

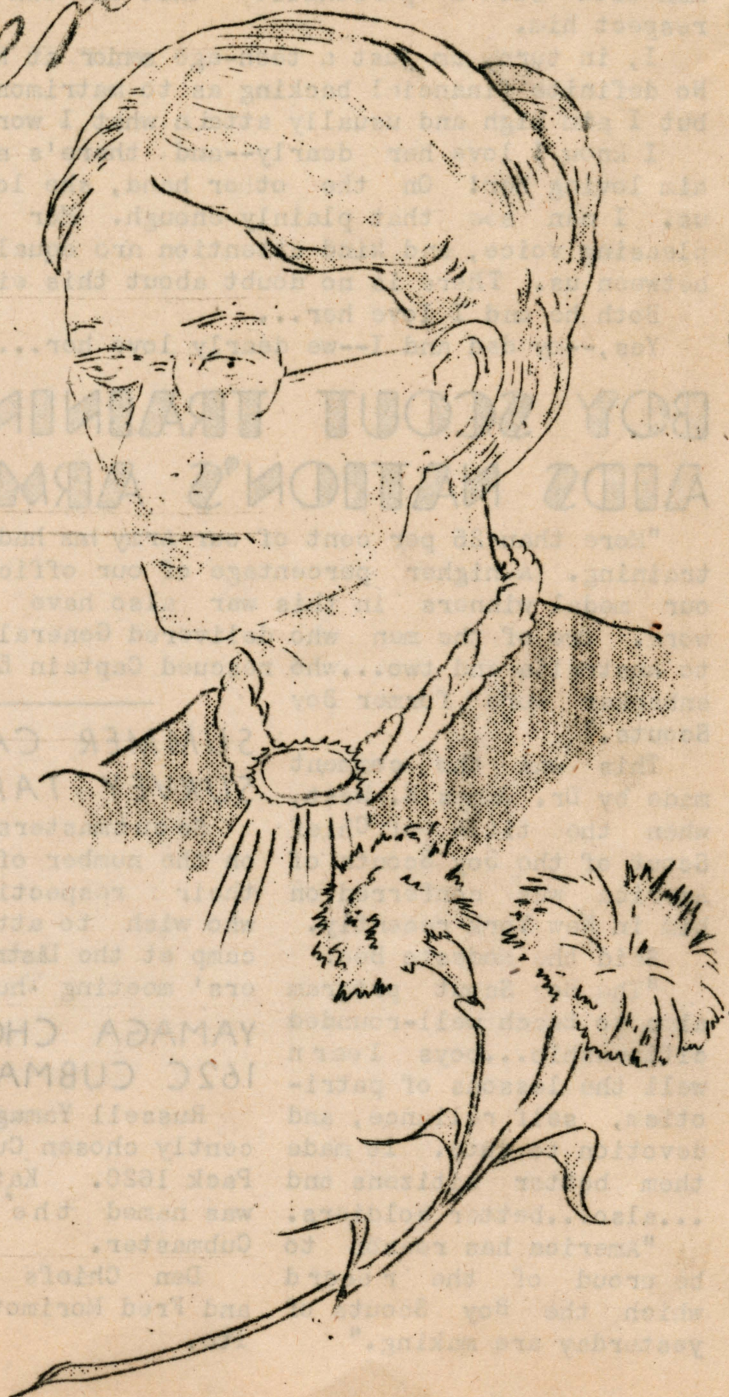
To Mother
