D. article exceed \$200; however indemnity protection (against loss, rifling, or damage) in excess of \$200, can be procured by the prepayment of combination C. O. D. PREFERRED SERVICE FEATURES

Fees in Addition to Regular Postage

Special Delivery (First Class Mail ONLY)—up to 2lbs.10c; 2 to 10lbs 20c; over 10 lbs., 25c.

Special Delivery (2nd, 3rd and 4th Class Mail). Expeditious dispatch, transportation same as first class mail, INCLUDING IMMEDIATE DELIVERY—up to 2 lbs. 15c; 2 to 10lbs. 25c; over 10lbs. 35c.

Special Handling (Fourth Class Mail only) Expeditious dispatch transportation and delivery same as first class, but DOES NOT include Special Delivery up to 2 lbs., 10c; 2 to 10lbs., 15c; over 10lbs. 20c.

Mark envelopes or wrappers "Special Delivery" or "Special Handling", as the case may be, and add below an inscription to indicate the fee paid for the special service, in this manner: "Fee Paid...cents".

Use distinctive "Special Delivery" or "Special Handling" stamps if obtainable.

AIR MAIL

Domestic Air Mail postage rate is 6c for each ounce or fraction thereof, regardless of distance or routing. This figure includes all transportation to and from the various routes. All Air Mail may be sent Special Delivery.

Weight limit 70 lbs. and size limit 100 inches in length and girth combined.

In order that Air Mail may be quickly recognized and identified the P. O. Department urges the use of distinctive Air Mail stamps, and distinctive Air Mail envelopes (with horizontal red white and blue stripes or alternate red, white and blue parallelogram borders) or similarly striped labels.

If ordinary envelopes are used, it is recommended that two horizontal blue lines be drawn across the envelope, not less than $1\frac{1}{8}$ inch from the top. Envelopes must be prominently marked "VIA AIR MAIL"; parcels, in addition, must be sealed, although the latter may be sent as Insured or C. O. D. if otherwise conforming to third or fourth class requirements. All Air Mail may be registered.

FOREIGN MAIL MATTER LETTER AND CARD POSTAGE

LETTERS: 3 cents per ounce or fraction thereof. **POST CARDS:** Single 1 cent; double 2 cents to the following:

Alaska, Canal Zone, Guam (U. S. Samoa) Hawaii, Territory of Manua (U. S. Samoa), Phillipine Islands, Porto Rico, Samoa, U. S., St. Croix, St. Thomas, Tutuila (U. S. Samoa), U. S. Naval Hosp., Yokohoma, Japan, Virgin Isl., U. S.

LETTERS: 3 cents per ounce or fraction thereof. **POST CARDS:** Single 2 cents; double 4 cents to the following:

Alhucemas Isl., Andorra, Argentina, Balearic Islands, Bolivia, Brazil, Canada, Canary Islands, Ceuta, Chafarinas or Zafarani Isl., Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, Rep. of Labrador, Melilla, Mexico, Morocco (Spanish Zone), Newfoundland, Nicaragua, Panama, Rep. of Paraguay, Penon De Velez De La Gomera, Peru, Rio de Oro, Salvador, El. Spain and certain Spanish possessions, Tangler, Spanish Guinea, Uruguay, Venezuela, Zafarina Island.

LETTERS: 5 cents first ounce or fraction thereof, 3 cents each additional ounce or fraction thereof. **POST CARDS:** Single 3 cents, double 6 cents to all countries not listed above.

(Note: Picture and souvenir post cards without a message other than a greeting of not more than 5 words, may be sent at the printed matter rate of $1\frac{1}{2}$ c for each 2 ounces in the foreign mails).

Registration: Applicable if desired to all letters and articles in the regular mails to all foreign countries (parcel post registrations restricted in some instances).

International (Foreign) Parcel Post—(See your Postmaster).

Special Delivery: Fee 20 cents in addition to full regular postage to the following countries: Argentina, Australia, Bahamas, Belgium, Brazil, British Guiana, British Honduras (Belize only), Chile, China, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, Cyprus, Danzig, Denmark, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, (Quito & Guayaquil only), Egypt, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Gibraltar, Gold Coast Colony, Gr't Britain, Guatemala, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, including Libya, (Tripolitania & Cyrenaica), Etria & Somaliland, Japan Kenya & Uganda, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxemburg, Mexico, Morocco (Spanish), Netherlands, Northern Ireland, Norway, Nyasland Protectorate, Palestine, Panama, Poland, Portugal, St. Pierre & Miquelon, Sweden, Switzerland, Trans Jordan, and Union of South Africa. The (French) word "EXPRESS" should be boldly marked in red ink directly below (but never on) the stamp. Special Delivery may also be applied to Canada and Newfoundland (including Laborador) (Certain places) but it is permitted only on letters, whereas to the other foreign countries mentioned above it may be used on all regular mails, excepting parcel post. Special Delivery fees on Canada up to 2 lbs. 10c, over 2 lbs. up to 10 lbs. 20c, over 10 lbs. 25c.

We go home in time to eat a good supper at the Scholla's & then home to bed. But not to bed as one 'cause I had to compare notes with the other kids & take a hot bath.

Monday, February 16, 1942

47th Day—318 Days to Follow

It suddenly occurred to me that Helen might have gone to Co. O. Meeting yesterday expecting to find me. As I stopped by her house after work. They were getting dinner for another friend of hers & insisted that I stay & join 'em. It was well being there again & we had a great time playing with clay & chatters.

When I got home Esther & I laid plans for the F. O. O. banquet for evening for which we'll try to get the cats together.

The banquet seemed to be quite successful. I quit work a bit early to shop, & then could get here till after five, at which time Esther had things well in hand. Merv, Mollie & Lucia helped. The boys helped with the dishes. Emmett going as it like a good fellow. And we had a very good meeting following. Jensen giving an excellent talk. The kids had a long session trying to figure out plans for going southward tomorrow.

Saturday, February 21, 1942

52nd Day—313 Days to Follow

Emmett & Jackie Wieland met me at the office at 1:30 & we picked up Rose Marie, setting forth about 1:30. We stopped in Puyallup to pick up things for Dick and it must have been almost 8:00 when we got home.

The kids were a bit bashful at meeting my friends, and didn't refer enthusiastically to meet me, as usual. But I was greeted by the usual fond embraces.

Jackie works at the bank where Emmett used to work & likes to bring up "gossip" she's heard. They paid for her to be sure to breeze him till the "Three Bears" story & Emmett was prevailed upon this evening.

The "Gyrist" surgeon awfully cute. Alice tried sleeping on the floor in Rose Marie's sleeping bag but gave up & crawled in with Laura & me before the night was done.

Laura says she likes all my friends - but Emmett best of all.

Sunday, February 22, 1942

53rd Day—312 Days to Follow

Washington's Birthday

I got so hot & stuffed up last night I could hardly sleep. Paul & his fear of fresh air makes me appreciate my coat & ainy cabin - quite of getting up in the cold.

We didn't start for Cascade Lake as soon as we should have. So Tuesday dinner was when we arrived. & the kids had gone off to the mountains already. And me with their sties!

stricken. Says, after all,

147th Day—218 Days to Follow

Had such a time starting
my car that I took it back
Mr. Johnson. As an experiment

me to go lunch with the gang
then I couldn't get my car
started. Various men tried
help me push it - to no avail.
Finally one man found the coil
was not wrong! I got out now.

Had picked up a cratere & plan
to take to a family in Woodinville.
By the time I got there, it was
too late for further calls, alas.

Arrived home about 4:30
found that Al Orcutt had arrived
with David Stewart. Emmet
was coming over to see & then
we were to dig. We all got
invited to the Schmas to dine
no digging was done.

Carl arrived from Parama!
I'd seen Carl about a wedding
then took us - about 11 - plotting
around town in the old truck,
after which Emmett went home.
The rest of us sat in Jerry's lab
telling gipse stories - an' stuff
till after 1:00.

Friday, May 29, 1942

149th Day—216 Days to Follow

Young Friends began
guffing from the sublime
to the ridiculous. Tom, sitting
next to me, was dreadfully
amused wase of the time,

was to repose on conference
minutes it was announced

Saturday, May 30, 1942

Such a time with our fishing trip. Memorial Day Emmett camp for me earlier than I'd expected. Not quite now. Went quite early & dashed around like mad. When we got to Joe's, his car wasn't fixed yet & I & Chuck went off words and when we started to go, starter locked! After rocking pushing for a time we finally pushed it to a garage.

To camp Mason at last. After gobbling some stew we set forth into the stream. Chuck fell clear in; Joe got a little well, even with hip boots; got my feet soaked to the ankles. Emmett got wet & ended by wading up to his knees (shoes & water lying) with me on his back. Just as we pulled in something was said that disturbed me greatly. Luckily fishing gives time for recuperation & as I got my equilibrium.

Sunday, May 31, 1942

151st Day—214 Days to Follow

Jo & Chuck got some tips
fishing at the log jam —
we spent there this time,
the sleeping kinda late &
eating a heavy breakfast. The
sp got up first & threatened to
be in a drag we got out —
after many hours of
fruitless fishing, Jo & Chuck
each caught a tiny rainbow
out. Chuck fell in again;
Mummet kept having to get
in well above his knees to
manag the hook, (poor old doc)
the boys both lose their tips;
Mummet lose his salmon egg!
numerous hooks & leaders were
lost. But it was fun.

I developed a headache,
so bed will feel good.

Monday, June 1, 1942

152nd Day—213 Days to Follow

Visited our pepe Woodinville
again. I was hungry when
D. offered me lunch & I couldn't
refuse. The most tasty peaches,

Finished my letter to
Gordie & wrote to Sib, between
visits from Barbara & Ruthanna.
They were praying me
"serial calls" and acting
out plays.

Tuesday, June 2, 1942

153rd Day—212 Days to Follow

~~I had supper at the school.~~
I have to leave tomorrow
for Santa Ana! Why in
the world can't they give
me notice!?

Went to Stoller tonight
to have my final retainer
made.

Wednesday, June 3, 1942

154th Day—211 Days to Follow

Started out this morning only to find I had a flat tire. On the river! Inez, Emmett & I couldn't even get it pumped up enough to take to a garage, I left it on the side of the road. Decided to go to the office, not visit you a ride in with a neighbor. About 1 1/2 hrs late - and with all I have to do!

Got my retainer tonight. Emmett picked me up at the clinic. We were going to see at my place, but when we stopped, an Emmett's mother Scholl asked us to stay & I decided I shouldn't risk my life with her case by the night. I or Ted wasn't feeling well when he left.

Emmett parked my tire & we were to see about getting some from Schmirer - too big, the So Dutch Harbor was bombed! The plot thickens with this, Ted gone, there was quite a feud over the Scholl household.
