Opening a Wound Of World War II

THE National Museum of American History in Washington "touched a nerve" — in its words — when it dis-

closed plans for an exhibition on the internment of Japanese-Americans in the West during World War II.

Two hundred letters flooded in, many irate. Opponents felt the exhibition would be inflammatory and divisive. But many others said that the internment was an injustice and that it was time to acknowledge that publicly.

Museum officials said last May that they were bracing for a further barrage of letters, as well as thousands of Japanese-American visitors, when the show opened Oct. 1. ←

About 4,000 visitors of Japanese ancestry did show up in the first week

and a half, says the chairman of the museum's department of social and cultural history, Tom Crouch. But only a total of a half-dozen letters of mixed opinions have arrived, he adds.

Former internees of the war camp who viewed the exhibition have made helpful comments, Mr. Crouch reports, and the museum is fine-tuning the show.

"There was a general feeling that the barracks room was too clean," he says. Crews are adding holes in the walls, dust and other touches — "making it a little more lived in."

The exhibition will remain at least five years, Mr. Crouch says.
