Dear Tommie,

Just received your air mail letter which was forwarded to me from St. Louis. I will write to papa immediately and send him my pay checks. I really need the money now as it's the beginning of the quarter but anything that will bring peace to out family will be well worth pinching pennies for - justicurpowning will

I found out today that I may be able to graduate in March. That will be the latter part of the month. I got a couple of petitions through today and if everything else is approved, theere is no reason why not because I've been here for three quarters to fulfill residence requirements. That will help to solve a lot of the prob em, won't it? I can join all of you in California and take care of you and papa. If there is any extra time, I can see what work will be available at the medcenter. Deep down, I want to get married, and the carreer is only a defense. I'll try my darndest to get out by March. Maybe papa can come out and see my graduation and we cam go back to San Francisco together. Do you think you can arrange to get out there that soon? I can't visit you in camp as the new regulations are that no one can visit camps.

The news you write disturbs me terribly. How anyone claiming to be a friend can be so low and cheap, I don't know. I can take a trip to Chicago one of these weekends and visit the Aizawas, and I'll write a letter to Ojisan right away. I never knew that papa had so large an income. He never told me that it was that much, and I hardly think it is correct, and if so, is only temporary due to the war. At any rate, he can live comfortably enoughm and if I go back and take care of him, there's no reason why he has to get involved with this woman.
