

### MEDALS AWARDED NISEI IN ITALY

ANZIO BEACHHEAD, May 5.—(Delayed)—A lot of daffodils, freshly picked from an abandoned Italian garden, hung on the faded G. I. combat jacket of the stocky little sergeant. The sergeant was humming "Kuu Ipo Aloha"—farewell sweetheart.

In the smoky, sandbagged dug-out you could almost imagine that the distant crump of German mortars was the surf breaking on a coral reef.

Shuffling in past the blanket front door came two soldiers from a night's outpost guard to present themselves by request to Lieut. Col. Gordon Singler, Denver.

"For gallantry in action," reads the citation which the tall West Pointer with a proud smile handed to Sgt. Melvin Tesuda of Honolulu and Pfc. Kazunobu Yamamoto of Pahoa, winners of the Silver Star.

**Heroism Is Common**

One of them continued to lay a telephone wire while a German machine gun killed three men beside him. The other stayed with his mortar although wounded and fought off charging enemy infantry.

Heroism is a common commodity in the doughboy outfit known to the Territory of Hawaii as "one puka puka," in which all the enlisted men and more than half the officers are of Japanese descent and have the slogan, "Remember Pearl Harbor."

Besppectacled Lieut. Young Kim, 24, Los Angeles, has kept the record of such things since Japanese-Americans started fighting with the Fifth Army in Italy last September. The record is figuratively written in blood. Three Distinguished Service Crosses, 21 Bronze Stars, 36 Silver Stars and 900 Purple Hearts.

**Many Posthumous Awards**

Kim, who also has the Silver Star, points out that 900 wounded is indicative, in an outfit sent four times across the Volturno River and once into Cassino. A large share of awards, in fact, were made posthumously.

The Japanese-Americans don't put it into words, but you feel that they no longer feel it necessary to prove their patriotism. Generals have commended them honestly. They have gone through the infantrymen's hell and come out unshaken.

### Mother Gets Children Back; Police Hold Tots Overnight

Four small children of blonde, 25-year-old Mrs. Richard Brown, who were taken from the family home by police last night while the Browns were at a movie, were returned to the mother today, after she explained she had been "in the business" of caring for youngsters for 20 years.

The youngsters, Delores, 4; Jack, 3; and Danny, 2, were kept overnight at the Juvenile Detention Home, and Judy, 5 months, at Harborview County Hospital, after neighbors complained to police the youngsters were unattended and crying in the Browns' flat at 436 22nd Ave. S., about 9 o'clock last night.

Indignant over the disappearance of her children and the "interference of neighbors in her family affairs," Mrs. Brown appeared at Police Headquarters about 7:15 o'clock this forenoon demanding return of her children. After she made an explanation to members of the women's protective division of the Police Department, her children were released to her custody.

"We came home from the movie and got home about 10 o'clock last night," Mrs. Brown said today. "And when my husband went into the bedroom and said the children were gone, I wouldn't believe him. I thought he was kidding."

"I had paid a neighbor to take care of them. I often have made that arrangement. She was supposed to come down every half hour and see if they were all right.

### P-39 Fighter Plane Falls in Portland

PORTLAND, Or., May 8.—Second Lieut. Henry E. Clark of Lakeville, Conn., pilot of a P-39 fighter plane was killed Sunday when his ship dropped out of a four-plane formation and hurtled into a vacant lot in the midst of a residential section here.

Some witnesses said the plane crash-landed with the motor off, and expressed belief the pilot chose the vacant lot deliberately to avoid danger to others. There was no fire.

### BOATING MISHAPS TAKE TWO LIVES

Leonard Pederson, 53 years old, halibut fisherman who resided at 5334 Seventh Ave. N. E., was drowned at Lake Roessiger, Snohomish County, Saturday night, the Associated Press reported today.

Mrs. Pederson and their son, Leonard, Jr., were fishing in a different section of the lake when the craft bearing Pederson and Arnt Jacobson, also of Seattle, overturned. The four had gone to the lake Saturday on a fishing expedition, and just had rowed onto the lake when the accident occurred, Mrs. Pederson said today.

Sheriff Ray Ryan of Snohomish County reported the body has not yet been recovered.

In addition to his widow and son, Pederson is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Betty Jane Holmes and Mrs. Lorraine Olsen, both of Seattle.

Owen Elliott Harlin, 30 years old, father of two children, drowned yesterday morning in Puget Sound near his home at 1734 Alki Ave., when a small skiff capsized as he and a companion were rowing to a fishing boat anchored offshore.

Harlin's wife and mother-in-law were watching from shore.

While his companion, Lief Wormdahl, 29, of 1511 E. 123rd St., clung to the overturned dory, Harlin went down as he attempted to swim 50 yards from the overturned craft to the fishing boat.

Wormdahl was rescued by coast-guardmen who were summoned by the wife, Benelda, and her mother, Mrs. B. F. Dean, shortly after the two men were plunged into the water, about 4 o'clock in the morning.

Surviving, besides the widow, are two daughters, Joan, 9, and Janet, 7, who were asleep at the time of the tragedy, and three brothers, Jack, Robert and Wallace Harlin.

Two men were saved from drowning in Lake Union yesterday afternoon when their rowboat overturned offshore from the home of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Heather, 1811 Fairview Ave. N.

The men, Robert McClung and Herman Larsen, 1292 Westlake Ave. N., were rescued by Mr. and Mrs. Heather in their launch and turned over to a Coast Guard patrol boat.

### ROAMING BOY, U. S. SUBMITS BURGLARS TAKEN WARD ARGUMENT

Two teen-age youths were captured shortly after midnight Saturday by King County deputy sheriffs after a four-day carer of burglary which saw them touring most of King County in a stolen auto, Sheriff Harlan S. Calahan announced today.

After being held over night in the Renton jail, the two youths, 18 and 16 years old, were being questioned today by Assistant Sheriff William J. Williams and Sheriff's Captain Wesley N. Miller.

The two youths, whose home is in Lake City, admitted stealing a car in Pike Street, Seattle, Wednesday night. They obtained gasoline from government trucks parked at High Point, near Preston.

Thursday night, they told deputy sheriffs, they broke into a service station at Kenmore, stealing \$30 in cash, a pair of gloves and a radio. Early that same morning, they broke into a lumber company in Bothell and two obthell service stations and an obthell feed store, but obtained little loot.

Returning to High Point, for more gasoline, they entered the office of an auto camp at High Point, stealing four cartons of cigarettes, a radio which they sold for \$12, and 45 pounds of sugar which they sold to a Duvall farmer for \$3.

The boys said they had a .22-caliber rifle, which they said they had taken along to shoot crows. They said they drove around until Saturday night at which time they fell asleep in their car in the Renton Highlands project. It was there they were discovered by Deputy Sheriff Ed L. Morris and Asst. P. Merlino. The youths are being held in the county jail.

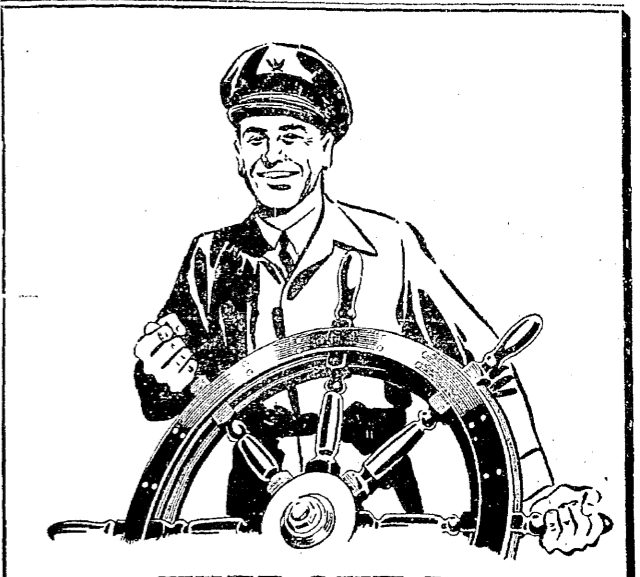
**Longview Trucker Killed**

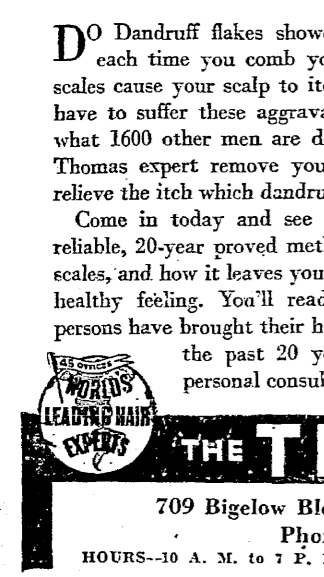
