## A Call to Action

On April 8th and 9th, Black student organizations across California will come together at Los Angeles City College as fingers on a hand closing into a fist. Then, on April 10th, we will travel in an A/BSSA Freedom Caravan to Sacramento where we will strike a blow for the future of African Americans in the Spring Action 1989 march and rally for educational rights.

The conference will provide an opportunity to strengthen our campus organizations and build unity and coordination between campuses to increase our clout and influence on a statewide level. We will make A/BSSA into a powerful force for change in the 1990s.

This historic weekend will mark the beginning of a new era. The 1990s will be a decade of transition as California prepares to become the first Rainbow state where people of color comprise the majority of the population. At our conference and Spring Action, A/BSSA will send a clear and unmistakable signal that African American students will play a major role in shaping the future of this state.

#### **Our Mission**

**B**lack students have historically been on the cutting edge of social change and progress in this country. A/BSSA comes out of this tradition of struggle. Formed in 1982 to unite Black student organizations across California, A/BSSA's stated mission is "To defend and develop the interests of African American students in academic, professional, and political arenas."

We have sought to carry out our mission by organizing the 7,000 person-strong March on Sacramento for Education in 1987 and the 1988 education conference, "Taking Action for Our Future" which drafted an Education Bill of Rights that we are now trying to make into state law.

We recognize that our generation has been handed the baton for this latest lap in the 400 year African American race for freedom. Let the word go forth that we have accepted the baton and will run with the speed of Jesse Owens, the determination of Rosa Parks, and the endurance of Thurgood Marshall.

The blood of African American people has been shed so that we might have our birthright of a quality education. This country declared it a crime to teach slaves to read, but we are slaves no more. A new era is on the horizon, and we have a dream. It is a dream of an education system where every person has an equal opportunity to learn and grow and develop to their fullest human potential, and where oppressed people can discover the knowledge that leads to power.

We will make this dream a reality by any means necessary.




## **Spring Action**

Young Black America has the talent and potential to treat and cure sick people; to build and design affordable housing; to develop businesses which provide meaningful jobs; and to teach the next generation the truth about the world, this nation, and their people. All we need is the opportunity to obtain the necessary education and training.

The majority of students in the K-12 schools in California are people of color. It is time for education policy and allocation of resources to reflect our needs and concerns. Towards that end, we are working with various state legislators on drafting a higher education reform bill that will remold higher education so that colleges and universities address our issues and speak to our reality.

- We want concrete steps taken to ensure retention and graduation of African American students.
  - Increased funding for student services, especially for Community Colleges.
  - Ethnic Studies graduation requirement.
  - Increased financial aid in the form of grants.
  - Anti-racism clauses in all student conduct codes.
  - Expansion of remedial courses.





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- Increased admission by increasing EOP special admit slots to at least 12 1/2%.
- Graduate school, staff, faculty, administration affirmative action.
- In acknowledgement of the changing demographics of the state, we are demanding accountability and a permanent voice in the State Capitol.
  - State funding for a legislative watch office for A/BSSA, APSU, and MEChA so that we can have our staff people monitor the development of state policy.

On April 10th, we will come from all corners of the state to the Capitol to send notice that is is time for a change. We want thousands of students, coming from every school in the state, to enter the capitol and spread the gospel of higher education reform. Every school should send a delegation to their local legislator and introduce themselves in a way that won't soon be forgotten. In addition, we are demanding a meeting with the Governor (who has the power to veto any bill that we get through the legislature). There, we will challenge him to support our bill and join us in marching forward into the multicultural future.
