SIX RULES FOR MORALE

- 1. Carefully observe the rules of health so that you may keep mentally and physically alert. Keeping well is a patriotic duty in wartime, for every sick person is a liability and a drag on the national effort. Avoid over-fatigue and emotional tension. Observe periods of occasional rest.
- 2. Engage in constructive work of definite assistance to the national effort. It is dangerous to one's mental peace to be an idler. Do not give up important peacetime work for the glamor of a war job. The work of our social agencies must be continued.
- 3. Commit yourself and your loved ones to God's keeping and trust Him for the outcome. Worry in these matters is far more destructive than overwork.
- 4. Do not listen to or spread unfounded rumors. One of the most stubborn problems of the British authorities has been the occasional spread of the spirit of defeatism, which originates in one community and spreads throughout the nation. That is a service rendered for the enemy.
- 5. Avoid activities and people that tend to produce emotional insecurity and war jitters. Avoid overmuch listening to war bulletins on the radio or reading them in the newspapers. Associate with people who inspire confidence and resolution. Refuse to join in destructive criticism of national leaders, for this is evidence of poor morale.
- 6. Set apart at least ten minutes in the day for waiting upon God and drawing upon His resources of serenity and peace. Base this period of retirement and meditation on a Scripture passage, such as the 37th or the 46th Psalm.
