Incidentally, I received a wire from Tomio saying he was accepting a teaching position in the Yale Graduate School, that he was leaving for New Haven, Conn. on the 7th of Oct. He had applied there originally and because he received no reply, went on to Ann Arbor with the 3 others from Yale. He went to Yale alone because he preferred the school and felt that housing

I would appreciate it so much if a copy of my photo could be expedited so I could send it to him. You do understand I'm sure. We can go out to Phoenix only on

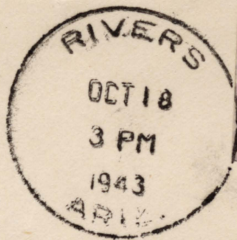
