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I can't remember what kind I sent last time. When I get my lazy bones to working one of these days I'll send you some French coins, but I haven't gone to the trouble of wrapping them yet. I've been trying to get some stamps for you but I haven't had the chance as yet. As soon as I can I'll send some to you.

My mail is gradually catching up with me and I'm still getting some Nov. letters that were sent to Camp Shelby. I'm getting a lot of Xmas cards lately, too.

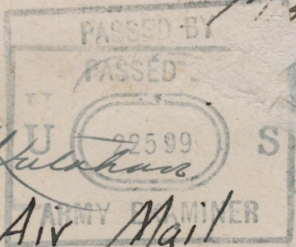
