Dear Mom and Pop,

I'm back in camp! We had notice yesterday around 6:00 PM to break camp and leave for camp by bus. We were glad to get back but there was a catch to it. You know how the Germans have been pushing the US Army back in France. Well, they seem to need more men and our company has been alerted. All the other companies near us are too. We came back and unpacked and right now we're getting ready for bed. As it stands now I don't know whether I'm going to be shipped with the others or not. If we leave, we'll be probably going next week to our port of embarkation. At any rate, I'll keep writing to us as long as I can. Please don't worry too much about me because I know I'll be OK.

Oh, yes, we don't know if we'll get a emergency furlough or not. The chances are pretty good that we may get one. If I don't get one, that

means I'm not going with the others. I
hope I get a furlough, but, later on!
One way or the other don't worry because
right now I don't even know if I'm going
or not. I'll keep writing to you every
day, if I can, to let you know what
the situation is.

I'm going to sleep now, so until
tonight (it's about 2:00 A.M. now) —
