Dear Mom and Pop

Well, here I am again. Today is a day of rest so I slept late and got up late. In the Army 8:00 AM seems pretty late because during the week days we get up at 5:30 AM. At the present I'm in bed, eating crackers and reading a magazine. You said that you would send me magazines if I needed any, but that isn't necessary. I can get all the magazines I want at the PX. That goes for food too. If I go to the Service Club, which is open all the time, I can even buy a dinner.

It's still morning so there isn't much to write about. I'll finish this letter tonight. We're going to take the bus and go over to the main PX this afternoon. It's around 2½ miles away. The main gate is around 3 miles from our cabin. Pretty big eh?

By the way, those slippers you sent me are sure nice. Everyone envies me.



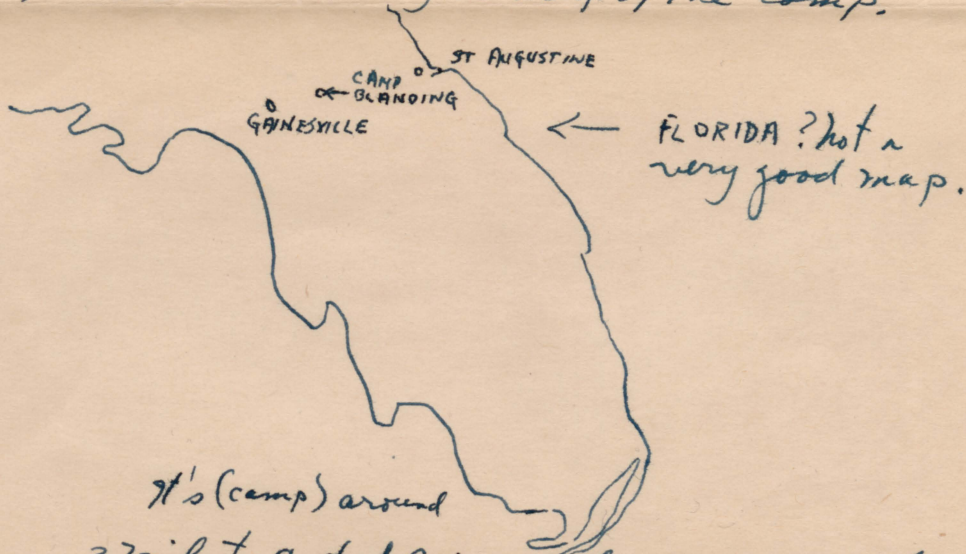

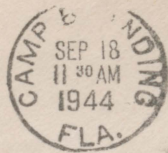
