As we all continue to watch and hear stories of the ongoing humanitarian tragedy in Japan caused by the earthquake, tsunami, and nuclear plant disaster, we find ourselves wanting to do more to help. There is still a large displaced population who are suffering shortages of essential goods and according to news reports at the end of March, more than 173,200 people are living in shelters. ## Deaf Nikkei: The Incarceration of Deaf Americans in U.S. Concentration Camps during World War II

Historian Newby Ely explores discrimination that deaf Nikkei faced in WWII incarceration camps. He explains the effect of the Executive Order and the danger posed by the lack of communication with U.S. military internment camp staff. He will present slides and archival footage of the camps, as well as interviews in American Sign Language with Pacific Northwest deaf Nikkei and family members who describe the deplorable conditions and the resilience of the deaf Nikkei.
