#### REPATRIATE MEWS SOON FEPECTED

Ivan Villiams, officer in charge of the Immigration and Naturalization Service detail here, announced today he has been informed by his headquarters office in Philadelphia questions regarding property and funds of persons to be relatriated, and also regarding arrangements for persons who may be ill or otherwise incapacitated, now are under consideration, and the information is expected to be forwarded to Tule Lake shortly. As soon as such information is received, Williams said, he will make it available to affected people here.

#### OCT. RELOCATION HIGHEST CTA

A record number of Tuleans relocated during October despite transportation difficulties brought about by a strike of Pacific Greyhound Lines drivers and unusually heavy requirements for movements of Army and Navy personnel. More Tule residents departed for resettlement in October than had relocated during all of the previous nine months of the year.

When the last bus pulled out the afternoon of Wednesday, Oct. 31, terminal departures for the month tot led 1219, and the total number of relocations since Jan. 1 was brought to 2057.

Indications are, said W. K. Holland, relocation program officer, that many more than the record October total of resettlers will depart for relocation in November, and transportation arrangements are being made to take care of them.

The General Assembly of Tule Lake Cooperative Enterprises, Inc., has adopt-ed a resolution to close the Co-op canteens and services at the end of the business day of Nov. 30, it was announced today by Lionel Perkins, Business Enterprises supervisor.

Cashing of personal checks will cease after next Monday, Nov. 5, the assembly decided, but cashing of government checks will be continued through Nov. 30. Since yesterday, all check cashing is being done at one station, 717.

Patronage rebates for the quarter ended Mar. 31 will be paid beginning next Monday at the rate of six blocks a day, with payments in cash instead of the usual cash orders.

## ESTABLISH HOUSING PROJECT FOR 500 NEAR SACRAMENTO

A new Federal Fublic Housing Authority project established at Camp Kohler, 12 miles northeast of Sacramen-to, with a capacity of 500 persons, now is ready for occupancy, the Administration has been informed.

Harold Choate, relocation officer of the Sacramento

district, has advised that rates are \$2.50 per week for single persons, \$15 per month for family of two, \$17.50 for family of three, \$19 for family of four, and \$20 for family of five when all individ. uals are members of natural family group, with individuals not members of a natural family group being charged \$2.50 extra if they are not wage earners and the regular single rate if they are wage earners. Children under three years of age are not charged rental, and the rates do not include meal costs.

A community mess hall is operated on a cooperative, non-profit basis, and Choate advises that resettlers should take only necessary personal effects with them, since bedding, cooking and eating facilities are provided.

Families assigned to the project should have certificates of assignment from the Project Director and the Sacramento office must be notified in advance.

# THERE TO REPORT TO A.S. STATED

In order to avoid interference with processing of persons departing on terminal and short-term leaves, it is necessary for evacuees going to Klamath Falls on shopping lasses in the cars of appointed personnel, to report at Internal Security Head-quarters not earlier than 10 a.m. and not later than 2:30 p.m.

Internal Security's time is required before 10 a.m. and after 2:30 p.m. processing of persons leav-0. C. & M. ing on the O. C. & M. busses for Reno in the forenoon and Klamath Falls in the afternoon, and in certifying the passes of passengers on the spepassengers cial shopping bus in the morning.

Shoppers who intend to take the special bus, both Internal Security and the Relocation Division reiterated, must pick up their passes at 8 a.m. at the 720 Relocation Office, and proceed immediately to Internal Security Headquerters, so the processing of the shopping passes can be completed by 8:30.

#### WARNING VOICEDON MISUSE OF PASSES

Warning that WRA credentials must be used only by those persons to whom they specifically are issued was voiced by the Administration this week after two young mon, found guilty at a project hearing of attempted misuse of a 24-hour shopping pass, in violation of War Relocation Authority Regulations and Tule Lake Project Regulations, had been sentenced to serve 60 days in jail each.

It was testified at the hearing that one, a citizen, had been issued a 24-hour credential, to which he was entitled, for the stated purpose of shopping in Klamath Falls, and that the other, a renunciant not entitled any such credential issued by W.A., was seeking to use it when apprelended.

### CALIF. PEACE OFFICERS FIEAR ASSISTANT DIRECTOR SPEAK

"The First Yank in Tokyo" didn't need any plastic surgery as depicted in the film story currently on movie screens of the nation, R. B. Gozzens, assistant director of WRA told the 25th annual California Peace Officer's convention at Salinas recently.

Speaking to more 200 police chiefs, sheriffs, constables and district attorneys, Cozzens said:

"The first Yank in Tokyo didn't need any plastic surgery -- he and many of his kind had Japanese faces with American hearts and minds, with American courage and deep devotion to our flag and our institutions."

California peace officers must take over those phases of the relocation job WRA is not empowered to handle -- the task of protecting the fundamental rights of returnees as cilaw abiding the task of tizens and aliens and safeguarding their persons and properties from the attacks of race baiters, hoodlums and vandals, Cozzens said.

"We now face the post war problems when tensions will be strained further personal crises of some of the new groups in the state. These problems will come under the headings of race and color and in some cases, even creed. Those of us who recognize the constitutional demands for



political and economic equality of all men must also recognize that there are elements among us who adhere to a long-rejected doctrine that this is a white man's country. Our two-front was fought to defeat the conflicting theories that this was a white man's world on the one hand or that it was a Japanese world on the other. Both theories having been blasted out of existence, it is assumed that we are now in a world that makes no color distiction," he concluded.
Lt. Col. Wallace .. Mo-

ore, who as an Army intelligence officer with Gen. Eichelberger in the Pacific came to know the Nisei well, confirmed Gozzens' statement and appealed to the officers to see that the 20,000 Nisei veterans and their families received fair play. Col. Moore, who formerly taught at the University of California, told stories of the contributions of the Nisei in uniform in the Pacific to the War efforts and stated that they saved thousands of Caucasian American lives through the interpretation and translation work as well as in many other ways.

# 935 ENROLL AT TRE-STATE MIGH


