Dear Papa,

I just received a letter from Tommie now and am writing to you immediately. Although I have not been receiving any letters from you, I am sure you are getting the letters I write to you often,

I am rather glad that you decided not to buy and operate a house in Denver, because I feel that it is too much for you. Perhaps a few years ago, when you were stronger, it would not have been so bad, but I think you should try to relax and not try to go into any business or work. You worked for forty years at hard labor and wore yourself completely out, and I will always be very grateful for it, but now I think you should take things easy. Life on the outside is very complicated. One must take care of every little thing and that takes good management and hard work. I wish I can help you now, but I think graduating is more important in the long run. It is more important to think of long-time plans than for just today and tomorrow.

Saturday I went to apply for a job at the bacteriology laboratory. With full time experience which I got in St. Louis, I am sure I can get a job somewhere. I know that it will not be too difficult to get work after graduation. I am very lucky to be able to go to school when other Nisei have to work or go to war. If I were a boy, I will probably ^{be} in Italy, shooting the Germans or in India or Australia like Alex Yorichi.

Next week I am moving to the main campus in Minneapolis. The dormitory is very new and beautiful. Next year, when I graduate, I wish you could come up here and enjoy the pretty country. We can go fishing at the lakes. Everyone goes fishing or swimming on Sundays. The University of Minnesota is a nice school and almost the same size as University of California. There are many Japanese families in Minneapolis, and they all like the place very much. It is cleaner than Denver, and the people are nicer. I think they are kind to us because they see so many Nisei soldiers from Camp Savage.

I will go to Topaz around August 30th or 31st. It will take about two days to get there. The train fare is about the same as it was last year. So, please send me some money for the tickets. I will also need some money for the tuition, room and board for the next six weeks. I have already sent you the amount I will need.

Please take care of your health so that this time I will not find you in the hospital when I go back to visit you.

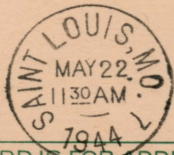

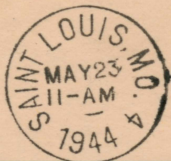
