

## RACE UNCHANGED BY ABSENTEE VOTE

County Auditor Robert A. Morris said today his staff had tabulated votes on 3,809 absentee ballots, but that they did not change the results of any of the contests of the July 11 primary election. Candidates drew votes in roughly the same proportion as on the regular ballots, Morris said.

Service men sent in 2,479 of the absentee ballots, and civilians the remaining 1,330. Although more than 7,000 were sent out, Morris does not expect many more to be returned—possibly 100 or 150, Morris said.

## Sgt. Kinoshita Killed in Action On Italy Front

Word was received yesterday by the Rev. Leo Tibesar of Our Lady Queen of Martyrs Church and of Maryknoll School, of the death of Staff Sgt. Philip S. Kinoshita, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. Kinoshita, formerly of 1603 Terry Ave., and now in the Japanese relocation center at Hunt, Idaho. Sergeant Kinoshita, an infantryman, lost his life in action on the Italian front.

Reported seriously wounded in the same theatre of war was Pfc. John T. Matsudaira, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Matsudaira, formerly of 524 16th Ave., and now also in the Idaho camp.

Both men joined the service with a group of 35 from Maryknoll School, and, on leaving, were presented with rosaries by Father Tibesar. Both young men recently were received by Pope Pius at the Vatican.

Besides his parents, Sergeant Kinoshita is survived by three sisters, Mary Jane, a student at St. Catherine College in Chicago; Inelda, employed by the Stevens Hotel in Chicago; and Irene, student nurse at St. Francis Hospital in Peoria, Ill. He was a graduate of Maryknoll School and Broadway High School, and attended the University of Washington.

## Floyd Oles Is Wounded By Robot Bomb

Capt. Floyd Oles, former manager of the Washington Taxpayers' Association, now serving in England with the Army European Civil Affairs Division, was wounded in action June 27, his wife, Mrs. Helen Louise Oles, learned today.

Captain Oles has been stationed in London, and was there at the time he was wounded, perhaps by a robot bomb, his wife believes. "The Telegram stated only that he was wounded in action in England, but I received a letter yesterday from him saying he was recovering from slight wounds, so I am not worried," she said.

Mrs. Oles, a concert pianist, is recovering from a serious automobile accident last October, from which her husband escaped with minor injuries. He had been called to active duty in September, 1943, and was sent overseas in January.

Before entering military service, Captain Oles was general manager of the Charles W. Clise Company.

## WAR CASUALTIES 1,468 MORE ON CASUALTY LISTS

A total of 1,468 casualties were reported today, with the War Department listing 1,248 soldiers wounded in action, and the Navy Department naming 220 casualties.

Among the 1,248 soldiers, 99 dead, 85 wounded and 36 missing, the Associated Press reported. Of the total, four are from Seattle and 20 others from Washington State.

Today's list brought total casualties for the Navy Department to 2,239, with 21,300 dead, 14,855 wounded, 9,615 missing and 4,409 prisoners of war. Aggregate figures for the Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard, by services, are:

Navy—Total, 33,259, with 15,769 dead, 6,450 wounded, 8,516 missing and 2,524 prisoners. Marine Corps—Total, 16,232, with 5,185 dead, 8,239 wounded, 869 missing and 1,945 prisoners. Coast Guard—Total, 748, with 343 dead, 175 wounded and 230 missing.

Mrs. Foulds reported to police that she was working in the yard when the youth walked into her home.

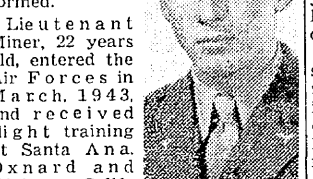
A neighbor, Arthur Mitchell, 321 N. 75th St., saw the youth leave the Foulds' home with Mrs. Foulds' purse and chased him.

## STRIKES ABOVE LEVELS OF 1943

—Labor Bureau Reports

WASHINGTON, July 26.—(UP)—Strikes ran above 1943 levels throughout the first six months of 1944 but the cost in man-days of idleness fell far below the 1943 figure because none of the stoppages approached the magnitude of last year's coal mine shutdowns, preliminary estimates of the Bureau of Labor Statistics showed today.

B. L. S. estimates for the first six months of this year showed a total of 2,565 work stoppages, an increase of 37 per cent over the corresponding period last year. The 1944 strikes, however, cost 4,170,000 man-days compared with 7,576,826 for the first six months of 1943, when there were three nationwide coal-mine stoppages.

The bureau estimated last month's strike total at 500, a decline of 13 per cent from the May figure of 610. June strikes cost 680,000 man-days, or .09 per cent of the available working time, while May stoppages accounted for 1,400,000 man-days of idleness, or .19 per cent of the working time.

Although there was a sharp drop in the number of strikes after the invasion of Western Europe, the June strike totals were second only to those for May during the first half of 1944.

## 'He's Coming Home'

Private Houghton, who lost a leg and needed serious hand injuries, isn't able to write, but Red Cross workers have written his parents for him.

"He's coming home, and that's wonderful news," said his mother yesterday.

An only child, he is a former pupil of Roosevelt High School and the Edison Vocational School. He joined the National Guard six years ago, the Army four years ago and has served in the South Pacific in the field artillery.

"We were all rejoicing over the unexpected arrival from the South Pacific of a nephew, Willard Walter," said Private O'Hearn's aunt, yesterday, "when the news came from Italy that Paul has been seriously wounded." Walter is a Navy pharmacist's mate, first class. Private O'Hearn has been overseas two years, and is a former pupil at Roosevelt High School.

Commander Derickson wrote his mother from the Channel invasion fleet that "I am perfectly alright—there will be no lasting effects" from the injury he received. He is the son of the late Comdr. Richard B. Derickson, Sr., who for years was in charge of the Pacific Northwest office of the United States Coast and Geodetic Service in Seattle.
