No longer is he plain 'Tom' or 'Gus', but he will be grivate Thomas Sasaki of the US Army.

Born in the heart of the California delta, Thomas grew to be known as the 'wonder boy' of Walnut Grove. The Cub Pack found him at the age of 9 from here he joined the Boy Scouts. There, he was the 'big guns' for Troop 62 and ever since his entry, he has been the Troop's official bugler and hasn't given up that posi-. tion to this day.

Since the Trop's monthly publication, THE SIXTY-TWO, started back in 1941, he was the pusiness manager and is credited as giving the paper the success it has had. The unofficial report from the Scoutmasters' council of Merced declaring Troop 162 as 'the best Troop in Merced' came not without effort on the part of Thomas, Senior Patrol Leader, who led the Troop to first and second place honors in the Scout field days.

Today, he is one of the foremost Scouts of this center. He is the Publication Director of the official · Boy Scout publication of Amache, REVEILLI, and also Assistant Cubmaster of Pack 1620.
