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The transformed domain of the "TRAD-ER VIC" at the Palmer House, although down instead of up, might well be the lodge of some South-Sea Island chieftain. The Polynesian tikis, traditionally warding off evil spirits, here seem to act as mentors, pleasantly insisting that each dish be truly a gourmet's delight.

"Trader Vic's" proffers Chinese, Polynesian, East Indian, Continental and American cookery. Our essay at this visit: Chinese. The Chinese cook prepares with perceptive intuitiveness rather than by rule. The dishes appear, in their varied forms, to sprout from the Chinese sensitivity to the inherent nature of the foodstuff itself.

Our gracious host, Mr. Lei Lee, explained the Chinese oven, fired with wood, where the barbecued squab or pig or the lamb Indonesian-style, are cooked by an ancient method.

From the unsurpassed list of over thirty rum drinks, we selected a Samoan Fog Cutter (masculine), fine and tall; and a Scorpion (feminine), charming and low, in a glass bowl with a gardenia afloat.

"At the beginning," was a "heavenly" group which the House labels "Cosmos Tidbit": Egg roll, shrimp, Rangoon crab with blue cheese, spiced spare ribs. Individually upon our myrtlewood-top table an engaging beef production "Cho-Cho." The beverage: a most delicate tea.

"At the end," the exquisite tropical-fruit desserts with or without ice cream and/or sauce of rare flavor: and rice cakes irresistibly holding good fortunes.

The service rendered by the Chinese waiters is a smiling one. They are always happy to advise if one wishes to order exploratorily in unaccustomed ground.

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In ancient times in France's most famous Cognac region, the valley of Charente, doweries were measured in casks of wine.

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Included in the document the Count considers "a most prized possession" are an account of the origins of the wine known as "Cognac;" a history of the valley of Charente, the home of the Chateau de

ROBERT ELSTON (Robert Lomax). Recently seen on Broadway in "Golden Fleecing," Robert Elston has to his credit "Tall Story," "Maybe luesday," and "Genius and the Goddess." Off-Broadway he was featured in Tennessee Williams' "The Purification," "Camille," "Back to Methuselah," "Summer and Smoke," "Ah Wilderness" and "Legend for Lovers." TV's Kraft and the U.S. Steel Hour plus summer stock covering the classic and modern, gave important roles to Young Elston whose background includes invaluable experience with the American Shakespeare Festival.

CHASE CROSLEY (Kay Fletcher). As the English girl in love with the young Canadian in "Suzie Wong," Chase Crosley, a daughter of the South, Tennessee to be exact, graduated from Columbia University with both a B.A. and M.A. degree and made her debut in Shaw's "Heartbreak House." Broadway saw her shortly after in "All My Sons" and following a stint in repertoire covering current attractions, Chase was featured in an imposing crosssection of Shakespeare, "The Tempest," "Midsummer Night's Dream," "Twelfth Night," "Henry V" and "Henry VIII." 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

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

For the past few years, he has concentrated on films, directing four movies that have acquired a goodly measure of success: "Picnic," "Bus Stop," "Sayonora" and "South Pacific." He was born in Texarkana, Texas, and was educated at Culver Military Academy, and at Princeton University where he was one of the founders of the University Players. 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




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
