Dear Mrs. Domoto and Miss Fujii:

We have received information which indicates that there may be some confusion about the new amendments to the Japanese Evacuation Claims Act which permit a settlement or compromise of a claim in an amount not larger than \$2500.00 and not exceeding 75% of the claim as filed. This confusion arises from the fact that there is a belief that a claimant might compromise certain items of his claim and then proceed to a hearing on the balance of the claim.

We do not believe that this can be done.

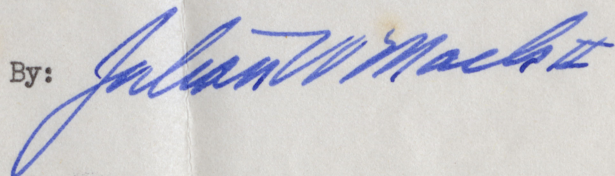
It is our opinion that if you file a request for a compromise, it is a request to compromise your entire claim and any settlement made on that request will be a final determination of all your rights as an individual, as a partner in a business, and as a stockholder in a corporation.

We therefore caution you that under no circumstances should any request for compromise of your claim be filed without first discussing the matter fully with us.

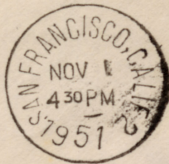
