From the Director: Tom Ikeda

Last month the top floor of my brother's home caught fire and was destroyed. The day after the fire as we quietly sorted through the wet, charred remains, my 82-year-old father surveyed the mess and said, "It's only money that was lost." I gently asked him why he said that, expecting him to talk about how his parents recovered after losing everything during World War II. Instead he spoke of his annual visits to the grave of his brother-in-law, Bako Kinoshita. My mother's brother was 20 years old when he was killed in Italy while fighting with the 442nd Regimental Combat Team. My father said that when he visits the grave he thinks about the children, grandchildren, and family parties that Bako was never given the opportunity to enjoy. My father said remembering what Bako sacrificed was why a little fire wasn't important.

Please remember veterans on Veterans Day, especially the ones who never returned.

Profile in Courage: George Sakato and a Belated Medal of Honor

"I'm no hero, but I wear it for the guys that didn't come back."

-- George "Joe" Sakato

George T. Sakato is the great-great-great-grandson of a samurai. Perhaps that explains his father's choice of a birth name. Sakato says, "Dad wanted to call me Jyotaro Sakato, after a sword-bearer for Musashi samurai. "But when the doctor submitted the vital statistics for the baby, "Jyotaro" became "George." An unassuming man, Densho's interviewee says simply, "All my life I've been called Joe." On October 29, 1944, in the Vosges Mountains of France, Private Joe Sakato's warrior ancestry saw him through a critical juncture in the storied Battle of the Lost Battalion.


Camp Harmony: Book Reading by Louis Fiset

Densho presents a talk by Louis Fiset, author of the new book *Camp Harmony: Japanese American Internment and the Puyallup Assembly Center*. The event takes place December 3, 6: 30pm, at the Wing Luke Asian Museum in Seattle's Chinatown-International District. *Camp Harmony* is the first full portrait of a single "assembly center"--located at the Western Washington fairgrounds at Puyallup, outside Seattle--that held Japanese Americans for four months prior to their transfer to an incarceration camp during World War II. Gathering archival









evidence and eyewitness accounts, Fiset reconstructs the events leading up to the detention as they unfolded on a local level: arrests of Issei leaders, Nikkei response to the war dynamics, debates within the white community, and the forced removal of the Nikkei community from Bainbridge Island. The book explores the daily lives of the more than seven thousand inmates at "Camp Harmony," detailing how they worked, played, ate, and occasionally fought with each other and with their captors. Admission to the Wing Luke Asian Museum is free on the first Thursday of each month. No ticket required for the lecture.

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Archive Spotlight Nobuko Miyake-Stoner: A Life Arc from War to Peace

On a recent interview trip to Honolulu, Densho recorded the life story of Nobuko Miyake-Stoner. Born in 1952 in Hiroshima, Japan, she is the descendant of atomic bomb survivors. Her father was a kamikaze pilot who did not complete his mission before the war ended. She attended a missionary school for young women in Hiroshima, earned a degree in theology in Denver, and became a minister serving in California and Colorado. She is presently pastor at the Harris United Methodist Church in Honolulu. In an excerpt from her interview Miyake-Stoner reflects on the arc of her life from Hiroshima to a home within view of the Pearl Harbor memorial.

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National News and Events National Park Service Report on Confinement Sites Grants

The National Park Service (NPS) has issued a report on the Fiscal Year 2009 grant awards for the Japanese American Confinement Sites Grant Program. In 2009, the first year of the grant program, the NPS awarded 19 grants totaling \$970,000 to help preserve and interpret the historic confinement sites where more than 120,000 Japanese Americans were confined during World War II. The NPS thanks those interested in the grant program for their participation. In preparation for the Fiscal Year 2010 appropriation and the next grant cycle, the NPS would like to hear your thoughts on this first year of the grant program. They encourage you to provide your comments on the components of the grant program that you would like to see continued, and any aspects of the grant program that you would like to see changed. As part of that informationgathering process, the NPS will host a series of "Listening Sessions" in early December at several locations throughout the country.
