Thank you very much for your letter of ~~the~~ August 27 reassuring me of my fears that my trip to Japan would prove a handicap in the student relocation project. I have delayed answering you pending further news from Nebraska where I am seeking admission to the graduate college.

This is to inform you that Dr. Goss, Dean of the graduate college there, ~~he~~ has ~~written to me~~ informed me that I shall have met requirements for full admission to the University of Nebraska Graduate College ~~provided~~ if I have the University of California at Los Angeles notify them that I have been granted my bachelor's degree. The transcripts that I had transmitted them did not have that information. ~~I~~ I now have my diploma in my possession, and immediately upon receipt of Dr. Goss's letter, I phoned the U. C. L. A. registrar's office requesting their sending a memo verifying the fact to the University of Nebraska. *verifying the fact.*

As ~~the~~ registration for the fall semester ~~is~~ begins on September 24, I should like to obtain my release as soon as possible.
