 - 8th of 10 children of whom 9 survived into adulthood
 - Christian family
- Tainan Presbyterian High School

Christian Faith and Ministry

- Ai Chih Tsai was raised in a devout Christian family
- November 8, 1942 Ordained as Congregational minister in Chicago
- 1942-1944 Pastor, Chicago Church of Christ (Japanese) at the 4th Presbyterian Church <u>A Chinese Leads Japanese</u>

War Years: Service to the U.S.

- As one of very few Formosans in the U.S. before World War II, Ai Chih Tsai had some unique and highly valued skills.
 - Proficient in Taiwanese and Japanese as well as English
 - Familiarity with pre-war Formosa and Japan
- As a result, he was recruited by U.S. Naval and the U.S. War Department for translation, research, map analysis.
