That is very true that 'Business is before pleasure!' and I must keep this in my mind. Monday evening I had to go down to a book store on 23rd street, and I passed front of your office building. I watched carefully but I could not see you. Yesterday noon I took two boys to lunch at Rigg and had fine stake and old fashion strawberry short cake. Boys enjoyed very much. Oh, I wish you were with us. Evening I had to go down to Warren st. so I came out from substation at B. B. I asked to a young man if he could direct me to the street. He looked arround and said " I really do'nt know!"

There I watched thousands of people to find a intelligent man ~~ask~~ you-Miss Asbury told me, but scarce. I was more or less getting excited for the fear of closing office. I walked reluctantly toward the Broadway until I come to meet a refined gentleman. He pointed out the street which was only one block away from where I stood. Now, you see, you the saviour, if I didn't follow your instruction I won't be able to fulfil my plan. I thank you. I went bed early and I was good boy.

Today three of us went to a place call Cerfe-Teria? on 37th st. W. about 100. It is in the basement. Rooms are fixed in Elizabethian style, English oak furniture and everything in the style of sixteenth century. We have to go to the rear, get a tray first, then knif, forks, spoons and etc., then to counter, get ^{you} all want. I picked up corn-beef hash, chocolate pie, muffens, and coffee; and cost me only 35 cents. Every thing so need clean, and delicious you must come with me someday, will you?
