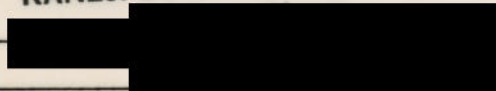

For Pa. Supreme Court: William M. Marutani

Seven candidates' names will appear on both the Democratic and Republican Party primary ballots for a single seat on the Pennsylvania Supreme Court that will be filled in the November election. It is likely that the seat will be the last filled for many years. As the highest court of appellate review in the state and because it also is responsible for administration of the state's entire judicial system, the court, and every seat on it, is vitally important. Since all candidates have filed on both tickets, it is possible that one could win both nominations in the May 17 primary — and thus the seat.

The Inquirer endorses William M. Marutani for both nominations.

Serving on the Philadelphia Court of Common Pleas since 1975, Judge Marutani, at 60, has demonstrated that he is a vigorous, scholarly and fair-minded trial judge. His written opinions reflect unusual degrees of intelligent precision and courage.

In a career since his graduation

from the University of Chicago Law School in 1953, he has had a wealth of impressive experience at every level of practice, including matters involving the United States Supreme Court. As a member of national and local government commissions, civic associations and professional boards and councils, he has established an impressive record as an extraordinarily active and constructive citizen, unafraid of complex challenges or controversy.

Among the six other candidates, several have acceptable qualifications. On the vitally important questions of independence from political involvements and from special interests and judicial demeanor — the substance and appearance of judicial integrity — Judge Marutani stands out above all others.

The Inquirer strongly urges both Democrats and Republicans to cast their votes for him on the Pennsylvania Supreme Court ballots in the May 17 primary election.
