Tule Renunciants Restored U. S. Citizenship

SAN FRANCISCO — Approximately 4,200 Japanese Americans who renounced their citizenship in relocation camps during the war will have their American citizenship restored without any further delay, Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman ruled Tuesday.

Judge Goodman denied the Government's request for delay to present sample cases which, it was claimed, would show that most of the 4,200 were not loyal to the United States and therefore unfit for citizenship.

Nisei Florists Prominently Represented in Displays, And 'Backstage' Work

HOLLYWOOD PARK — Patrons of the Pari-Mutuel at Inglewood's Hollywood Park will scarcely recognize the Pavilion and Clubhouse of the handsome modern structure next week when they go to view the million dollar California International Flower Show.

Instead of "horse culture," the emphasis will be on horticulture, with more than 150,000 square feet of flower and garden exhibits.

Instead of the minimum \$3.25 required to view the "bangtails" run, the admission for one week will be one dollar to view begonias and primula malacoides.

The show opens at 1 p.m. tomorrow and will continue until April 3 inclusive. More than \$20,000 are offered in exhibition prizes.

Several Nisei names are prominent on the committees which are preparing the show. Frank Kuwahara, general manager of Golden State Wholesale Florists, is chairman of the Flower Growers Committee.

On the schedule committee are Tom M. Endow, Fred Muto, George Kobata. Mr. Kobata is also on the Pot Plant Growers Committee, while Mr. Muto, along with Toichi Domoto, distinguished San Francisco nurseryman, will be among the judges of the show.

On Committee

On the Flower Growers Committee are George Inagaki, Mr. Muto, S. Takeyasu, Mr. Endow, Hideo Satow and Joe Shinoda.

Japanese flower men are underwriting about 20 per cent of the show. There are 50 entries of area display by Japanese and 200 individual entries in the cut flower growers competition.

The Southern California Flower Market, an association of growers, shippers, wholesalers and retailers, will have a \$5,000 display in cut flowers.

Huge Display

Kobata Brothers of Gardena are entering a huge display of pot plants. The Shinoda brothers, operators of the San Lorenzo Nursery, largest Nisei greenhouse operation in the world, will have three cut flower displays and one orchid competition entry.

The entire first floor will be devoted to commercial cut flower growers and nursery exhibits, while retail florists, garden clubs and an educational display by the UCLA Horticulture Department will occupy the second.

Foreign Entries

Entries from Switzerland, Mexico, Holland, Canada and Australia will be included in the show.

Carpenters and brick masons were busy putting up some of the elaborate displays in the pavilion when we visited the grounds Tuesday.

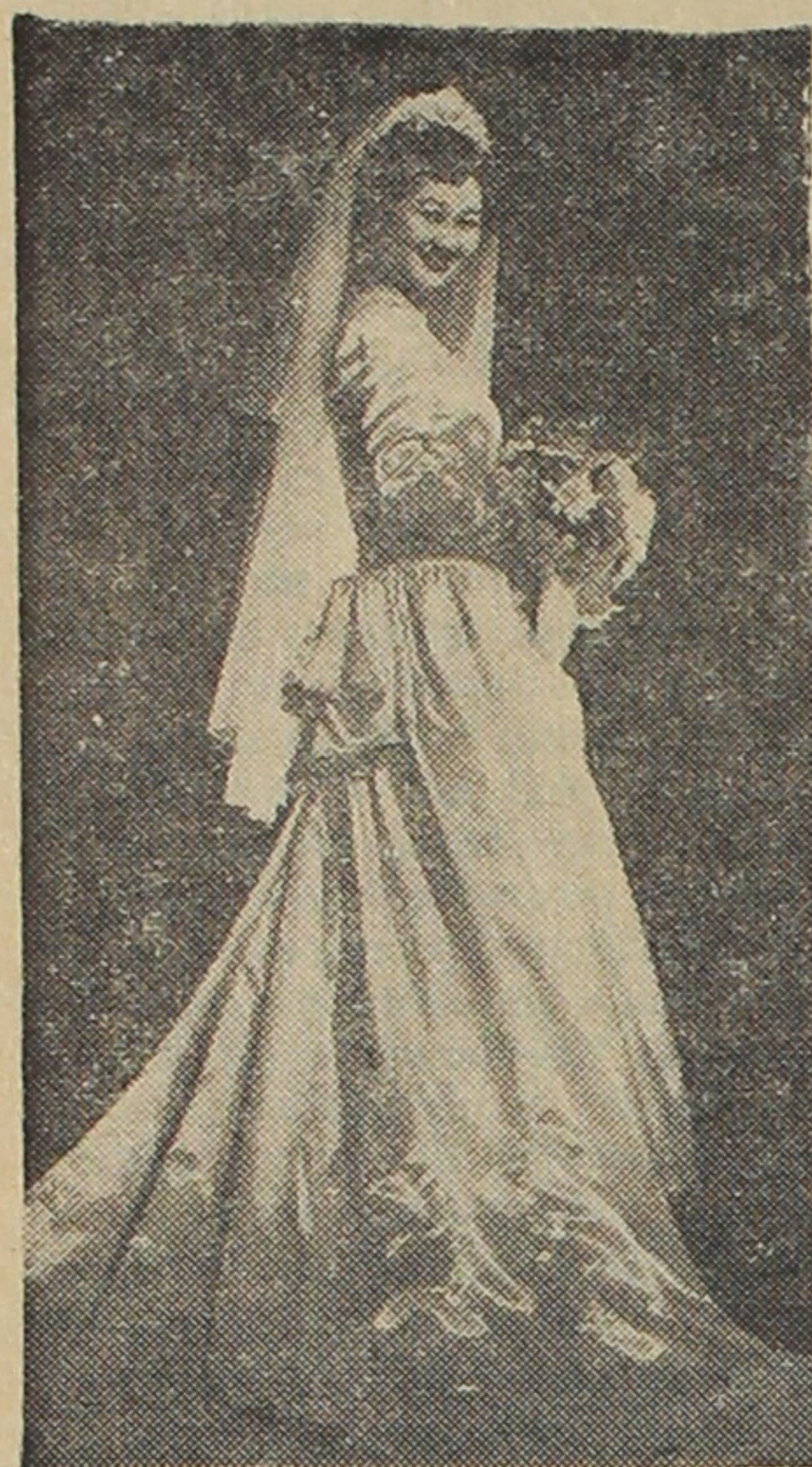

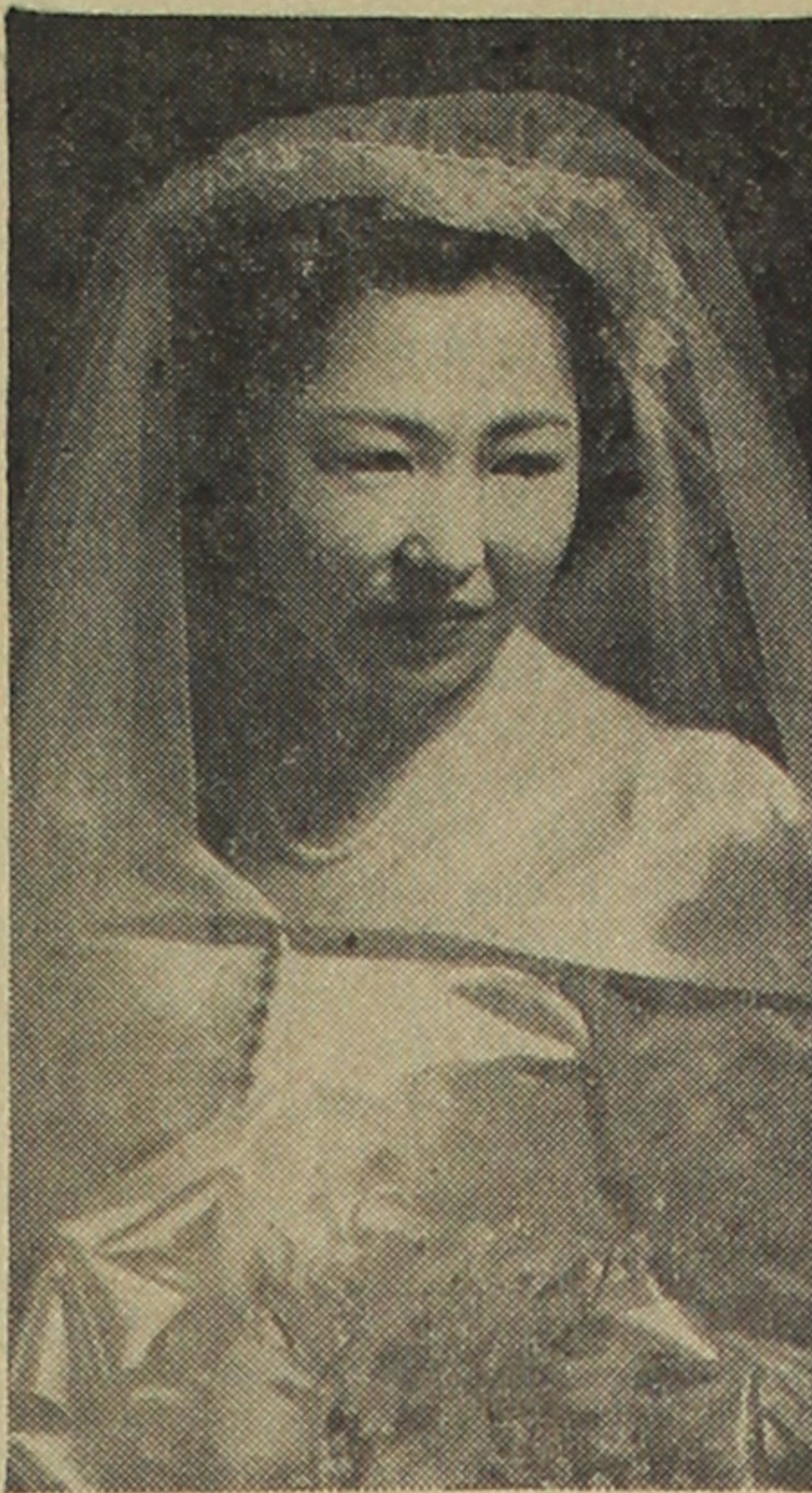

A nursery will be provided during the services.

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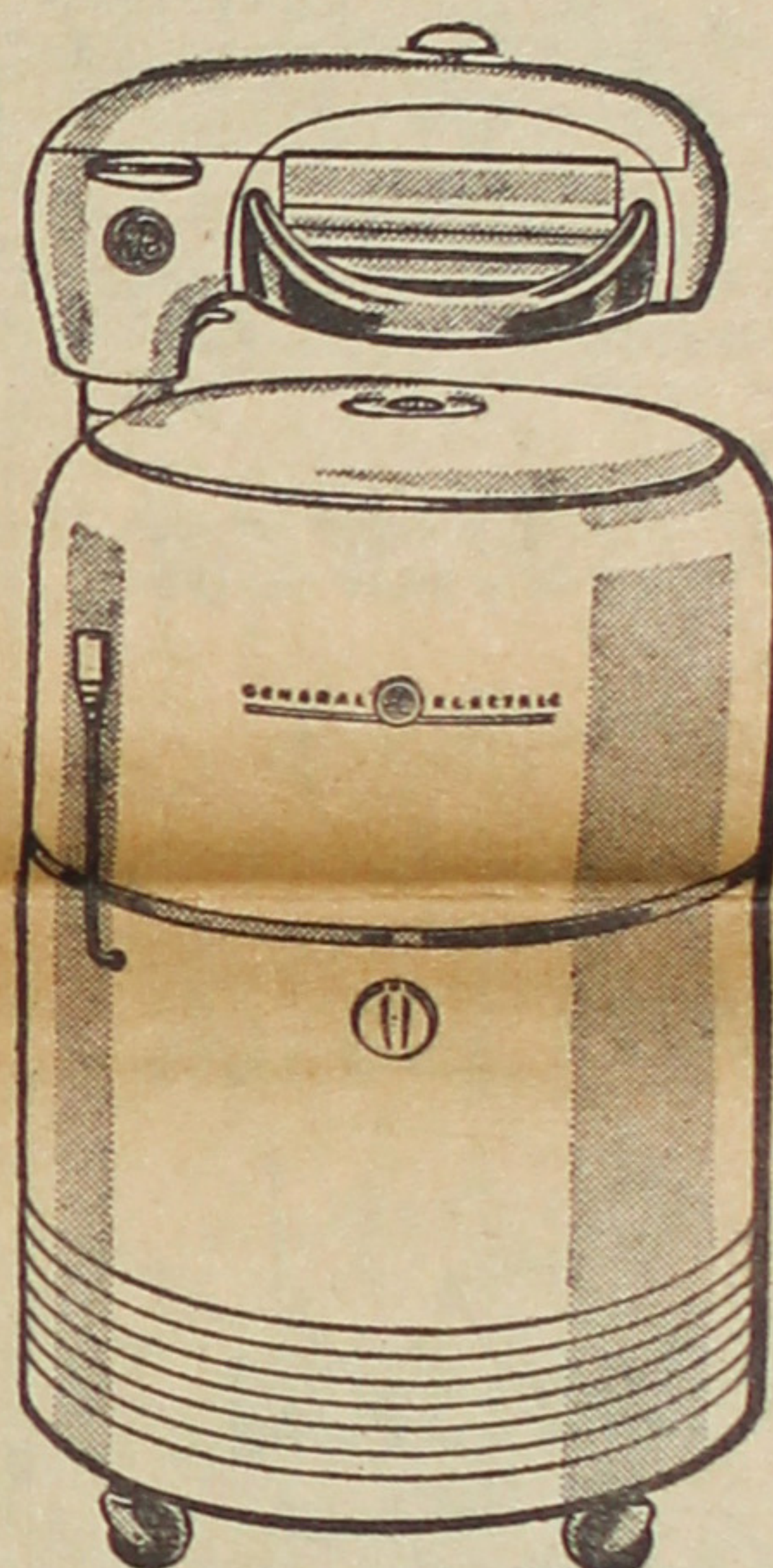

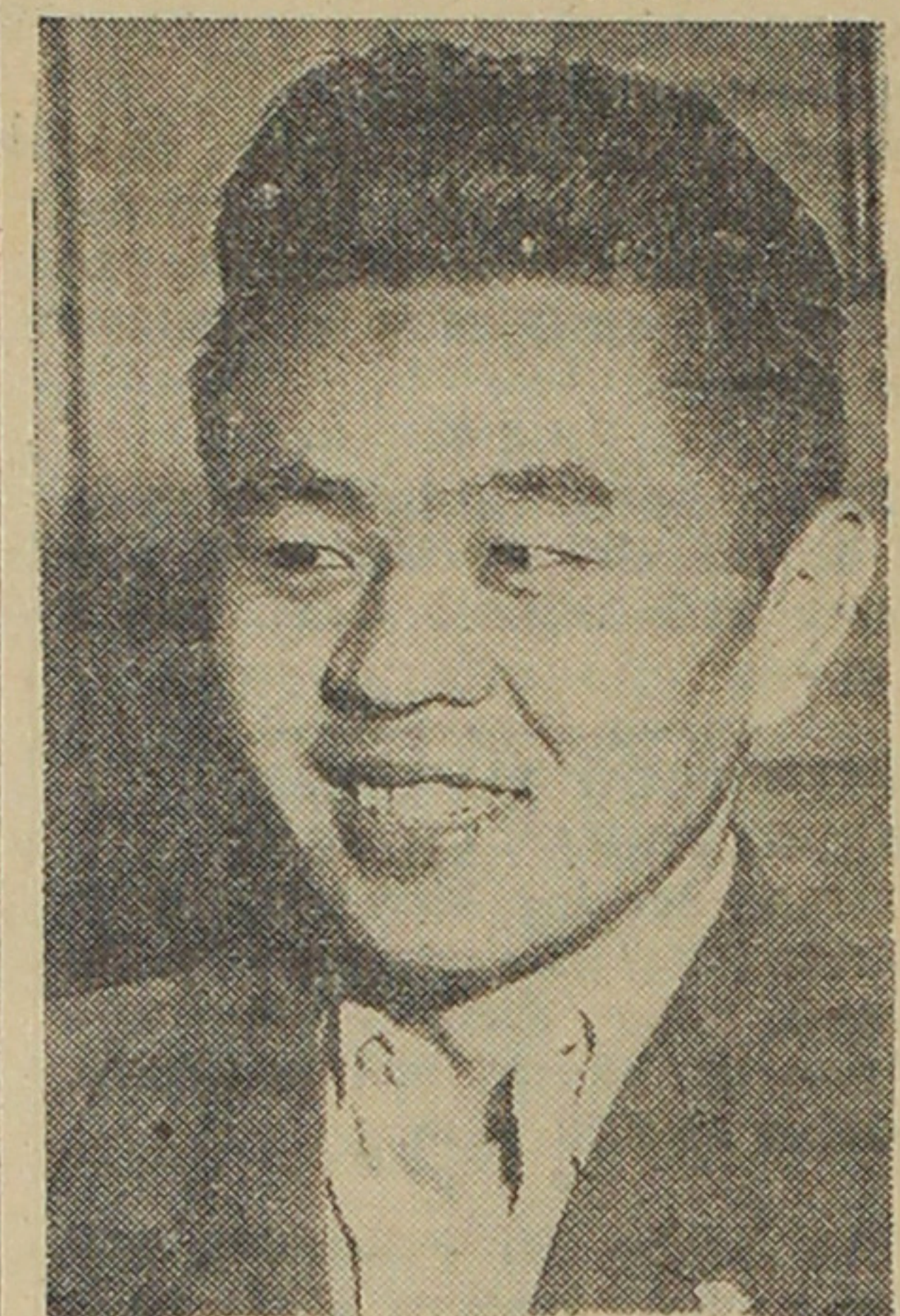

there wasn't an O'Hara in Ohara.

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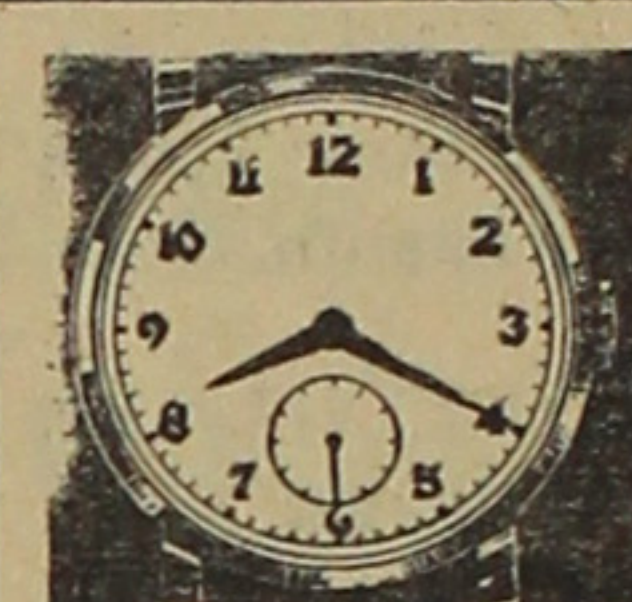

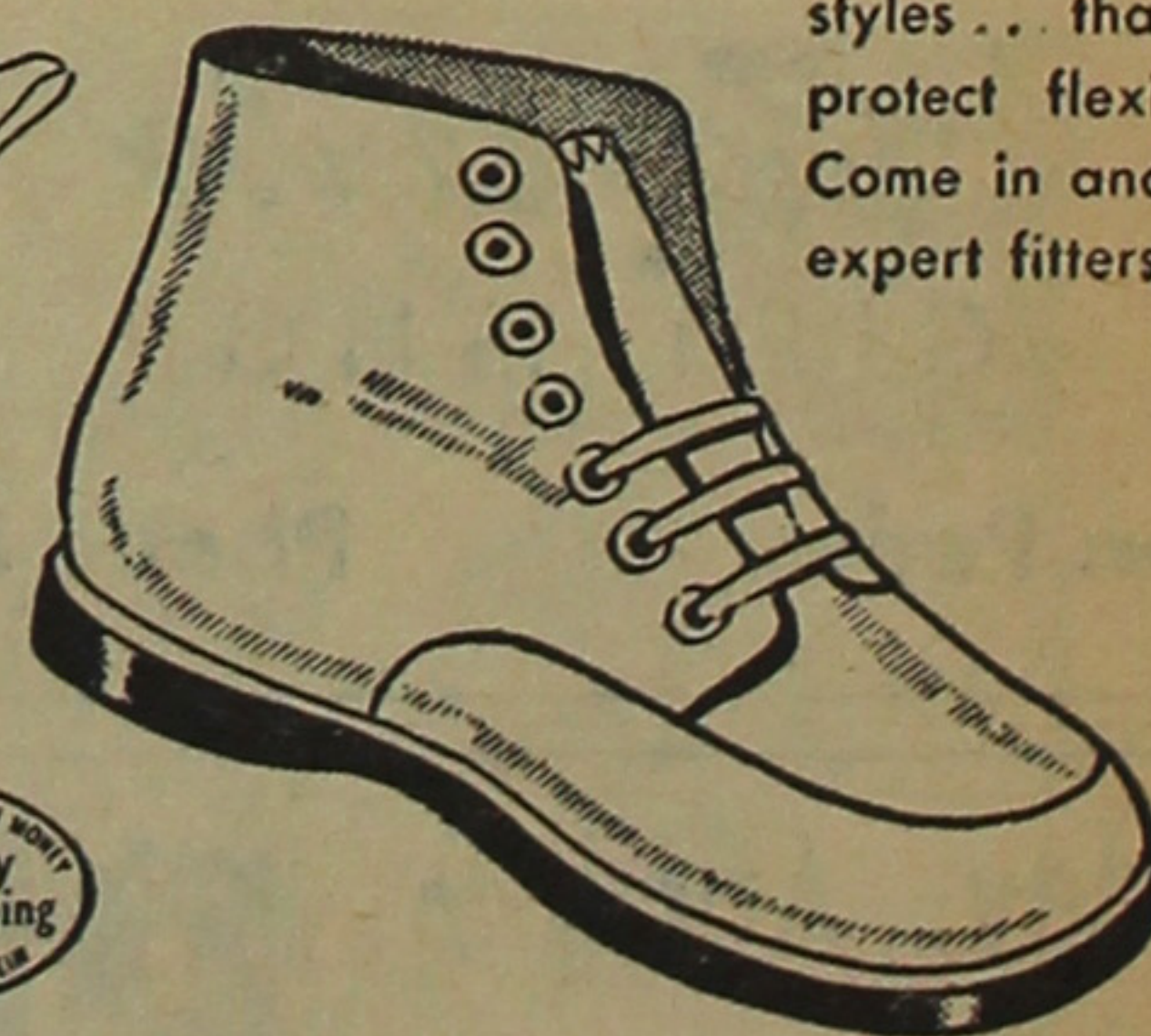
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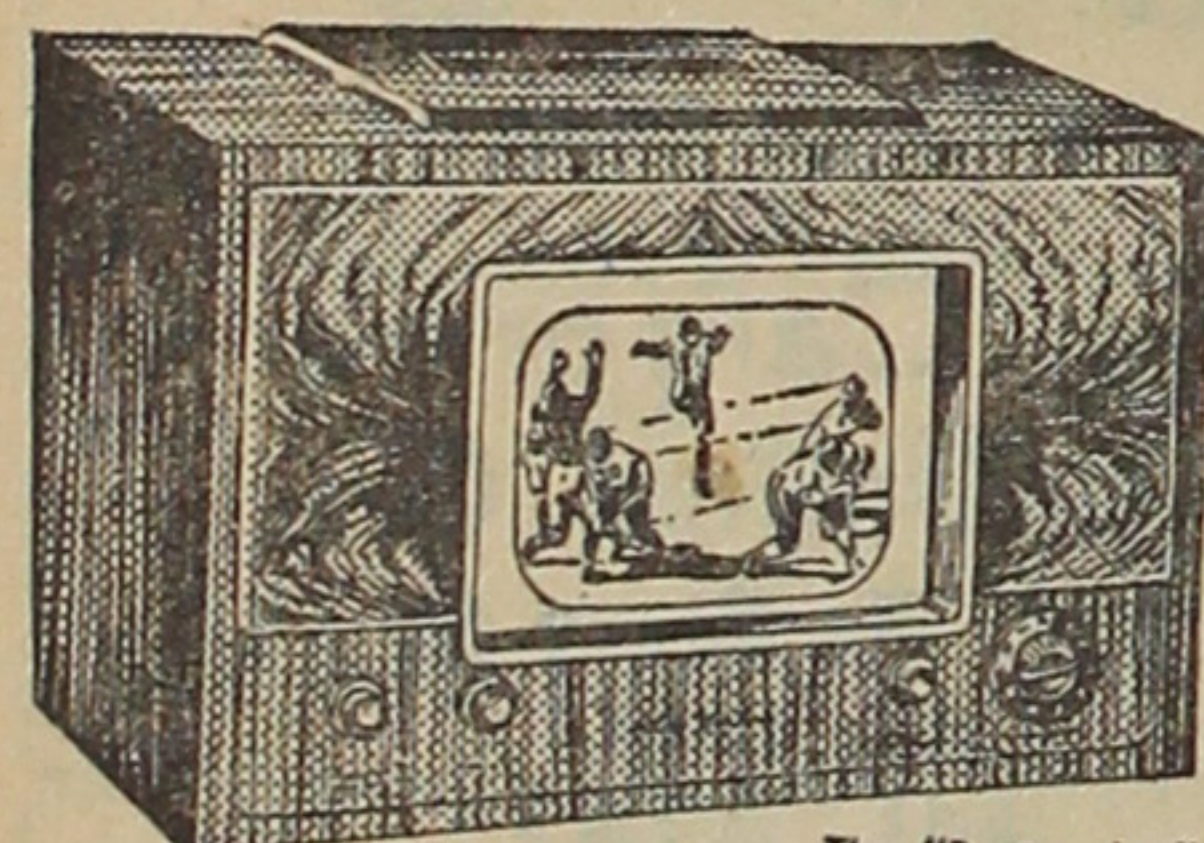
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Berkeley Nisseis Win Sanjo Tourney

SAN JOSE—The Berkeley Nisseis turned in a double overtime 61 to 60 triumph over the visiting Hawaii All Stars in the finals to gain the San Jose Zebra Invitational title, last Sunday. The title was the third one this season for the Nisseis, the other two being the NAU AA championship and the second annual SF Drakes tourney.

The Mobil Flying Horse team from Los Angeles went home with the consolation award with a finals victory over the Coast Peninsula All Stars, 56 to 49. In their initial consolation round encounter, the Ellay entry overcame Del Rey, 43 to 37.

Jim Kaneda's 15 points went for naught in their opening round engagement with the Sacramento Stags as they lost, 36 to 30. Hal Tome of Hawaii All Stars was voted the most outstanding player of the tournament and John Oshida of Berkeley Nisseis received the most valuable player's award.

Both Berkeley disasters were of the final-minute variety. The first one was lost in the final 15 seconds when the Northern Monarchs flipped in two quick buckets to overcome a one point deficit. The second loss occurred in the Sanjo finals when the mainlanders tied the score in the closing moments of the game and eventually emerged with the game and the tourney title after battling Hawaii through two overtime sessions.

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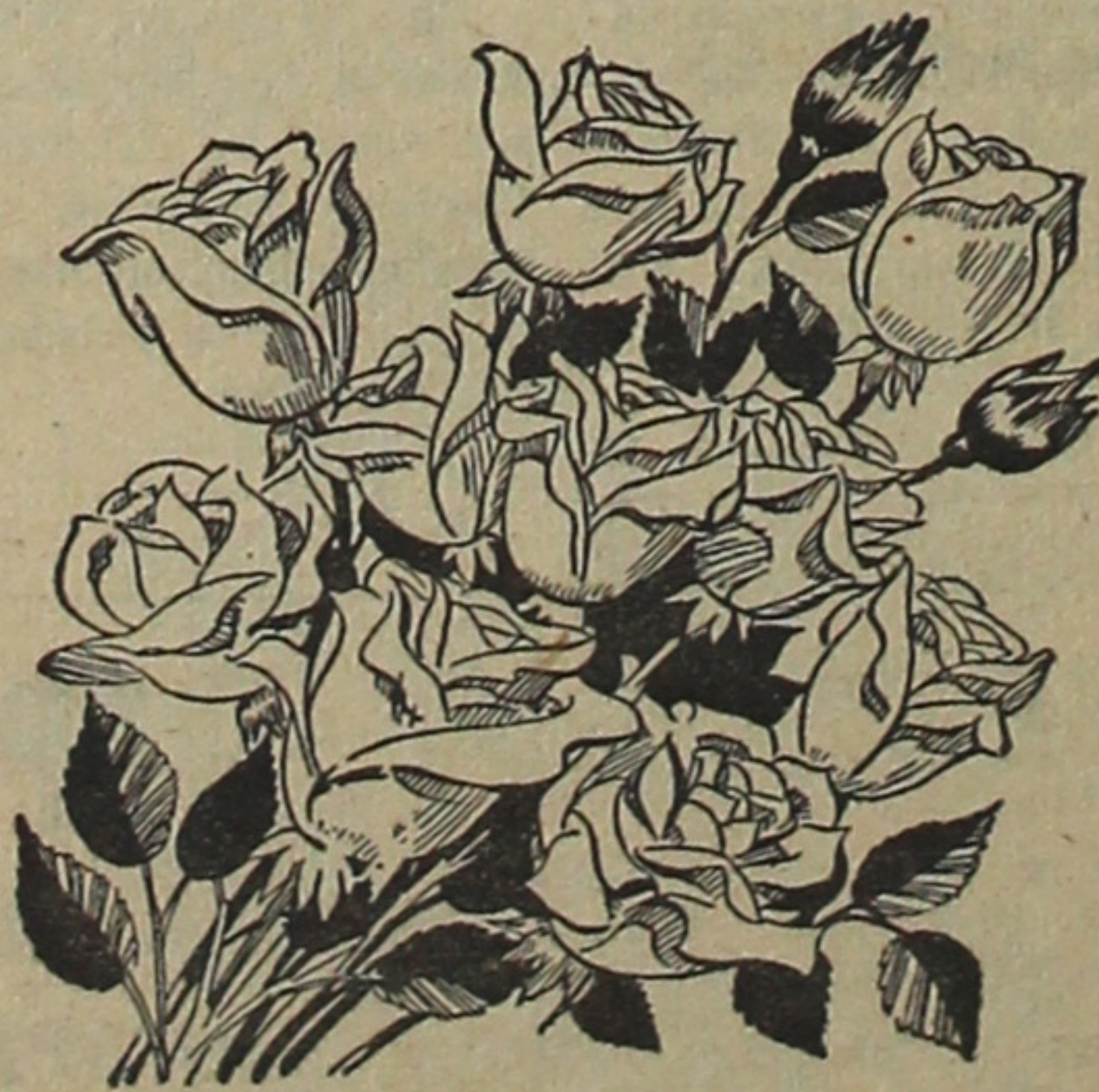
