

# 'GOOD ROADS' PLAN APPROVED

The proposed "good-roads" amendment to the state Constitution, which forbids diversion of any of the motor-vehicle fund to any purpose except construction and maintenance of streets and highways, was endorsed today by the board of trustees of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce.

In 1933, it was pointed out, the Legislature diverted \$10,000,000 of the fund for public relief. The fund is supported by the state gasoline tax and the sale of motor-vehicle licenses.

# 'Sour Grapes,' Says Green of Lewis' Rap

PHILADELPHIA, May 10.—(AP)—William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, says John L. Lewis withdrew his application for readmission to the United Mine Workers to the federation and accused the A. F. of "sour grapes" to the Roosevelt administration" because Lewis failed to get his own way.

After a closed session of the A. F. of L. executive council yesterday, Green said:

"Some men have a habit in life of forcing their opinions on others and become tremendously disappointed when they fail to have their own way."

"I attribute John's pronouncement as an expression of keen disappointment because I have failed to have 'my' own way."

# Real-Estate Broker's License Suspended

The real-estate broker's license of W. C. Madrig, 702 Third Ave., will be suspended from May 22 through June 30, according to an order on file today in State License Director Thomas A. Swayze's office at Olympia, the Associated Press reported.

Swayze's suspension order said that Madrig, in a real-estate transaction, "appears to have told none of his clients of the transactions he carried on relative to their properties, but used one against the other to their disadvantage and to his own advantage, all in violation of his duties as a real-estate broker."

## Di Cicco Sorry He Got Socked

### —In Uniform

NEW YORK, May 10.—(AP)—Lieut. Pat Di Cicco, Gloria Vanderbilt's husband, conceded today he had taken one on the chin, but denied being knocked down for a count in a night-club fight, and added:

"I'm sorry it all happened, especially so because I'm in uniform. Otherwise, if the truth were known, I wouldn't mind so much."

An El Morocco night club spokesman said Di Cicco had authorized him to make the statement to night-club reporters but had detailed a blow-by-blow description of a fight in the Copacabana Club early yesterday.

Lee Mortimer of the Daily Mirror said the six-foot Di Cicco came to his table and began berating him for an item he had written about the former Hollywood agent three years ago.

Words were flying thick and fast, said Mortimer, when another man, described only as a Texan, tried to make his way through the aisle. Di Cicco threatened him, Mortimer added, and wound up on the floor, victim of a haymaker.

Mrs. Di Cicco was with her husband at the club, Mortimer said. Di Cicco said last night that the man had insulted him. He added that he had not been belligerent, saying he was on sick leave and that his left hand was paralyzed.

## Race Persecution, Say Jap Suspects

DENVER, May 10.—(AP)—Three Japanese-American sisters, charged with treason in the escape of two German prisoners of war from a Southern Colorado camp last October, told a Deputy United States marshal they felt they were being "persecuted because of our race."

The marshal, D. R. Potter, said the women, indicted yesterday by a federal grand jury in Denver, made the comment while he and a marshal were bringing them here from Granada Relocation Center where the trio resided nearly two years.

The women are Mrs. Tsukuro (Toots) Wallace, 35 years old; Mrs. Florence Shizue Otani, 33; and Mrs. Billie Shitara Tanigoshi, 32, all formerly of Inglewood, Calif.

"The three retired behind stony silence when they reached the county jail last night. They are to be arraigned Friday."

## Utah Killer Gets 2nd Death Sentence

OGDEN, Utah, May 10.—(AP)—Austin Cox, Jr., 35-year-old "problem convict," today was sentenced to face a firing squad, a fate he had escaped by appealing to the Utah Supreme Court.

Convicted of shooting District Judge Lewis V. Trueman and accused of slaying four others, Cox was ordered "taken within the walls of the State Prison, at Salt Lake City, and on June 19 be shot until dead."

District Judge Glenn W. Adams pronounced sentence.

## Originator of Poppy Day Taken by Death

ATHENS, Ga., May 10.—(AP)—Miss Moina Michael, who originated Poppy Day in 1918 as a memorial to the war dead, died in a hospital early today after an illness of several months. Known as the "Poppy Lady," she also originated the annual memorial to soldiers and sailors who died at sea in the First World War.

Miss Michael carried the Poppy Day idea to the American Legion, which sponsored it in August 1920. The British Legion adopted it in 1921. Since then poppy sales have brought millions of dollars, chiefly for the aid of disabled war veterans.

## Seattle Policemen Suspended by Chief

Police Chief Herbert D. Kimsley last night suspended two policemen from duty, one for 15 days and the other for five days, for "conduct unbecoming an officer."

Patrolman C. S. Anshus was suspended for "using undue force in the apprehension of a prisoner," according to the chief's order, which also suspended Patrolman M. G. Walsh for "using police equipment for unauthorized business without permission of a commanding officer."

Eerie goings-on in one of the best-acted and best-written mystery stories to reach the screen in a long time are to be found in great abundance in "The Uninvited," which opened yesterday at the 5th Avenue Theatre.

The new program is rather a high-class double-chiller bill, since "The Uninvited" is supported by "The Falcon Out West," which is about the best of the Falcon series to date.
