

V. F. W. MAY ASK OUSTER OF JAPS

SPOKANE, June 15.—(AP)—The Chronicle said yesterday a resolution demanding that all Japanese in the United States be transported to islands such as the Gilberts and Marshalls and immediately placed under Army or Navy supervision, would be presented to the annual encampment of the Washington Department, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

The newspaper said a Tacoma post was sponsoring the measure, adding it also urged that if such action involved constitutional rights of American-born Japanese, Congress should pass a law permitting the drafting of such nationals for construction on the islands to establish "a colony for themselves after hostilities cease."

UNEMPLOYMENT GROWING—M'NUTT

WASHINGTON, June 15.—(UP)—Unemployment is still at a low ebb but is beginning to show signs of rising as war-production cutbacks begin, Federal Security Commissioner Paul V. McNutt reported today.

McNutt said the number of persons receiving unemployment insurance—a rough-and-ready guide to unemployment trends—increased 8 per cent in March over February with cutbacks reported in Denver; Des Moines; St. Louis; Tulsa, Okla.; Lowell, Mass.; Flint, Mich., and Utica, N. Y.

While cautioning that this rise did not present a completely accurate picture, since some of the unemployment was seasonal and many workers went back to work after only a week or two of idleness, McNutt said that as reconversion approaches the demand for unemployment payments is bound to rise.

Factory-Worker Ranks Reduced, Says Mme. Perkins

WASHINGTON, June 15.—(AP)—Secretary of Labor Perkins reported yesterday a decline of 165,000 in the number of factory workers in May, reflecting the completion of many war contracts, curtailments in others, and decreases in consumer-goods production. The manufacturing employment total was estimated at 13,007,000, about a million below the November, 1943, peak.

172 Tanks in Nazi Tank Divisions

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS, ALLIED EXPEDITIONARY FORCE, June 15.—(AP)—Ordinary German tank divisions now in operation have about 172 tanks with two regiments of infantry, although the divisions vary widely in relation to equipment.

Divisions such as the 12th S. S. Panzers, which get a priority on equipment, may have as many as 250 tanks, for 172 tanks and a regiment of self-propelled artillery along with two more regiments of infantry. The total strength might range up to 23,000 men.

Panzer Grenadier regiments sometimes have no tanks, but a battalion of self-propelled guns and about 8,000 men. Often in battle, the Germans add or take away units from various divisions.

British Quadruplet Dies

LEWISHAM, England, June 15.—David Knee-Robinson, one of the quadruplets born June 3 to Mrs. Edith Knee-Robinson, wife of a Royal Air Force flying officer, died yesterday. The condition of the mother and the three other babies was described as fairly satisfactory.

NEW YORK, June 15.—(AP)—The British radio said last night that Archbishop Mamasenos of Athens had been placed under house arrest by German Occupation authorities in Greece "for supporting the patriotic organizations."

Foreign Minister Of Turks Reported Out

NEW YORK, June 15.—(AP)—The Turkish radio said today that Foreign Minister Numan Menemencoglu resigned after a cabinet meeting during which he failed to gain support for his policies.

The broadcast in Arabic, reported by United States government monitors, added that Premier Sulem Saracoglu would take over the Foreign Ministry.
