Tulelake (at Newell)

- 13. overall view of the camp as it exists today; all of the buildings in the far left rectangle are original Military Police offices and housing from the original camp
- 14. western boundary fence of camp along state highway 139; the fence is "original"
- 15. looking through original fence towards the west; this fence marks the eastern perimeter of the camp
- 16. eastern boundary fence and red cinder road both are "original"
- 17. original northern boundary fence and guard tower bases near main entrance station
- 18. original northern boundary fence and guard tower bases near main entrance station; note Military Police buildings behind fence

concrete

- 19. guard tower base made from pouring/into wooden form; note metal straps to secure guard tower legs to base
- 20. guard tower base made hurriedly by pouring concrete into a mound; this type of guard tower base is typical of those found around the perimeter of the stockade
- 21. original Military Police station at main entrance; this structure was in existence until a few years ago when it was destroyed by fire started by children today, only the concrete foundation remains
- 22. two guard tower tops and Military Police station; all three were destroyed by fire this past fall when additional hangars were built at airport and structures fell apart during movement
- 23. the remains of two guard tower tops and Military Police station
- 24. guard tower top discovered this summer on lawn of private residence near monument; the location of two additional, and possibly a third, guard tower tops have been discovered
- 25. building foundations in internee housing area near south end of camp looking to the north across extent of camp
- 26. building foundations in internee housing area near south end of camp looking to the northeast across extent of camp
- 27. building foundations in internee housing area near south end of camp looking toward the south boundary; the rows of foundation blocks seem to go on endlessly
- 28. stove pipe and collar from barracks in internee housing area
- 29. pile of tar paper from barracks in internee housing area
- 30. foundation of internee restroom and shower building; wooden table and metal troughs are "original"
- 31. toilet sewer holes in internee restroom and shower building; note the lack of partition supports between toilets
- 32. metal trough in internee restroom and shower building used either as a urinal or for washing hands
- 33. "soaking tubs" in internee restroom and shower building; it is interesting to note that these tubs were constructed by the internees, themselves
- 34. water main in internee housing area

- 35. sewer opening in internee housing area
- 36. sewer opening and cover in internee housing area
- 37. sewage treatment plant for entire internment camp
- 38. additional sewage treatment plant to be used if internment camp was enlarged
- 39. foundation for voluntary fire station in internee housing area
- 40. date of construction of foundation for voluntary fire station in internee housing area
- 41. walkway to and doorstep of voluntary fire station in internee housing area
- 42. bridges over diversion canals for supplying water to gardens in internee housing area note original wooden railing; these bridges were built by the internees
- 43. entrance to dumpsite for internment camp; part of dumpsite covers leach lines from additional sewage treatment plant and many artifacts have been found in this area
- 44. sample of artifacts found in internee housing area at internment camp site; the museum at Lava Beds National Monument now houses a significant collection of artifacts which continues to grow in size through the years
- 45. "added" entrance to Military Police office and housing area along northern boundary of camp; this entrance was added during the filming of the motion picture, <u>Farewell</u> to Manzanar
- 46. original building used by Military Police as office or housing
- 47. original buildings used by Military Police as offices or housing many of the buildings were simply boarded over with siding
- 48. original building used as administrative offices by civilian personnel
- 49. original building used as housing by civilian personnel
- 50. mess hall used by civilian personnel
- 51. voluntary fire station in administrative area
- 52. cold storage locker in administrative area
- 53. recreation hall for civilian personnel located along western perimeter of camp and state highway 139

- 54. warehouse in administrative area
- 55. warehouses along railroad spur off of main line that brought many internees to the camp; located along the western perimeter of the camp
- 56. entrance to stockade of internment camp; note original fence posts, fence, and jail inside of stockade
- 57. jail inside stockade in administrative area
- 58. inside of jail in stockade
- 59. internee barracks on private property in Tulelake area; many of these structures will be donated to National Historic Site if it is established
- 60. internee barracks remodeled into a home on private property in Tulelake area
- 61. location of vent holes through ceiling of internee barracks, used as a storage area on private property in Tulelake area; stoves were located back-to-back in adjoining apartments in each barracks
- 62. original internal wall of barracks on private property in Tulelake area
- 63. "pot-bellied" stove vent in ceiling of Military Police housing; this setting was reconstructed for the shooting of the motion picture, Farewell to Manzanar
- 64. "pot-bellied" stove in internee housing on private property in Tulelake area; at least one of these stoves will be donated to National Historic Site if it is established
- 65. original curtains in internee housing on private property in Tulelake area
- 66. dinner bell found on the site of internee housing at camp; might possibly be donated to National Historic Site if it is established

on sheetrock

- 67. writing by internees/in barracks on private property in Tulelake area; some small pieces have been given to Lava Beds National Monument to add to the artifacts being preserved; several eight by ten foot pieces of sheetrock, bearing similar writing, may be given to monument in the coming year
- 68. additional examples of writing by internees on the walls of barracks
- 69. original barracks on private property in Tulelake area

- 70. original barracks on private property in Tulelake area
- 71. original building used by Military Police as office or housing; note that the building as been remodeled to resemble an internee barracks during the filming of the motion picture, Farewell to Manazanar
