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Densho: The Japanese American Legacy Project

From the Director: Tom Ikeda

Happy New Year! After clearing the holiday fog from my brain, it is an awakening experience to think about Densho's upcoming milestones in 2014. For example, in February we are at Angel Island conducting our 16th and final teacher workshop for a two-year National Park Service grant. This project allowed us to create and conduct all-day workshops with over 600 teachers from 24 different states -- the largest ever teacher training effort about the WWII Japanese American incarceration experience. Later in April we launch a bigger and more advanced digital collection of historic photographs, documents, and newspapers. This updated collection will include over 50,000 images, a big step up from our current 12,000 online collection, and feature better search and social media sharing capabilities. And in the summer we launch version 2.0 of the Densho Encyclopedia which will include over 1,000 online articles, creating the most up-to-date, comprehensive resource on the World War II Japanese American experience. Behind the scenes, we will be designing and creating new multimedia online courses about the WWII Japanese American experience, digitizing another 100,000 historic photographs and documents, and conducting and digitizing 60 more oral history interviews add to the 770 interviews already available online. 2014 will be a busy year for Densho's staff of 10!

We are inspired to work with urgency because as we create more online materials, we immediately see more people, especially youth, learning and understanding the injustice of what happened to Japanese Americans during World War II. Densho's goal is to keep this story alive so similar mistakes are not made in the future. Our simple strategy is to create compelling, accurate content on the internet and to help millions of people find and use this information.

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Community News and Events Halt Solar Energy Facility next to Manzanar

The Manzanar Committee launched an online petition drive calling on the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP) to halt its efforts to build a proposed Southern Owens Valley Solar Ranch, a 200-megawatt solar energy generating facility that would consist of solar photovoltaic panel modules and associated infrastructure. The approximately 1,200-acre project site would be located on City of Los Angeles-owned property east of the Owens River, but in a direct line of sight with the Manzanar National Historic Site, which lies to the immediate west, in California's Owens Valley.
