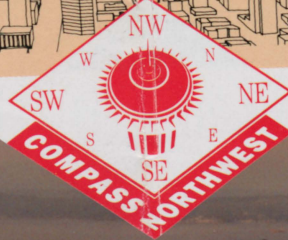
Downtown Seattle

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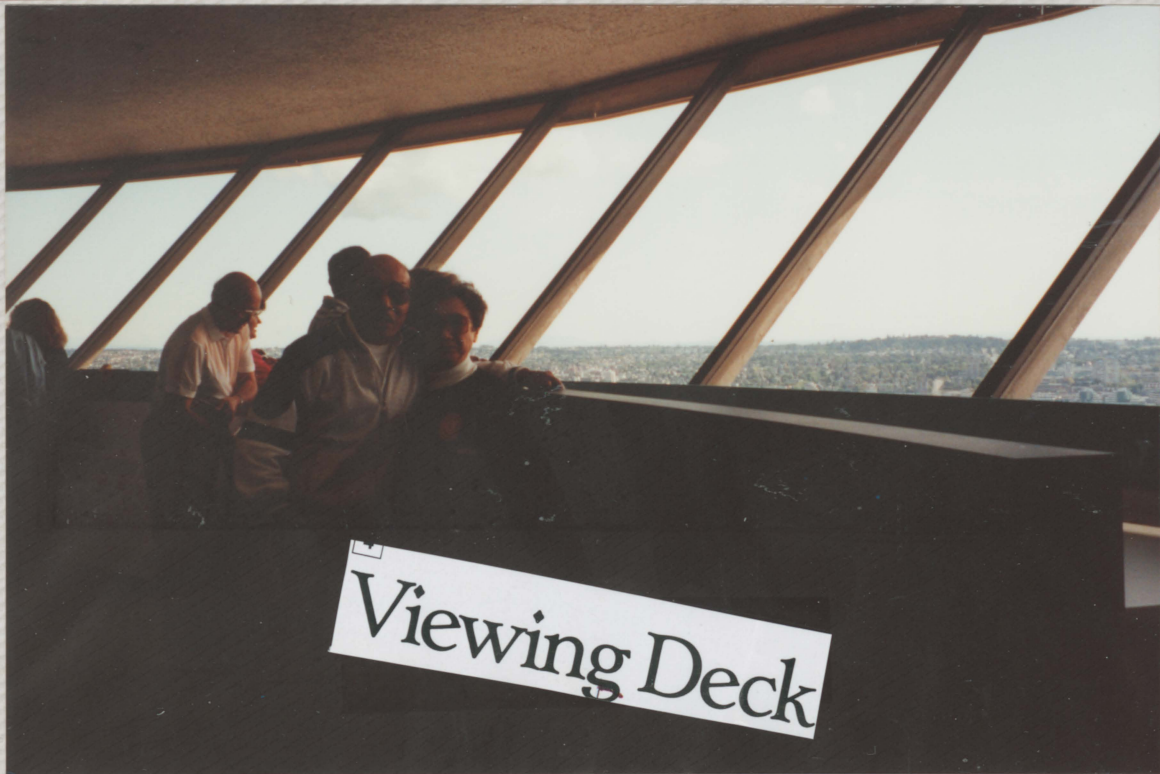

Come here first for the best view in Vancouver. Begin with a thrilling glass-enclosed elevator ride to the circular viewing deck high atop Harbour Centre Tower (553 ft./167 m.).

Oriente yourself to this breathtaking 360 degree view of mountains, ocean and city with the informative photo-fact plaques around the perimeter and the 18 colourful historical displays. Friendly trained tour guides are on hand to answer your questions. Just ask. Admission also includes the multi-image show, "Once In A World, Vancouver." This 12 minute photo-extravaganza highlights the active lifestyle of Vancouver. There are also dinner options on The Lookout!.

Environmentalists take heart when they see how an abandoned rock quarry was transformed into **Queen Elizabeth Park**. With its Rose Garden, Sunken Garden, Arboretum and Quarry Gardens it perches atop Vancouver's highest elevation, Little Mountain, at 33rd and Cambie. Here, the world's first triodetic dome, the Bloedel Conservatory, covers three climate zones, desert, tropical, rainforest, and is home to their indigenous plants and birds. From downtown take Georgia St. to Cambie,



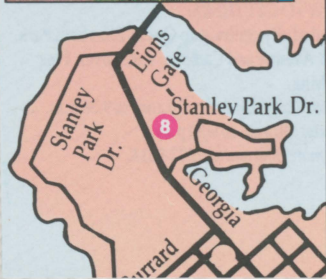


Stanley Park

Welcome to one of the world's great urban parks. In 1888 the first Board of Park Commissioners, the only elected body of its kind in Canada, petitioned the federal government to lease 1,000 acres for public park. In 1889 the peninsula was officially opened and named Stanley Park after Lord Stanley, Governor General of Canada. Today over 800 acres have been maintained as a predominately coniferous forest with the 200 remaining acres developed for recreation purposes. Pitch & Putt golf, tennis, shuffleboard, restaurants, gardens, swimming, a Children's Water



Park, Miniature Railway, Zoo and Aquarium are but highlights of this green oasis. A 5.5 mile seawall pedestrian cycle path encircles Stanley Park and renders breathtaking views of both harbour and mountains. An experience you'll always remember.

Step into another world...amid the noise and frantic pace of the city rests a place like no other. It is as new as this morning's sunrise, as old as civilization.



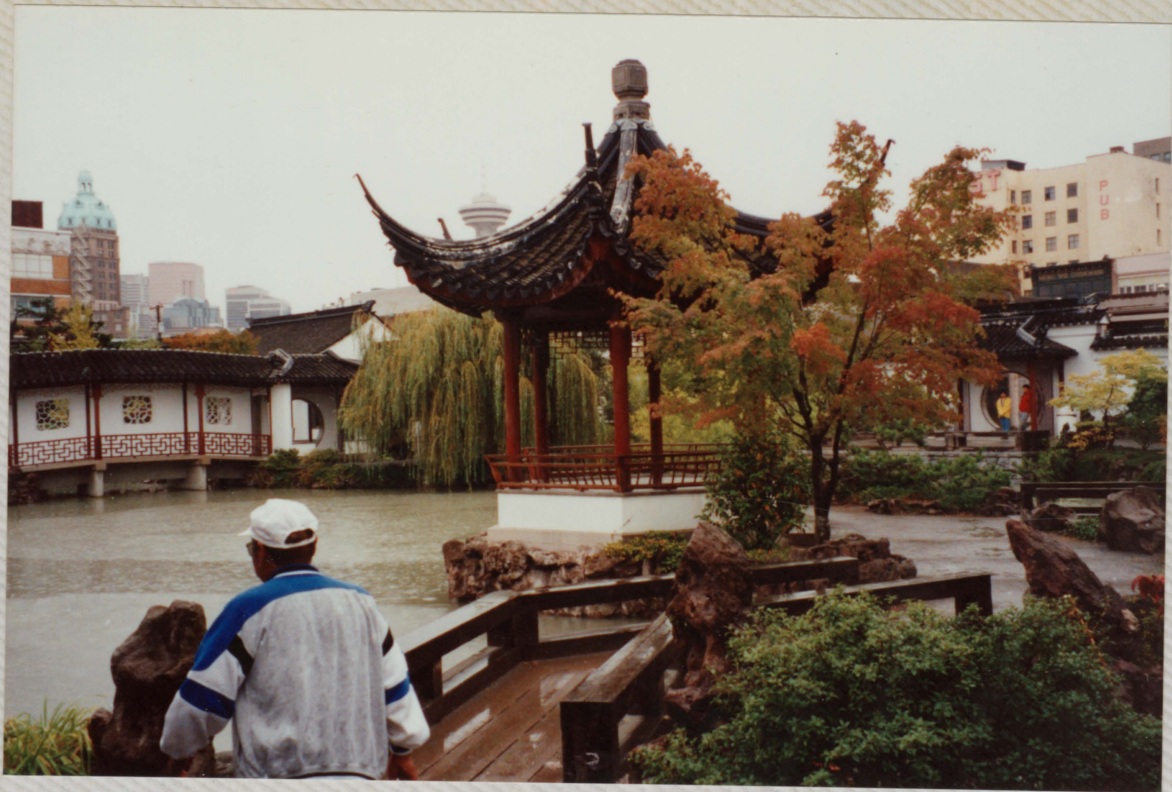
It is the Dr. Sun Yat-Sen Classical Chinese Garden, situated in the heart of Vancouver's Chinatown.

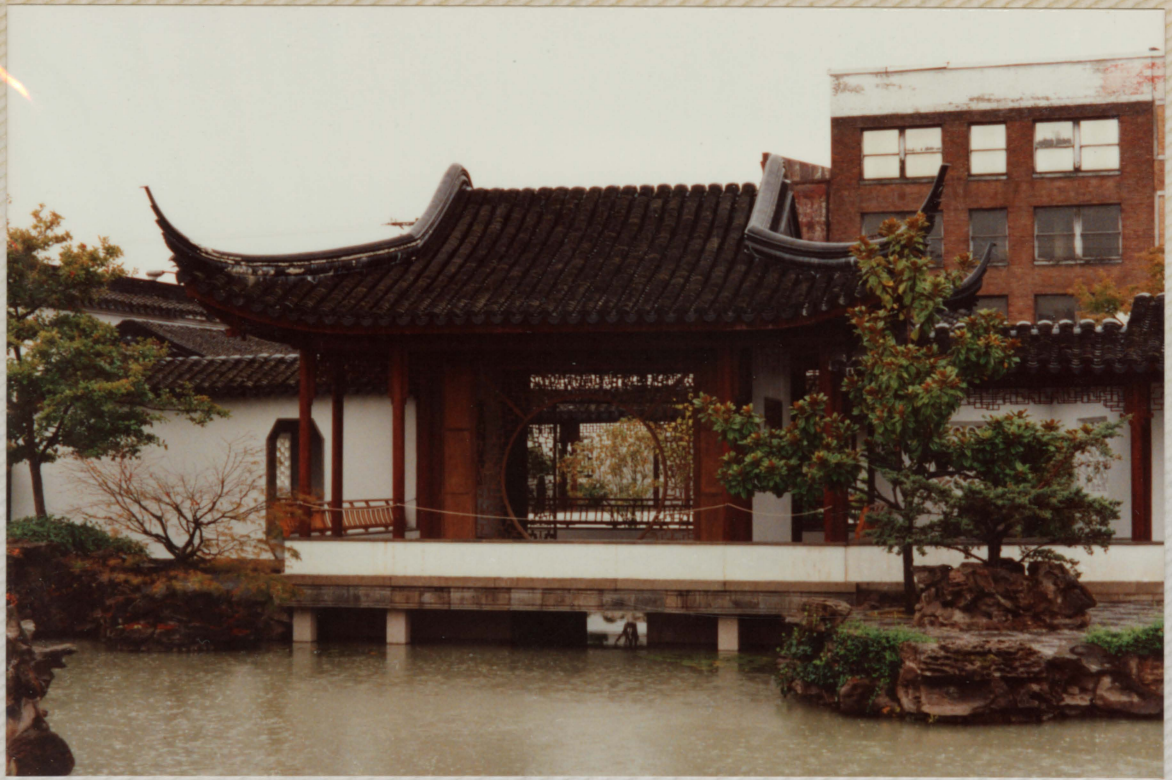
As the first authentic classical Chinese garden ever built outside China, this complete garden of the Ming Dynasty is unique to the modern world. The Garden was shaped by artisans brought to Vancouver from China. Using man-made and treasured natural elements, most of which were imported from Suzhou – the premier garden city of China – these artists worked closely with local consultants to create an extraordinary human interpretation of a natural world.

Building The Garden

The Dr. Sun Yat-Sen Garden is the first full-scale classical garden ever constructed outside of China. Its financing and construction represent a unique co-operative effort between Canada and the People's Republic of China.

The garden is modeled after private classical gardens developed in the City of Suzhou during the Ming Dynasty (1368 -1644).

A 52-man team of experts from the City of Suzhou, under the leadership of master architects, Mr. Wang Zu-Xin and Mr. Fen Xiao Lin spent an entire year constructing the Garden. Working with them were Vancouver architect Joe Wai, and landscape architect, Don Vaughan.

The materials, tools and techniques used in the construction were almost all the same as used centuries ago in the building of the famous Suzhou gardens.

Most of the elements were shipped from China in more than 950 crates containing the architectural components – hand-fired roof tiles, carved woodwork, lattice windows, the limestone rocks, and even the courtyard pebbles.

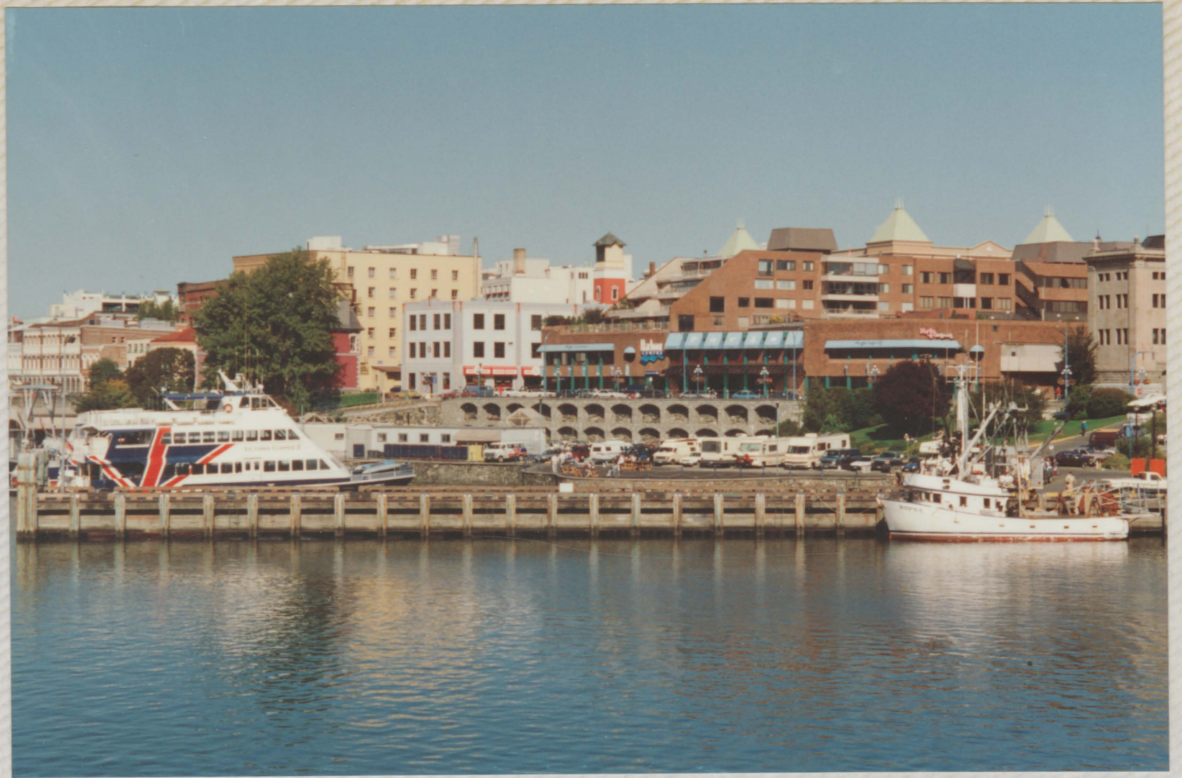


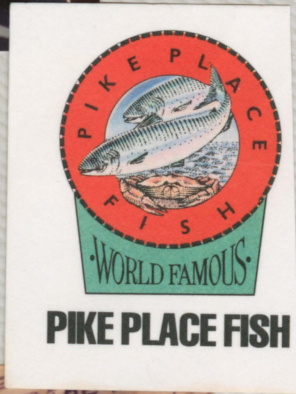












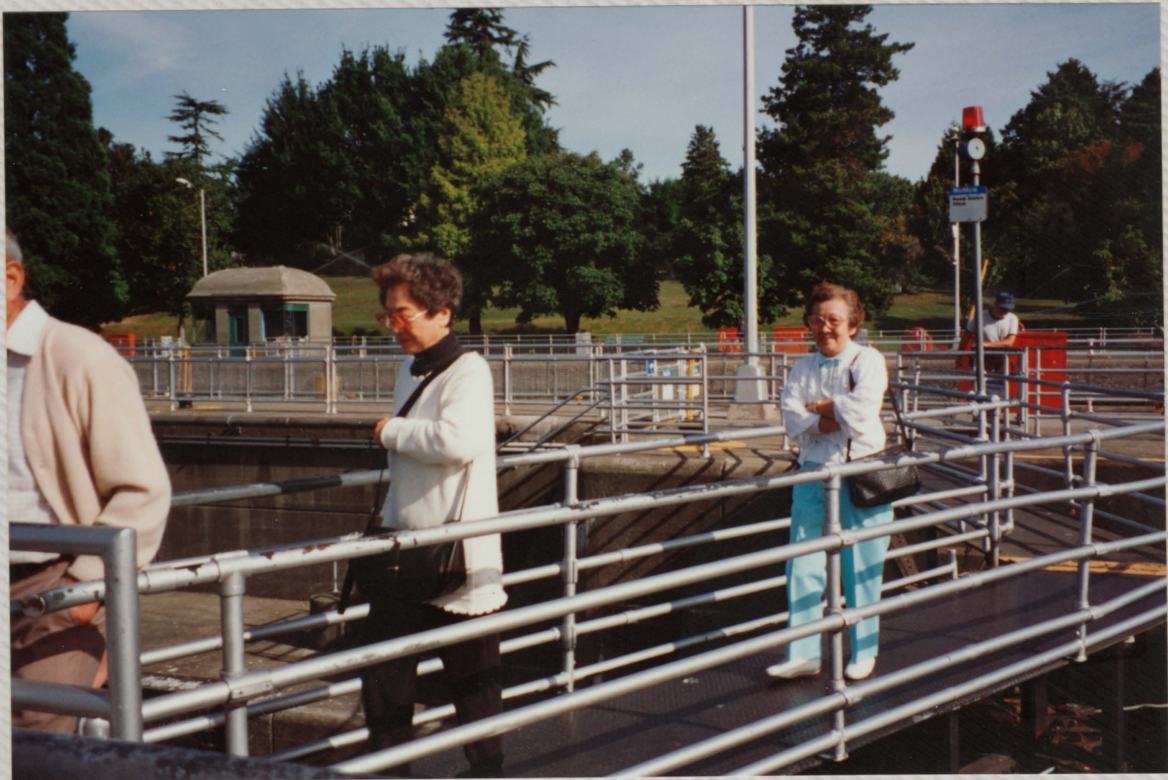

Mount St. Helens and the Pacific Ring of Fire

For two months in the spring of 1980 the earth trembled and ash plumes streaked the snow-white volcano gray. Extreme pressure built inside the mountain as molten rock beneath the earth pushed toward the surface, causing the north slope to bulge outward. The volcano was relatively calm until 8:32 a.m. on May 18, when Mount St. Helens exploded in a turbulent eruption. This eruption awakened many people with a message from the earth—our planet is alive and is in a continual state of change.

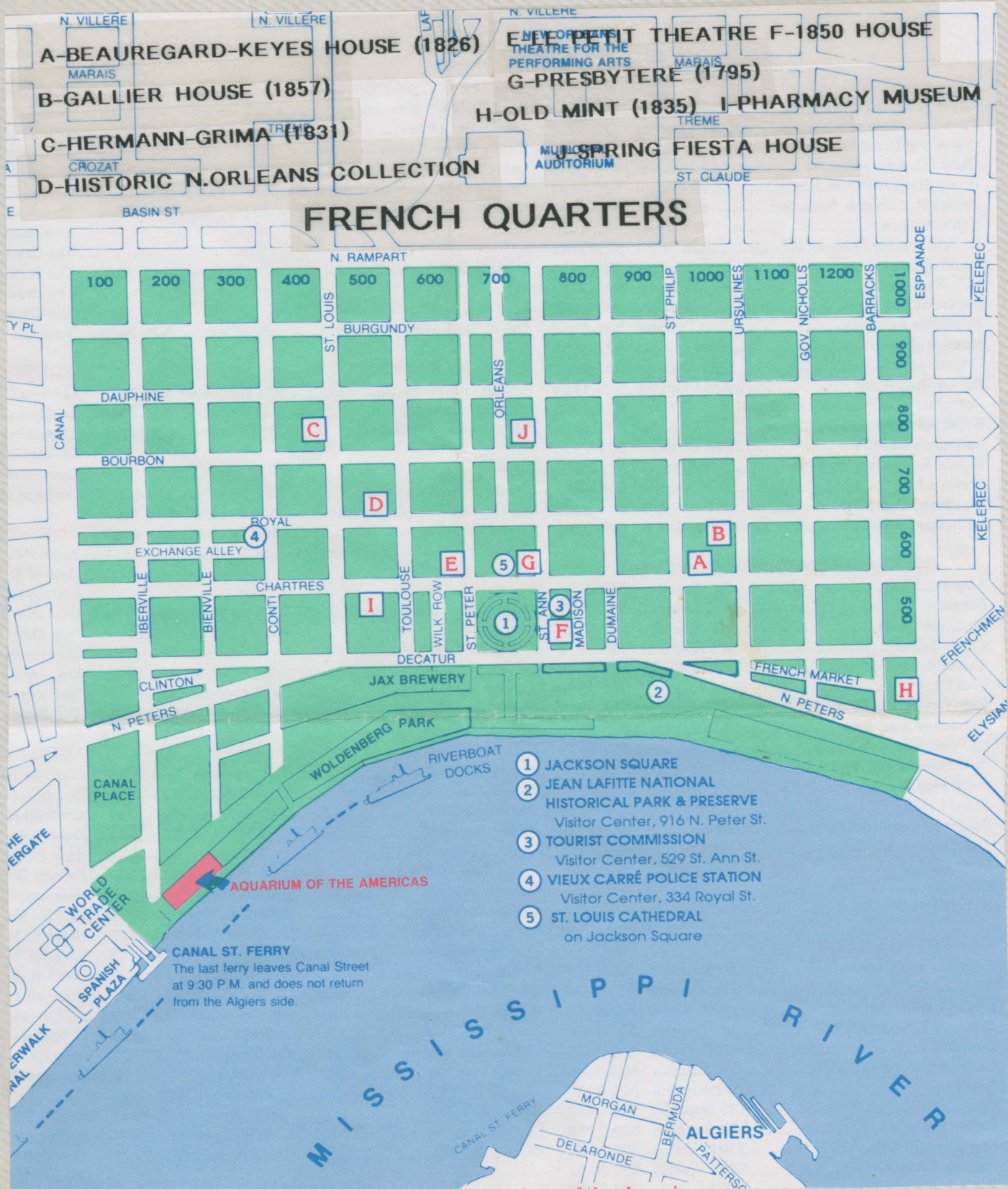
