MYER'S STATEMENT.

I find deep satisfaction in the announcement today by Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson that a combat team composed of American citizens of Japanese ancestry is to be recruited by the United States army for active service in a theatre of war. This announcement makes January 28, 1943, the most significant date of the last ten months for persons of Japanese ancestry in the United Stated.

Many have told me, in conversations and letters, of their desire for active service in the armed forces of this country. For many months I have been looking forward with them to the time when their desire might be realized.

All facilities of the War Relocation Authority, both to the relocation centers and in Washington, will immediately be placed at the disposal of the war department to speed the formation of the combat team announced by Mr. Stimson.

Segregation Of Loyal Citizens Proposed:

Chairman Albert B. Chandler (D. Ky.) of a military affairs sub-committee announced Wednesday that a proposal is under consideration to remove loyal American citizens of Japanese ancestry from among the more than 106,000 Japanese aliens and Japanese-Americans now in western relocation centers and put them in the army or in defense plants.

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VOLUNTARY INDUCTION FIRST: NEW COMBAT UNIT IS CONTEMPLATED

American citizens of Japanese ancestry will soon be admitted to the army of the United States, the War Department announced Thursday through Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson. Plans for admission have already been completed, the announcement revealed.

The action was taken following study by the War Department of many earnest requests by loyal Americans of Japanese extraction for the organization of a special unit of the army in which they could have their share in the fight against the nation's enemies, it was announced.

The War Department announced that the initial procedure in the formation of the unit authorized by the Secretary will be voluntary induction. Facilities for induction will be made available to the American citizens of Japanese ancestry in the Hawaiian Islands and the War Relocation Centers of this country.

No individual will be inducted if doubt exists as to his loyalty, it was declared. Upon induction, the nisei will begin training as a combat team for service in the active theater. The combat team will consist of all the customary elements of infantry, artillery, engineer, and medidal personnel. No effort will be spared in developing it into an efficient, well-rounded, hard-hitting unit, the announcement said. The new unit will be trained separately from the battalion of Japanese extraction-originally a Hawaiian National Guard Organization-which is already a component of the army, it was revealed.

The War Department's action, it was announced, is part of a larger program which will enable all loyal American citizens of Japanese ancestry to make their proper contribution toward winning

Employment in war production as well as service in the armed forces is included in this program.

vestigating charges of "coddling" in the
Japanese settlements, Chandler said "twothirds of the 106,000 are 'Nisei"--American-born and American-educated Japanese---who are mostly loyal Americans
who want to work and want to fight."

"Our problem looks like a problem of segregation—how to separate the good from the bad," Chandler told reporters after an executive session of the sub-committee. "It should have been done long ago."

Chandler went on to say that the subcommittee is to meet Thursday with former. Ambassador to Japan Joseph C. Crew to ask about the feasibility of separating the "sheep from the goats."

Pointing out that 2000 Americans of Japanese descent are now in the army, Chandler said: "We're going to put more of them into the army if we find they're

loyal."

The military affairs subcommittee was appointed to study charges that the Japanese have been "pampered" by the war relocation authority, which has supervision of the relocation centers. Senator Mon C. Wallgren (D., Wash.) has introduced legislation to place the settlements under direct supervision of the army.

Chandler said that after hearing from Grew and Dillon Myers, head of the relocation authority, the committee will visit the resettlement centers to make a

first-hand study of conditions.

The December 7 riot at a Japanese relocation camp at Manzanar; Calif., Chandler said, showed that "segregation is highly important---we've got to get the enemics out of there." One man was killed in the riot, which came during a celebration of Pearl Harbor attack by pro-Japanese.

STAFFORD COMMENTS ON WAR DEPT, MOVE

Project Director Harry L. Stafford had the following to say about the War Department move to admit American citizens of Japanese ancestry to the army of the United States:

"This is a significant development which will afford all Hunt colonists involved an opportunity to further the

interests of all people:

"All that can be said now is that we look forward to the time when information and the ways and means will be revealed through which participation in this program by loyal citizens will be made possible."

"What WRA Director Dillon S. Myer has to say expresses; everything that I can

say at the present time."

Army Will Accept Nisei

(Continued from page 1) the Honorable Henry L. Stimson, Secretary of War:

"It is the inherent right of every faithful citizen, regardless of ancestry, to bear arms in the nation's battle. When obstacles to the free expression of that right are imposed by emergency considerations, those barriers should be removed as soon as possible. Loyalty to country is a voice that must be heard, and I am glad that I am now able to give active proof that this basic American belief is not a casualty of war."
