Before the war comes to its end, I ^{had written} wrote to
the ~~State Dept.~~ ^{Dept. of State} on March 10, 1945, ^{on April 5, 1945} Dept. of Justice, Immigration
and Naturalization Service, on April 17, 1945, and the
President on ^{September 1,} April 17, 1945 concerning the possibility of
changing my status from ^{the} Japanese ^{subject} to Chinese Formosan.

~~But~~ I did get answers from ~~States Dept.~~ signed
by Mr. Stanton of the State Dept, ^{Edward} Mr. Ennis of the Dept. of Justice,
Mr. ^{Joseph Savoretti} ~~Edward Ennis~~ of Immigration office, but they did not
give me a satisfactory answer. I am still ^{legally} considered
Japanese by ^{your government} U.S.A. even now.

According to the Cairo Declaration, the island of
Formosa will restore back to China, and ~~the~~ war was
over. ~~Therefore~~ I ~~write~~ Therefore I write you once more
to ask you to ^{consider my case so that I might be legally considered} help me to change my status ~~as Chinese~~
by your government ^{as a Chinese during the period while I am waiting for} until I can get the passport
from the Chinese government. the official answer from
the Chinese Gov. ^{for securing} ~~concerning~~ my Chinese passport.

I will deeply appreciate your kind consideration
and help.
