RICKETTS

URGES LESS USE OF ELECTRICITY

Unless less electricity is used, many blocks will soon feel the loss of electric power because of damaged transformers, Homer Ricketts, senior engineer, warned today.

Noting that 43 block transformers had to be refused during the past two weeks, Ricketts pointed out that transformers are being overloaded. No doubt, said he, residents are using electrical appliances without considering the overload on transformers. If this condition continues, many blocks can expect failure of electric current with no immediate prospect of damaged transformers being replaced.

The senior engineer added that beginning today, no transformers except those in the hospital, administrative, warehouse, and farm areas will be refused at night. Others will be taken care of the following morning since replacement of blown-out fuses will damage transformers, which would be hot because of overloading.

DIFFICULTIES IN TRANSPORTATION ARE BEING SOLVED

Transportation difficulties which have been delaying resettlement departures from Tule Lake Center are being solved as rapidly as possible with the cooperation of railroad officials, Administration spokesmen said today, and people who have missed scheduled departure dates or who have not yet been scheduled because of the temporary transportation tie-up need only be patient.

There is no stoppage of relocation from Tule Lake, the Administration declared--only delays caused by circumstances beyond immediate control.

Several factors have entered into the transportation problem, it was ex-

plained, the first being a strike of drivers of the Western Greyhound Bus Lines which threw a great deal of extra traffic onto the Western railroads. Then the railroads were required to furnish more than 80 cars for transfer of the personnel of two western military camps, and thirdly

over the following blocks: Ward I-- Block 4, Ward II -- Block 29, Ward III -- Block 19, Ward IV -- Block 36, Ward V -- Block 43, Ward VI -- Block 51, Ward VII -- Block 67, Ward VIII -- Block 75.

Blocks were judged for general cleanliness, for removal of grass and weeds from around buildings, and general cleanliness and appearance of kitchens.

Judges were Clifford Parker, chairman; Michael Primm, and William Lauritzen.

GRANADA RELOCATION CENTER CLOSING OCT. 15

Granada, at Amache, Colo., went out of business on schedule Monday, Oct. 15, the first WRA center to close under WRA's liquidation plan.

The last group of 126 departed in two special all-evacuee railway coaches, the majority going to Sacramento. Many had expressed a desire to return earlier, but had waited for housing to become available.

No evacuee left Granada under the closing schedule of departures without temporary or permanent housing having been provided at the destination, announced James Lindley, project director.

Departures from Granada

were without incident or disorder at any time. Since the lifting of the West Coast blanket exclusion order by the Western Defense Command the first of this year 5644 Granada residents had relocated. When scheduled departures began Sept. 1, to bring about clearing of the center by the Oct. 15 deadline, Granada had a population of 3105.

A total of nearly 10,500 evacuees had been inducted into the Granada center since Aug., 1942, when the first group arrived from the Merced Assembly Center, with later arrivals from both Merced and Santa Anita, after which Granada's

population was swelled by transfers from Tule Lake and Jerome. Births there totaled 412 and deaths 107.

Agricultural land on the Amache project was declared surplus on Oct. 1 and the Surplus Property Board assigned 9583 acres to the Farm Credit Administration for disposal. Public notice has been issued that the land is for sale, in accordance with the Surplus Property Act of 1944, which requires that government owned land must be put up for public sale within 60 days after being declared surplus.

The next centers scheduled to close are Topaz and Linidoka on Nov. 1.

MAY PUT IN CLAIMS FOR CONTRABAND FOUND TO BE LOST

Aid looking toward reimbursement is available, G. F. Castleberry, head of the WRA Evacuee Property Section in Washington, and Louis Noyes, project attorney, announced this week, to persons who hold valid receipts for property surrendered to duly authorized officials at the time of evacuation and which since has been determined to be missing.

Castleberry, who has been on the project for conferences with Sheldon Lowery, Evacuee Property officer, brought from Washington information that means are being devised to bring about such reimbursement, and Noyes said assistance is available through the Project Attorney's Office in the presenting of claims for surrendered contraband property which is determined to have been lost.

OPA CHANGES CONTROLS ON RENTAL PROPERTIES

Louis Noyes, project attorney, was informed this week by Edwin Ferguson, WRA solicitor in Washington, of changes of Office of Price Administration controls on rental properties in sections of California, which may be of importance to evacuees planning to return to those areas.

Effective Oct. 1, the OPA has extended rent control to apply to property located in Bloomfield, Bridgeport, Grass Valley, Nevada, and Rough and Ready

townships of Nevada County, and in townships 1, 3, 9, 10, 13, and 14 of Placer County. This means, said Ferguson, that evacuees seeking repossession of property in these localities will need to comply with OPA regulations in serving notices of eviction.

On the other hand, also effective Oct. 1, the OPA lifted rent control from that portion of Riverside County lying west of Range 12 East, San Bernardino Base Line and Meridian, and compliance with OPA regulations in serving notices to regain possession of property in that area no longer is required.

Evacuees who have property in the areas in which the OPA control has just been extended and who seek repossession of it, should visit the Project Attorney's Office for advice in complying with the OPA regulations, said Noyes, the same as persons whose property is in any other section in which the rent controls apply. Noyes is prepared also to aid persons who are in doubt in determining whether their property is located in rent control areas.

TULARE COUNTY TO EXTEND RELIEF AID TO EVACUEES

TULARE--Tulare County Welfare Director T. Pyott this week prepared to extend relief to needy persons of Japanese ancestry on the same basis as any other residents of the county, following expressions of policy from three members of the Board of Supervisors on Oct. 2.

The matter was brought before the board by Pyott who asked for a declaration of policy on granting subsistence and admitting

people of Japanese ancestry to the old people's home or other county institutions.

Supervisor Roy Brogan, Tulare, declared that on the basis of a legal opinion from Assistant District Attorney Leroy McCormick, the board has the legal responsibility of granting aid to any needy persons regardless of race or nationality.

Chairman R. B. Oliver of the board and Charles Young, Porterville, concurred in the view that Pyott should proceed with granting aid in urgent cases and along the lines suggested. Pyott told the board that he would accept that as the majority attitude of the board.

Supervisor Jay Brown, who has opposed county assistance for persons of Japanese ancestry, renewed his opposition at the meeting.

Three WRA representatives attended the meeting. They declared that several

aged bachelors, without relatives in the country, are in direct need which is growing more urgent by the hour.

When it was pointed out that temporary hostels have been set up to assist in the relocation of the evacuees at the Buddhist Church in Visalia and the Japanese Methodist Church at Dinuba, Oliver suggested asking these groups to cooperate by taking care of the destitute with financial aid from the county. Pyott indicated the plan will be carried out.

Clifford Nakadegawa, ordained minister of Presbyterian Church, is in Tule Lake Center as a temporary resident representing the Japanese American Student Relocation Council, headquarters of which is in Philadelphia. In addition to his consultations on student relocation, Nakadegawa is conducting services at the Union Church in the absence of the Rev. Thomas Grubbs, who at present is doing hostel work in Salinas.

Nakadegawa is maintaining office hours in the Counselor's Office at the high school from 2 to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday of each week, and is available for consultation with students or their parents at other times at his residence, 813-A.

Nakadegawa has the distinction of having been ordained on the basis of his theological studies in Japan, where he attended the Chuo Theological School at Kobe, a Presbyterian Seminary, from 1938 to 1941, when he returned to the United States to be evacuated from Los Angeles to Poston a month after his arrival. From Poston he transferred to Gila, and then relocated to finish his American college work

GEN. STILWELL BACKS UP JAPANESE AMERICAN GI'S

SONO OSATO SIGNED FOR STRAIGHT PART

Terming those who molest Japanese American soldiers "barfly commandos," General Joseph Stilwell has advocated a "pickax club" to protect Nisei soldiers. General Stilwell's state-

ment was carried in a United Press story from New Delhi and published in the San Francisco Chronicle of Oct. 11 as follows:

NEW DELHI, Oct. 10--(UP) --General Joseph Stilwell, commander of the United States 10th Army, advocated the strongest possible measures today against any "barfly commandos" who molest Japanese American soldiers.

The Nisei "bought an awful big hunk of America with their blood," Stilwell said in an interview on Okinawa with Sergeant Fred Friendly. It appeared in today's issue of the Roundup, the soldiers' newspaper in the Burma-India theater.

"You're damn right those Nisei boys have a place in the American heart, now and forever," General Stilwell said, "and I say we soldiers ought to form a pickax club to protect Japanese Americans who fought the war with us."

YALE INSTRUCTOR JOINS WRA IN N.Y.

The WRA in New York has announced that Stanley Okada, newest relocation officer in the New York district, has come to WRA on a leave of absence from Yale University at New Haven, Conn., where he has been an instructor for two years.

Okada's permanent home is in New York City, where he is a community leader, being a director of the Buddhist Church and a member of the Resettlement Council of the Japanese American Organizations of New York City. He arrived in New York from Hawaii in 1938 and took his master's degree in international trade at Columbia University. During the past three years he has spent much time and energy in helping resettlers in New York.

"I feel that this is a city of great opportunity for ambitious young Nisei," said Okada when he joined the WRA staff, "since many professional and business fields are open to them. For the older Issei who seek a quiet life, New York's beautiful suburbs offer many advantages."

Sono Osato, famed Japanese American dancer and co-star of the Broadway musical hit "On the Town," will be seen on the American stage in a straight part this winter, says the New York Times.

She has been signed, the Times reports, for the title role of "Undine," a play by Jean Giradoux which is described as "an adult play about love" and as a "political satire" in which the leading character, a spirit, is Democracy. The actress' husband, Victor Elmaleh, will be co-producer of the play, in which a Hollywood performer is expected to appear opposite her.

A distinguished New Yorker, Dan Dodson, executive director of the Mayor's Committee on Unity of New York City, recently came forward with advice and encouragement to Japanese Americans in an address he delivered at a dinner in New York City under the auspices of the Japanese American Citizens League, honoring Staff Sergeant Henry Gosho, hero of Merrill's Marauders.

Sergeant Gosho now is living, with his family, at 620 West 115th Street, New York City, having received a medical discharge from the Army. A native of Seattle, Sergeant Gosho was a student in Japan for seven years before the war. He returned to the United States in 1941 on the advice of the American Consul at Kobe, and was a resident of the Minidoka Relocation Center at Hunt, Idaho, when he volunteered for service in the United States Army. His wife lived at Minidoka during his service overseas, and his daughter, Carol Jeanne, was born there.

The Toyokwan Restaurant was jammed with Japanese Americans and Caucasians there to honor "Horizontal Hank" Gosho, whose valor won him the Bronze Star, the Combat Infantryman's Badge, a Presidential Citation Unit Badge, and the Pacific Ribbon with three combat stars, when Dr. Dodson delivered his address, with Takeo Nogaki, also of Seattle and Minidoka, acting as toastmaster.

Dr. Dodson saw it as a wauchi and their three daughters, Jean, Barbara, and Joyce, formerly of Sacramento and Amache, left the hostel this week to take up residence at 410 13th Avenue S.E. Mrs. Ka-wauchi is enrolled in the A.S.T.P. School.

"America today is not proud of the treatment she has given her citizens of Japanese ancestry. It will remain as a blot on the character of our great nation. We are, however, proud of our heroes such as Sergeant Gosho or any others regardless of their ancestry. I do not hesitate to predict that America, in one way or another, will make it up to those war exiles and I am sure that in your new-found homes all over this country, Americans will demonstrate completely different attitudes to those they might have demonstrated had these evil days not overtaken you."

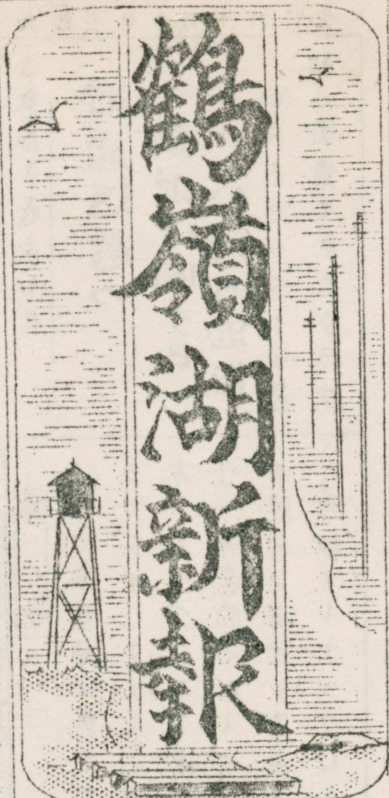
