of evacuees and these classes may not be held in conflict with classes of the center schools.

The policy for the operation of this center provides that attendance shall not be compulsory either

in center schools or in Japanese schools. Attendance in Japanese schools will not be compulsory, and under no circumstances will pupils be enrolled for more than a three-hour period in any one day. Parents desiring to have their children attend the center school or the Japanese school for a full day may present in person a written request to the superintendent of center schools, who will grant the permit.

The director declared that Japanese Language School Board of Education, comprised of two members from each ward, has reached an agreement with the superintendent of the cen-

"Members of the Placement office staff will call on the families where there are more than two employed and request them to terminate voluntarily, leaving not more than two employed members of the family group.

"Under the present regulations, any members of the family may be designated as head of the family and all members of the family, regardless of age, will receive clothing allowances."

the recommendations of the Hearing Board and of the Project Director, with complete transcripts of the hearing and other relevant information, will be forwarded to the Director of the War Relocation Authority in Washington for final action. If leave clearance is granted by the Director, the applicant will be transferred to a relocation center from which he may go out on indefinite leave after completion of the usual arrangements.

Persons who had already received leave clearance before the segregation center was established, and who moved to or remained at the segregation center for family reasons or other special reasons (except those who remained at Tule Lake solely because of illness or infirmity) but later decide that they wish to leave the Tule Lake center, must apply for a new leave clearance

CROWD LIMIT IMPOSE HEAVY PENALTIES ON DETERMINED UNOFFICIAL USE OF VEHICLES

Number of persons permitted at any meeting in the high school auditorium has been determined at 1200 persons as more people would constitute a hazard in case of fire, stated William Hoffman, chief fire protection officer.

He said in the future the number attending a meeting will be limited. Colonial police and fire warden will check the size of the crowd at all future meetings.

POSTAL RATES REVISED SINCE SATURDAY

New postal rates have been in effect throughout the United States since last Saturday.

Local letters now require a three cent stamp; air mail, eight cent stamp.

Post card and regular mail rates remain at one and three cents respectively. New rates have also been announced for money order, insured, C.O.D. and registered mail.

Heavy penalties for unofficial use of government automobiles were written into the Independent Offices Supply Bill by the Senate Appropriations Committee.

Any officer using or authorizing use of government car, except for official business will be subject to removal from office, and upon conviction, be subject to a fine of not more than \$1,000

or imprisonment not to exceed one year. The amendment requires that every government vehicle have painted on both sides in white letters, "On Official Business".

ter schools upon certain practices and policies. It was decided that the board is to make arrangements for a new election at the close of terms of respective members, and shall supervise the election in any district to fill a vacancy. This board will have the privilege of determining the curriculum and to employ instructors; therefore, it will also be responsible for curriculum contents and for acts of its teachers.

Each instructor employed in schools shall have a certificate issued through the office of superintendent of center schools. Such certificate will be issued to the teacher upon the board's recommendation.

The board will assume responsibility to file in the office of the superintendent a list of the schools, giving their location and names of their instructors and principals. Information regarding number of pupils enrolled in each school, their name, and attendance record of pupils 18-years of age or under shall be filed at the board office. The project director also stated that minutes of all meetings of the board shall be kept on file in its office and open for inspection.
