## REGISTRATION AND VOTING BY ABSENT ELECTORS.

### Registering

Section 132 of the Elections Code of California provides for the registration of an elector who is away from home. The section authorizes forwarding of necessary forms to the elector, their completion and the taking of an oath before an authorized person and return of the forms to the registering officer.

A person so registering is to remember that the affidavit of registration must show the place of his residence with particularity sufficient to identify it and to determine his voting precinct. This refers to a present residence from which one is temporarily absent - not a former residence which has been abandoned. Even though but temporarily absent one is not eligible for registration in a county unless he can definitely fix his present place of residence therein.

An absent Alameda County elector who can meet the requirements as to residence should write to G. E. Wade, County Clerk, Court House, Oakland, California, for the necessary blank affidavit of registration. He should complete the forms and then have his affidavit taken:-

- (1) If in the United States by a judge or clerk of any court of record, or by a notary public,
- (2) If in a foreign country by any minister, consul, or vice-consul of the United States

and then return the affidavit to the County Clerk.

### Voting

A properly registered resident of Alameda County who is away from home and desires to vote at an election conducted by county officials is required to make a written application for his ballot to the County Clerk. His application is to be received by the County Clerk not more than forty days (maybe for this year only) and not less than five days before the day of the election at which he wishes to vote. No particular form of application is demanded, but it must be signed by the applicant, show his place of residence, and make clear to the Clerk the applicant's right to a ballot. Detailed information covering the method of voting will be forwarded with the ballot.

During 1944 the following state wide elections will be held in California. They are -

#### Consolidated Presidential Primary and Direct Primary Election May 16, 1944

Registration closes April 6, 1944  
Application for absent voters ballots received  
between April 6, and May 11, 1944.

#### General Election November 7, 1944

Registration closes September 28, 1944  
Application for absent voters ballots received  
between September 8, and November 2, 1944.
