



HISTORY

In 1927 a tract known as the Beardsley Site was purchased and the first giant fir fell. As soon as the clearing was large enough, the building was started, and by January 1928 it was ready for occupancy. True, the electric clocks, light fixtures, laboratory equipment, and even many of the seats had not been installed but nevertheless, the building was occupied.

More trees came down and in their place decorative shrubs and a lawn have grown. Gradually the clearing has widened until a smooth and spacious athletic field now lies to the east, garages, and parking space to the north and a play field which boast of a tennis court and also in the near future a miniature golf course lies to the west. To the south stands a donated flag handsome flag, also a gift.

Gradually indoor improvements have been added. The most important of these, the library, with its volumes and current magazines, is furnished with a circular desk and three large reading tables, fully equipped, and fresh water acquarium. The handsome stage curtains, a grand piano, hand instruments, office equipment, an electric range and many up to date features have been furnished.

CONSTITUTION OF THE ASSOCIATED STUDENT BODY OF THE BAIN-BRIDGE HIGH SCHOOL

ARTICLE I Name.

Section 1: The name of the association shall be "The Associated Student Body of the Bainbridge High School."

ARTICLE II. Purpose.

This organization shall exist for the control of any interest or activity which concerns the student body as a whole, helps to promote student welfare, and encourages a high standard of school spirit and citizenship.

ARTICLE III. Membership.

All members of the student body and members of the high school faculty are eligible to membership; but any of these lose membership if the annual dues are not paid as provided in the by-laws.

ARTICLE IV. Officers.

Section 1. The officers of this association shall be a president, a vice-president, a secretary, and a treasurer. Section 2. The student council shall be composed of the above officers and the following: a manager appointed by the faculty, a representative from each class, and two faculty representatives. They shall serve for one year, taking office one week after their election. The council shall have or ect control of all the activities of the association, with the provision that any action taken may be reversed by a two-third vote tt any meetmg of the association. It shall be the business of this body to have general over-sight of all the activities of the association. The principal, by virtue of his position, may exercise final decision on all matters, when in his estimation, the good of the school requires it.

Section 3. The president shall preside at all meetings of the association and the council, but shall not have a vote in the council meetings. He shall call special meetings of either body when he deems it necessary and must arrange for these meetings when five members of either body petition it. He shall be a junior at the time of his election.

Section 4. The vice-president shall assume the duties of the president in case of the latter's absence. He shall be a least someone standing at the time of his election.

Section 5. The secretary shall keep all records of the meetings of the association and of the student council He shall keep on file all reports of the manager and the treasurer and all other papers belonging to the association. He shall have at least Sophomore standing at the time of his election.

Section 6. The treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the association. He shall keep records of all receipts and expenditures and make monthly and annual reports to the council. He shall collect all student fees and special assessments. He shall receive all money acquired by the manager from games and entertain-

ments and give him a receipt in return. All funds must be deposited in a bank within two weeks after their receipt. He shall keep in file, receipts for all expenditures, and submit the same to the council when making a report. His annual report is due at the last meeting of the council before the end of his term of office. He shall have full Junior standing at the time of his election.

Section 7. The manager shall execute the orders of the student council. He shall arrange for the handling of all contests and entertainments. He shall, within three days, turn over to the treasurer, all money he may receive and for all money expended, he shall produce a receipt. He shall have charge of all athletic or other property. of the association and must be responsible for such property. He shall have full Sophomore standing at the time of his appointment.

fection 8. The principal of the high school shall be a representative in the student council

the other faculty representative shall be appointed by the principal-

ARTICLE V. Disbursement of money.

When money is expended by check, the check must be signed by the predent, the treasurer, and the principal. No expenditure is valid unless the council has sanctioned it.

ARTICLE VI. Auditing Committee.

An auditing committee consisting of the president, the manager and the principal shall audit the accounts of the treasurer before he renders his monthly and annual reports to the council. The manager's receipts from the treasurer must agree with the amount of money the treasurer has received. The money received from student fees must correspond with the membership of the association.

ARTICLE VII. Elections.

Section 1. Each class representative shall be elected by the class concerned, sometime during the first three weeks of school.

Section 2 The election of officers of the student body shall be on the third Wednesday before the close of school Voting shall be done by ballot and a plurality shall elect. Nominations for the student council and for class officers are to be made by petition presented to the President of the Association at least two days in advance of an election. Student Body officers are to have ten names on the petition, class officers 5 names. In case more than three students are nomimated, then a second election shall be held on Thursday following the regular election, the three highest shall be candidates, uless one person has a clear majority in the first demonstration of ability.

Section 4. The editor and business manager of the annual school publication shall be nominated by the student council and elected by the association. The editor with the approval of the faculty advisor shall appoint the rest of his staff. Members of the

staff representing certain classes shall be elected by the class concerned.

ARTICLE VIII. Meetings.

Meetings of the association may be called by the president or principal when they deem it advisable.

ARTICLE IX. Recall

Any officer may be recalled by a two-thirds vote of all the members of the association at any regularly called meeting.

ARTICLE X.

One half the members of the association shall constitute a quorum to do business. Seven members of the council shall constitute a quorum, at least on being a faculty representative.

ARTICLE XI. Amendments.

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the association at any regularly called meeting, provided notice of the same, and a statement of the proposed change has been posted one week before.

BY LAWS

ARTICLE I. Rule of Precedure.

Roberts Rules of Order shall govern ail neetings of the ausociation and of the student council.

ARTICLE II. Dues

rection 1. The annual membership fee shall be \$1.00, payable the first month of the school year. This payment admits the student or teacher to all athletic, debating and declamatory contests held under the auspices of the association.

Section 2. No person may represent the school in athletic, debate, oratory, school plays, musical entertainments, act as a student officer, or vote in school elections, without being a member of the association.

Section 3. After the first thirty days of school no money shall be refunded for annual passes.

Section 4. Annual passes may be sold at the beginning of the second semester for 50c to new students only.

ARTICLE III. Emblems.

Section 1. The student council on the recommendation of the coach shall grant emblems to students, who during the school year have taken any part in 1/2 of the interscholastic football games played, 1/2 of the interscholastic basketball games played, 1/2 of the scheduled halves of girls basketball, 1/2 of the interscholastic baseball games played, (pitchers 1/3 of innings). fifteen sets of tennis or the entire schedule, if less than 15 sets, placed in an all-state track meet, or placed in district meet, have won a 2nd place in a county meet, or an average of three points in dual meets, or have represented the school in a debating or oratorical contest.

All athletic emblems shall be of pennant felt.

Section 2. The official football, basketball, baseball and track emblem shall be a blue block "B" six inches high, with a one-fourth inch gold border.

Section 3. The managers emblem shall be a 4 inch standard letter with a ³4 inch gold "M" placed upon the center of the "B".

Section 4. The yell king's letter shall be a 4 inch standard "B" with a megaphone.

ARTICLE IV. Activities.

No student can take part in more than two major activities and minor activity, or one major and three minor activities, or four minor activities, at the same time. Major and minor activities are listed in the Constitution and by-laws of the Honor Society. To take part in these activities, the student must be able to comply with the same eligibility rules that apply is athletics.
