The sample of the hagita came today. Also sample of a scare-crow doll from Teruo Kadowaki of Sendai Chamber of Commerce. No price or letter with it yet.

The hagoita is only thing we got so far from Hashimoto. Their letter says they are sending other things. (Since "arthat left the office saying 'I'LL be back) I came to her mach ine and read what she wrote thus far. Inserted caps above. Re: Hagoita, it is cheezy, how do you sell unknown game in America even tho 10¢ piece? You must off your rocker. Quit doing these things. If you are going to continue Kuwamura thing, hagoita, etc, you'd sure better come back quick bec. you're wasting time and money on excessively infoerior things beyond just boo-boos, they are tremendous blunders! Are they doping your coffee? How come they can put these things over on you when you haven't answered our questions & evaded our requests, and not bought anything for the retail store on their request list? What's the idea not getting us our goh-shogi set, going to Takahashi party favor place that might have more things like our white doves???????Others are very much on the ball. Otagiri came out with lots of new things ever and beyond the several new kinds of matches. Their plain grass mats are superior to ours being of a different loom and core thread so they lay heavier and stiffer, and sell at 16.00/Gr. How about getting around to the post card people so we can make up a selection boxed, and doing this with ready-made and available or run-off-on-order sorts you don't even have to work on? Gee, we supply you with the ideas and even where to go, and you spend you time on Kuwamura's stinking hot pads and hagoita of the cheapest cheeziest I knew never such existence of. Hagoita is traditionally beautiful of silk ... and those who don't know the traditional use ARE NOT going to know what on earth they are for! What are you going to call them, baby seat beaters? The face pasted onto them, paper, is not pretty. I'll cook them for dinner for you. Give them away to an orphanage before you come back to escape the duty and freight, or better still, sell tham back to the guy for half price. Tell him not to crate them, give him half the money, and tell him to keep them. That's the best solution. Also same for Kuwamura's hotpad, which will not be a pad, nor will it protect from hot. And is peko-peko! It's tension makes it spring, it is plain lousy. Givenhem half the cost and tell them you've made a boo-boo. About matches I'm enclosing some colors, designs. Hope they help. Have some modern usable-everywhere-in everyone's -home-type things and don't confine yourself to just J. sorts or Serizawa's desiggs.... Aessler's stinking colors & desi gn sell bec. more harmonious with interiors. After all, they accessorise American homes and are bought with typical US psychology, not folky craft-ists. Most don't understand the real amt of work involved in the folk art paper. We should have our advantage at the level of color and design and knowing our market, since nothing is exclusive anymore. DESIGN, COLOR AND APPROPRIATENESS, STYBING FOR EVERY ITEM. Ithink you should read this part of the letter onee more. If you are becoming apanized, you should come wack and I shoul alternate with you from now on. Then there'd be enough stagger so that we'd both have good ideas. Over here, you should go to the display houses selling mateirals, they surehave fres fresh ideas. ince America has abundance of all things, we must have COLOR, DESIGN to sell!

2/ I went to Sylvan Cohen yesterday and was enchanted at their beautiful display. ince they display to sell to displayers, can't you imagine. Lots come from J. but they arrange it so expertly. Wish I could tell you what we could commercialize, but only that a small feather duster the size of our smallest, the 4", was on the end of a rattan stick 4 ft. long, arranged like flowers, etc. Thought I could find something to sell at retail ontrial for a whal later import, but came away with nothing. Went to Pac C D Gds same bldg, saw our folding shoji lamp copied, black, with J elec parts, 4.75 each, design little diff, like #28 thrown together. Better yell at your source. I didn't see the elec parts, but assumed it, for they also had squatty boxed oblong in our same grey and brown, both same design, with elec parts. like sheji yokoshige. on legs, balancing up from a wooden board about 5x7 or 8 wide, on/off switch on wire part way past the lamp. PCDG also had some very nice plain gold/olk lacquer marked AIZU in demi tasse c/s; coffee c/s; bowl part of owan; desert plate, all with gold wash on inside or top side, with outside or bottom side blk. I can see where red not selling, as calls for it is less, then the tone of red is touchy question. Only one thing I'm all fot, is that Saiki buy the older used stuff, if he can get it cheap. We shid tell him item for item, top price to go. Under no circumstance should he buy things that need fixing, bec. labor here is high. Unless it's fixed there. It'll get worse condition before arriva. They're getting in nicer prints for the children's challis-type kimonos so they sold out to hakujin "hy don't you go to 3-stars and others who advertise that pretty butterfly print? Everyone is anxious to do a good job this year, and competition is fast, so design is going tobe the factor. Kamei and you are all balled up so why don't you give them a "ansai address and phone number when you go away? urely anyplace in apan is closer than SF is, and yet they can't get a hold of you! I think steak knives had gone the way of all flesh. Thyey've hadit. DON'T BUY NO INDIAN CARVED STUFF !! Seki Cutly told me a lie! They sold me sets of that stuff claiming they designed it, when it was originally Indian! I sacrificed them at retail store at under wholesale price & had a deuced time getting rid fo them and they don't even cut, nd what's the idea of them doing this to us when we were such good customers, and why are you fooking with them when the mkt is DEAD, DEAD on the carving sets?????Lay off, lay off, it is poison, cutlery is not our forte, we don't have enough in that line to invade the narrow-margin low-profit, big volume housewares mkt! Teak, brass, etc on the Indai stuff means endless polishing, and it is poison! Dom't fool with those gyppers and fast talkers. Stay away from the carving sets, for heaven's sake. The knives the teen-age hoods carry around are cheap and good ... we have one in the kitchen from school! I'm using it, has pointed, curved end, serated edge, then comes into thin razor-sharp edge, and in a nice white handle, and it is great .! Wouldn't use my J. ones again on a bet. How I got it is a long story.

If Shizuoka has the inclination to do so, maybe we can get them to make a big box for us, with drawers, like the woodpecker type, but without the cocks dec. on them, with black hardware or hardware painted on them, for jewelry, keys, watches, etc tell them like Mah Jong boxes, but without the front sliding panel that fits in slot and comes down front, but make that hinged and open outwards like the cheap lacq deals they make, but the insdie with drawers like the mah jong tile boxes. Maybe not so many drawers. Or olike the woodpecker chest that stands on table or hangs from wall, with four or six drawers. This is usable for buttons, pins, etc for sewing center of home, near desk for clips, stamps, rubber bands, etc. Adaptable. Tone the color of the wood finish down or keep same, substitute black hareware like design painted on at the corners and at the pulls by paintings these on, and there you are. Small miniature Tansu. How about that? Also a Hime Kyoodai, which is a miniature kyoodai, or a mounted mirror on one drawer base. Knocks down. Traditional. Don't gook up. We had one downstairs in store for ear-rings try-on, sold it for 7.50, was used, faded. Pinkie played with it as child. Good mirror and larger, better. Dept stores have them full size, for dressing. Furn. sections. Retail \$20? Tilt of mirror adjustable with brass screws on both sides. Shizuoka can make. Keep the Shiz. type gook off. Knock-down with two posts and mirror fitting barelyinside drawer witl make only box to ship. Make nice hardare for pull. Remember old one to be about 8x11 roughly by memory, when given to me, was one box, all came out of it. Can be black lacq (kashu) with brass knob, screws to fasten tilt of mirror, like the standard J ones, no change. Design if nec. can be weeping willow, scattered coins or Mon, or weeping cherry blossoms but dignified, dainty, not with heavy hand.

About Mme. Kuwamura, acc to Jim, we've sent L/C! Oh woe! \$180.00 plus, down the drain. To Kansai is naturally thebest pace. As you kn w, Bon Access tried to get me to buy when we were there with Karen and you wan ted me to get some earrings, but we didn't buy beclatte she didn't have the designs, the price. too high, too much corn, nothing cle ver, stylish, smart or new. We had rejected her. The sent us by mail, lots of plastic tama-kanzashi, though. We didn't want them, and you were critical, too. I think the men's robes and the ladies' kimono in noil will be very popular. They make such good gifts. They say that in this recession, the soft goods, clothing in particular was not as hard hit as large appliances and card.

If you see some nice white china pieces for the retail store in your various wanderings, you might get them if unusual. That is, odd pieces to go with white dishes. They may not have them ready made, though, I guess. If you do see them a few pieces of each would be enough.

The pongee kimonos are supposed to come in next week. The ship was fielayed. It was supposed to be in this week. The rest of the cotton aprons and the raw silk jackets with pockets are supposed to come in on the boat due the 10th.

No samples from Ken Kato yet. Guess he's stalling so he won't have to send them at all. As I recall, he's the one who is so tight about postage.

Regarding folk art cannisters, don't you think the folk art designs are a bit too common now? They are nice, but not as unusual as they used to be. Now that Otagiri is out with matches in the typical folk art patterns, they will be very fommon. Luckily he hasn't used any of the patterns on our folk art boxes, but if he did, it would ruin the boxes, unless you did it yourself purposely to match the cigarette size boxes. Americans are great ones for matching sets of things. The Otagiri matches are nicely packed in good quality white cardboard boxes per doz. fire-place matches, lined insilver. That is, the cardboard is made with the silver on one side, a thick version of the PBS-22 foil star paper, but thick like extra heavy shirt board.
