With the war, most four grew up largely within the social boundaries of the Japanese community. The public schools — Main Street, Blakey-Gardner, Park, Pacific, and Washington Elementary Schools, and later Broadway, Arden, and Garfield High Schools — were for them the chief windows into the larger society. The boys had exceptionally low truancy rates, and were generally rated highly as students. Many went to universities such that the first as a group came to have a high level of "Total rate of Scholastic" in Gannett reports. Although the schools were windows being outward, occasionally the boys tended to stay within their group, as at meetings of the University of Washington in the Japanese Students Club and and Payne's (senior). Major group projects was in those days a good banner to welcome.



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
