

CAFE MAN LOSES \$500 TO ROBBERS

Three men, one of them armed with a sawed-off shotgun, robbed A. B. Charpentier, 302 E. 44th St., of \$500 as he was leaving a restaurant he manages at Airport Way and Lucile Street last night. Charpentier said the men had removed wiring from his automobile, parked behind the restaurant, and approached him after he had attempted for ten minutes to get the motor started.

One of the men threatened him with a sawed-off shotgun while the others searched him and took receipts from the restaurant, totaling about \$500. The men fled into the darkness of a nearby railroad yard, he said.

Teacher With Ear Muffs In Traffic Chase

With a pair of ear muffs clamped on her head, Mrs. La Rosa C. Bechler, 52-year-old teacher at the Leschi School, was pursued three blocks by two city detectives in a police automobile with its siren screaming after her automobile collided with the police vehicle last night.

Mrs. Bechler, who said she didn't hear the siren because of the ear muffs, and had not known her car had been involved in a collision, was charged with hit-and-run and reckless driving, and driving without a driver's license. She said she was wearing the ear muffs because she recently underwent a mastoid operation. The teacher was arrested by Traffic Investigator R. D. Rayburn after her car collided with the detective's auto, parked at Eastlake Avenue and Lynn Street about 7 o'clock last night. In the police car were Detective Lieutenants Paul G. Butler and F. A. Heslop. Butler said he just was setting out of the machine when he saw the Bechler automobile approaching. He said he jumped back into the police machine, but could not get the door closed before the car was sidwiped.

SOLONS TO PROBE SALE OF WINERIES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Senate attention today turned to charges by Chairman Van Nuys, Democrat, Indiana, of the liquor-shortage investigating committee that whiskey monopolies are seeking "to take over control of the beer and wine business." Van Nuys ordered a new public hearing Thursday to hear Edward W. Wooten, executive secretary of the Wine Institute of California.

"Our information," said the chairman, "is that Seagrams, National Distillers, Hiram Walker and Schenley's have been buying up vineyards and vintners' establishments as well as breweries. The big four already control most of the liquor and the distilleries in this country. They are concentrating on controlling everything. "We expect to develop that they have forced the price of wines steadily higher by selling it in fifth where wine formerly was sold in gallon jugs." Van Nuys said the committee also will inquire of the Office of Defense Transportation whether "there have been exorbitant allowances of alcohol for anti-freeze despite the number of automobiles that have left the highways."

Navy Plans Shore-Station Survey to Fill Ship Crews

Under the direction of an executive committee headed by Capt. H. M. SIX PEDESTRIANS HURT IN TRAFFIC

Six pedestrians were injured last night and this forenoon in traffic accidents in Seattle streets. Taken to Harborview County Hospital with critical head injuries were Greenville Smith, 65 years old, 1427 16th Ave., and Fred Woodhead, 66, of 1714 N. 35th St., who were struck at 11:50 o'clock last night at First Avenue South and Lander Street by an automobile driven by Lawrence E. Duffy, Jr., 28, of Seahurst. John Gronbert, 62, of 6737 Sycamore Ave., suffered a fractured shoulder when he was struck at Ninth Avenue South and Jackson Street.

Others injured were H. A. Bronson, 13628 86th Ave. S., and Robert M. Kearns, 924 19th Ave. S. Both were taken to Harborview with cuts and bruises. Apparently a hit-run victim, a Navy sailor was found unconscious in the street at Ninth Avenue and Harrison Street about 6 o'clock this morning. Theodore H. Arklis, 59, a fisherman, 9201 Sixth Ave. N. W., suffered a leg fracture when his automobile struck a utility pole at Ballard Way and 17th Avenue Northwest yesterday afternoon.

COUNCIL RAISE TO GO ON BALLOT

The City Council voted, 8 to 1, today to put a proposed charter amendment on the March 14 municipal ballot that would increase the salaries of all elective officials except the mayor. The lone vote against the plan was cast by Mrs. F. F. Powell, councilwoman. "I'm not in disagreement with an increased salary for councilmen and other city officials," Mrs. Powell told the Council, "but I just don't believe this is the proper time to ask for it."

If the proposition is approved by the voters, it will raise council salaries from \$3,000 to \$4,800 a year, and boost the pay of the city comptroller, treasurer and corporation counsel to \$6,000 annually. The only officials who could be affected this year are the three councilmen and the corporation counsel to be elected, since law prohibits a change in compensation during an official's term.

Eccles Again Nominated For Federal Bank

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Marriner S. Eccles, chairman of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, was nominated by President Roosevelt today for another 14-year term of membership on the board. Abe Fortas was formally nominated to resume his post as under-secretary of the interior. Fortas resigned that position last year to enter the Navy. After a medical discharge, the President gave him a recess appointment to his old position. Other nominations sent to the Senate included: Ewell K. Jett of Maryland to be a member of the Federal Communications Commission for a 7-year term. Harry H. Schwartz of Wyoming, for reappointment as a member of the National Mediation Board for a term expiring February 1, 1947. John Campbell White of New York, now ambassador to Haiti, to be ambassador to Peru.

O. P. A. Merit Award NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—(AP)—An Office of Price Administration investigator received a merit diploma from Washington for "initiative and ingenuity in a direct contribution to the vital work of a war agency." His contribution: A suggestion that the Roman numeral II be substituted for the Arabic 2 on all future O. P. A. regional price regulations.

munities have been under the impression that Reinschreiber now is held in military custody near Bremerton, to keep him available for questioning in connection with the Bowman case. Army officials revealed today, however, that Reinschreiber actually is on restriction merely because he was found "out of uniform" while off duty on a recent visit to Seattle. "Benny was wearing a field jacket off duty when he was on furlough in Seattle," said one of Reinschreiber's superiors. The officer explained that the restriction will be brief, since the infraction is only minor and means principally that the 225-pound Army private may not immediately obtain any kind of leave. Observers in Bremerton pointed out today also that Reinschreiber never has been technically paroled to the Army since his release from the Kitsap County jail, but was paroled by Judge Sutton through the sheriff's office. Reinschreiber's superiors said the bulky soldier is on duty with his battery in the 39th Anti-Aircraft Artillery Brigade. He is not in confinement and, unless conditions warrant such confinement, might even be eligible for short furlough again if his "good conduct" permits. Despite assurance that the Army will cooperate with civilian authorities, Prosecutor Cohen still refused to make any request for return of the soldier to civilian authority to serve the rest of his sentence.
