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1. During the W. W. II, J. S. Miwa, through attorney Marumoto, formally entrusted his business to Mr. Nakata, manager of J. S. Miwa Co. at that time. Therefore, my mother made type-written statement repudiating the warrant to Mr. Nakata. Out of the six copies, she will send one to an American consulate in Japan and 4 to Hawaii and will keep one copy at her home in Japan.

2. My sister in Hawaii sent papers for the denial of the warrant to my mother, requiring her to send it to the consulate for the approval.

3. From Hawaii ~~two~~ main questions were sent to Japan to be made clear.

First, whether there is a copy of the American government that it confiscated J. S. Miwa's property.

Second, whether there is a copy which states the specific property that was confiscated item by item.

4. To these first questions my mother has papers sent by the federal government which state the items confiscated.

5. My father sent papers to office of alien property for demanding the return of his property from Japan under the claim number 36891.

6. My father thinks that the assessment of his property confiscated at \$130,000 is greatly underestimated and wishes to have the property reassessed.

7. My father wants to give the warrant formerly given to Mr. Nakata to me, instead of to my sister, Mrs. K. Sato in Hawaii.

8. He also wants to make a will, only to me for the inheritance of the property or money. Is it feasible?

9. Does he have to make another claim to the office of alien property?
10. If I were given the papers of warrant which may be made in Japan, do I have to have it here?
11. If I were given the warrant, should the claim be filed by me again, because I have right to do so and my father is then out of the transaction?
12. About the reassessment of his property.
(a.) Two stores alone may cost \$ 500,000.
(b.) Land, commodities, one house, trucks, autos, cash about \$10,000 are not included in above assessment of the two stores.
(c.) His estimation on property assessment is about one million dollars.
13. Mr. Nakata, the former manager of the stores, may have all the details concerning the auction of stores at \$130,000 in 1949(?) and also the accounts in business transactions.
14. My father thinks that he may be able to have ~~a~~ permit as an international merchant from Japanese govt and come to Hawaii to claim his property return. But, due to his unrecoverable illness which he doesn't know, it is impossible for him to do so.
