From the Director: Tom Ikeda

I just watched an interesting TED Talks by Angela Lee Duckworth whose studies show that a good predictor of success is grit. I was interested in the video because Pete Carroll, the coach of the Seattle Seahawks, talks with Duckworth, saying that he thinks grit is the key to the team's success. Duckworth defines grit as "sticking with your future, day in and day out. Not just for the week, not just for the month, but for years." When I listened to her talk I couldn't help but see the similarities between grit and the Japanese term <code>gambatte</code> and its meaning to do your best and never give up. <code>Gambatte</code> is a word that comes up in our oral history interviews with our Japanese American elders, especially when they talk about dealing with adversity.

Densho aspires to this *gambatte* spirit while it works to keep the Japanese American story alive, knowing the journey will be long and arduous. Densho's production manager, Dana Hoshide, in true *gambatte* spirit, has helped produce 800 interviews totaling over 1,600 hours of video on our website. She has been doing this work for over 16 years, has video-recorded and transcribed most of our interviews, and digitally preserved and indexed all 800 interviews. The quality and quantity of this collection of in-depth, first-person testimonies of the World War II Japanese American experience will keep scholars, writers, students and teachers busy for many generations.

I look forward to seeing many of you at the Sushi & Sake Fest on October 1st at MOHAI. This is Densho's only fundraising event of the year and your support really matters.
