NOTE: This concert is given as a demonstration of the work being done by the pupils in their regular school classes. The Combined Grammar School Orchestra is composed of selected players from all the grammar schools, in each of which a school orchestra is conducted once each week under the direction of a special instructor. There are no players in this concert in any of the organizations who are not bona fide students in that organization. Some High School students play in both orchestra and band, and a few play also in the Evening School Community Orchestra

In addition to this orchestra and band playing, free instruction is given in all the public schools in the play-

ing of instruments, including the violin.

There are at present 317 pupils receiving this free instruction, who are not yet sufficiently advanced to play in the orchestras. All the orchestra work and instruction is provided and maintained by the San Jose Board of Education.
