# YE ARE AN EPISTLE

MISS SHOOK

"Ye are an epistle of Christ" II Cor. 3:3  
Paul wrote a great many books which are found in the New Testament. They are called epistles, or letters which would be circulated among the members of a congregation or perhaps put on the bulletin board if they had one. In one of his epistles he likens the Christian to an epistle. The Christian is likewise read by all men.

What do people read when they see you? Do you repel people from the Church? We hear people often say, "I don't go to Church because of so and so." The one who criticizes is reflecting his unconscious feeling of superiority for he is comparing himself with the apparent failings of someone else. He may be likened to the Pharisee in the New Testament. Most people think a Church is a fellowship of saints, but it is a fellowship of those who realize their sins and are humble enough to seek forgiveness and God's help. Perhaps likening it to a fellowship of sinners would be more apropos.

On the other hand, it is an indictment upon us if we become stumbling blocks. Too many of us merely play with religion. Because of our superficiality, our lives are very much like the funny pappers. There is nothing that will grip or challenge others. (Cont. on page four)

Recently arriving from another relocation center, Heart Mountain, came two pleasant personalities Mr. and Mrs. Snider. They were formerly of Greeley, Colorado.

Mr. Snider was with the Y.S. Engineers in Omaha, Nebraska. In August 15, 1944, he and his wife went to Heart Mountain. Mr. Snider was made a Superintendent of Construction and Maintenance. Mrs. Snider taught the First Grade in the Heart Mountain grammar school.

During their nine months stay which they thought was very worth-

while, they shared many happy and pleasant experiences with their evacuee friends. On their departure, they received many beautiful gifts from them.

Mr. and Mrs. Snider arrived here on June 4, 1945 amidst the stifling summer heat. Mr. Snider is now the Assistant Constuction Superintendent. Mrs. Snider was detailed as a nurse's aid and likes hospital work very much.

Mrs. Snider will be helping in the Rec. 26 Sunday school.

They expect to return to Colorado.

Miss E'Lois Shook, Director of United Church Ministry of Seattle, Washington, has been visiting in camp for the past three days. She is here for the purpose of giving information regarding the Hostel in Seattle, and regarding jobs, housing, and many other such questions.

These are some of the questions that have been asked:

1. Are there any jobs in Seattle?

Yes, there are more jobs than can possibly be filled at the present time. There are jobs for both men and women.

2. Are there houses in Seattle, for rent?

Yes, there are houses, but it is very difficult to find them. It is wise for a family, to send a member of their family, to Seattle to find a house before all the family come there to live. It is very hard to locate housing unless someone can come to Seattle and hunt for it.

3. How long can a guest stay in the United Church Hostel?

He may stay as long as three weeks if he needs to do so.

4. Is there any place to store furniture and personal belongings until they can be placed permanently?

Yes, these things can be stored in buildings located by the United Church Ministry.

# ALONG LIFE'S WAY

What would you think if you saw a bank director half way up a telephone pole? Our natural reaction to such a scene would be to conclude that he was a little off beam. Well, that is what you have here in the story of Zacchaeus and Jesus. Two different characters are here portrayed. The one is a seeker and the other a Savior; one is longing for something which the world cannot satisfy, and the other is ever seeking to supply this need. The story of Zacchaeus and Jesus, hence, is a typical Christian experience."

Thus did Mr. Royal Fisher, head of the Protestant Church Commission on Japanese service intersperse a note of challenge and hard thinking into an evening of fun and fellowship. The occasion was our weekly Sunday evening gathering of the Youth Fellowship.

"Something happens when a man meets Jesus," he continued. "We, like Zacchaeus, may be seeking riches, fame, and all the things which this life may offer. But we are not satisfied. Our social relations are not right, our inner nature rebels against each other, and God becomes a meaningless nothing to us. Then when we have reached the end of our efforts to attain satisfaction we hear about Jesus. Perhaps we had heard of him all this time. But we had turned our backs on him. Now comes the realization that life is empty. Then do we seek for Jesus, and surprisingly we find that he has all this time been seeking us. He meets us more than half way.

"This story of Zacchaeus is familiar to all. We picture him as a short man who had to climb a tree in order to see over the heads of the crowd. We also picture him as making restitution to the ones he had wronged, by giving one half of his goods to the poor. In these two pictures we have an illustration of what happens."
