

# FIFTH BATTLES AHEAD IN RAIN

ROME, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Batling northeastward through mud and rain, American troops of the Fifth Army have captured Mount Battaglia, 11 miles from Imola, important Po Valley city on the Bologna-Rimini Highway. Allied headquarters announced today.

The Swiss Tribune de Geneve, in an Italian frontier dispatch reported today to the Office of War Information, said that the Germans were preparing the "evacuation of Turin and the whole of Piedmont" and had begun destroying public buildings, factories and air fields.

The doughboys also seized three key heights commanding the direct route north to Bologna.

In the Adriatic sector British Eighth Army forces made gains in the southeastern edges of the Po Valley. The enemy has dug in along strong defense lines that parallel the Fiumicino River, the first major water barrier encountered since the break-through into level country, and is fighting savagely.

The adverse weather, which precluded air support, slowed the American attacks toward Bologna, but the doughboys knocked the Germans off additional heights on both sides of Highway 65, all roughly 20 miles south of the historic city.

The gains gave the Americans observation over the road for many miles to the north.

Allied headquarters gave no specific information on gains on the west flank of the Fifth Army, where the Brazilians and some American units have been keeping advances have been made" and "the entire Gothic zone has now been penetrated with the exception of a small area of the west coast."

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# Communiqués

## Europe

### UNITED NATIONS

#### Western Front

**SUPREME HEADQUARTERS, ALLIED EXPEDITIONARY FORCE, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Text of today's communique:**

"Allied troops have continued to strengthen the flanks of the Nijmegen salient. Enemy counter-attacks from Schindeld were driven back and our forces made a limited advance toward 'S'-Hertogenbosch.

"Our bridgehead over the Antwerp-Turnhout Canal was extended.

"Fighters and fighter-bombers gave close support to our ground forces in Holland and attacked railway targets and shipping in the Schelde Estuary. Two enemy aircraft were destroyed.

"Road and rail communications at Emmerich, across the German frontier east of Nijmegen, were hit by medium bombers.

"In Southeastern Luxembourg, our troops have liberated Remich. Farther south, we have freed Port-sur-Seille, northeast of Pont-a-Mousson.

"East of Nancy, several enemy counter-attacks were repulsed near Pettencourt, Bezange and Courtcourt, and our troops in an advance of three miles have seized high ground in Parroy Forest. A concentration of enemy troops, tanks and supplies in the forest were bombed heavily.

"In the Epinal-Belfort sector, we have made substantial advances despite increased enemy aggressiveness. Northeast of Epinal, the villages of Bult and Destord were taken in an advance of several miles. A number of villages in the northwest approaches to the Belfort Pass are also in our hands. A strong counter-attack was repulsed with heavy loss to the enemy.

"Our troops continued to close on Calais yesterday against heavy opposition. We hold all the high ground dominating the city and have captured the Citadel. German fortifications in the port were attacked by heavy bombers during the morning. Gun positions in Cap Gris Nez were heavily bombed in the evening.

"More than 1,000 heavy bombers, with a strong fighter escort, attacked industrial plants at Merseburg, a synthetic-oil plant and railway yard at Magdeburg and a tank factory at Kassel yesterday. Thirty-six enemy aircraft were destroyed in combat. Forty-nine bombers and 12 fighters are missing."

**GERMAN**

The Friday German communique, as broadcast from Berlin and recorded by the Associated Press:

Enemy attempts to jump over the Meuse and Rhine barriers in Holland by employment of a large force of air-borne troops, to circumvent from the north the German West Wall and to break into Germany between Emden and Munster, have failed.

The Second British Army is trying to expand a small wedge westward and eastward via Eindhoven toward Nijmegen. During these enemy attempts heavy fighting ended yesterday, particularly on the Dutch frontier east of Nijmegen and west of Venlo.

Between Antwerp and 'S'-Hertogenbosch also enemy attacks increased. Initial enemy successes were limited or eliminated by counter-attacks by German reserves. Forty British tanks were left on the battlefield damaged. Mutual fighting activity on the remaining Western Front up to Metz was of secondary importance.

After the enemy was repelled westward again by our counter-attacks from the dent north of Lunville, Americans counter-attacked yesterday north of Nancy. Besides heavy losses, the enemy secured only a small gain of ground. In the foreground of the Vosges, attacks by American and French troops, increasing in intensity, particularly on both sides of Epinal and west of Belfort.

Very bitter and fluctuating fighting in the forest ensued which, however, resulted in our taking back our front line east of Lure.

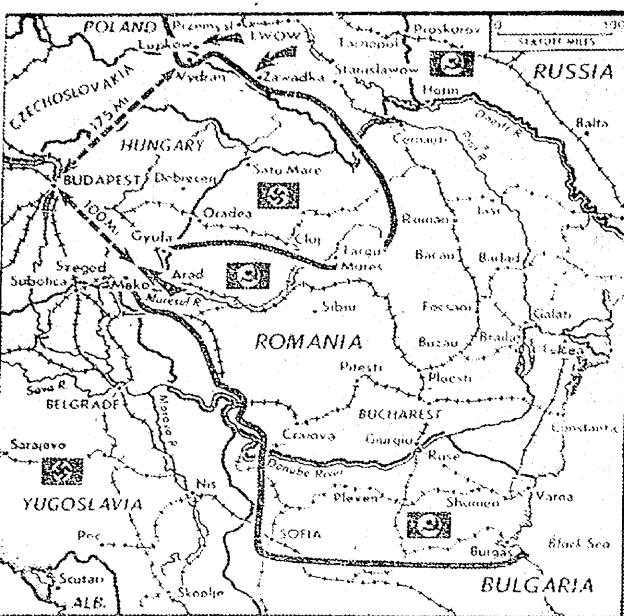
Of fortresses which are in the rear of the enemy, Dunkerque and Calais and the coastal artillery groups of Cap Gris Nez, Channel Islands, Lorient, St. Nazaire, La Rochelle, Gironde North and Gironde South, Calais only is being attacked at present. Fighting continued with great intensity. At some places the enemy worked his way up to the fringe of the town.

Parliamentarians have been rejected at other fortresses and our troops, by successful sorties, have replenished their stocks of arms and supplies.

In Central Italy, Monte Battaglia, northwest of Firenze, was attacked on a large scale. The enemy had captured this height on the preceding day. The enemy garrison was cut off and all enemy attempts at relief were frustrated successfully.

On the Adriatic sector, the enemy continued his heavy tank attack during the night, supported by continuous air attacks. Our divisions repelled all attacks with high enemy losses, thereby obtaining another full defensive success.

In the Southeast, Alpine troops counter-attacked Soviets who had broken into the Danube Bend, west

of Turno-Severin. The enemy regiments were smashed and considerable booty in arms was captured. The enemy lost 500 dead and 200 prisoners.

In Central Croatia our troops, side by side with Croatian formations, recaptured the town of Banja Luka, thereby reestablishing connection with the garrison there, which had been cut off for two days.

Battleplanes with food effect attacked enemy troop movements and supplies in Western Romania. A counter-attack by German and Hungarian troops at the Hungarian-Romanian frontier between Szeged and Oradea and supported by the Luftwaffe made good progress. Hungarian tank busters destroyed 17 enemy tanks.

In the northern part of the Szekler Corner, our formations detached themselves on the Maros sector without enemy pressure and giving up Neumark. On the ridges of the North Carpathians, numerous Bolshevik attacks were repelled and enemy dents were eliminated in a counter-thrust. Between the north fringe of the Carpathians and Jelgava, no fighting of importance took place.

Light German naval formations effectively shelled positions on the east coast of Riga Bay. In the northern sector of the Eastern Front, troops of the German army and Waffen SS, in 14 days of bitter fighting, effectively supported by the Luftwaffe, frustrated during enemy attempts to break through made by more than 100 rifle divisions and numerous tank and mobile formations. The enemy suffered heavy losses in men and material.

With destruction of more than 1,000 tanks, the Bolsheviks, between September 14 and 27, lost the tanks of more than five tank corps. Fighters and Luftwaffe artillery destroyed 698 Soviet planes. The command and troops have distinguished themselves in this hard defensive battle.

In Northern Norwegian waters,

escort vessels of a German convoy sank one enemy motor torpedo boat and shot down four enemy planes. One of our vessels was lost on account of a direct bomb hit, in the same waters three more enemy planes were shot down by our ferries.

Enemy disappointment regarding his failures to break into Western Germany by way of North Holland is given vent in increased numbers of terror attacks on German cities. In Central Germany heavy damage was caused in the residential quarters of Kassel, Magdeburg, Dessau and several places in the Halle-Leipzig area. In the night preceding September 29, British planes attacked Brunswick.

On September 28, the Anglo-American air forces lost 75 machines, including 50 four-engine bombers, all of which were brought down by our fighters and Luftwaffe flak artillery.

## Pacific

### UNITED STATES

**PEARL HARBOR, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Pacific Fleet communique No. 134, yesterday said:**

"Carrier aircraft of the Pacific Fleet struck hard at enemy shipping and defense installations in the Visayas group of the Philippine Islands on September 23 (W. E. P. T. longitude U. S. date), attacking in the field on the islands of Cebu, Leyte, Negros, Luzon and Mactan and all shipping found in adjacent waters.

"A particularly heavy strike was delivered at Coron Bay between Busuanga Island and Culion Island in the Western Philippines, where a number of the enemy's ships including two of his valuable fleet tankers were sunk.

"Seven enemy aircraft were shot down. Twenty-nine enemy aircraft were destroyed on the ground at the several fields, which were thoroughly bombed and strafed.

"The following damage was inflicted upon enemy shipping (including the two tankers at Coron Bay):

"Ships sunk—One destroyer, one troop transport, three large cargo ships, three large oil tankers, six medium cargo ships, five small cargo ships, three destroyer-escort type vessels.

"Damaged (including more than one probably sunk)—Two large oil tankers, one large cargo ship, one medium oil tanker, 15 medium cargo ships, one small transport, 21 small cargo ships, two destroyer-escort type vessels.

"In addition between 20 and 30 small craft were sunk or damaged.

"The following damage was inflicted upon enemy shore installations:

"At Iloilo, in Southern Panay, a warehouse and a marine railway were set afire.

"At Bacolod, in the northern part of Negros Island, piers and barracks were bombed and strafed.

"At Cebu Island warehouses and piers were heavily damaged.

"At Mactan Island, east of Cebu Island, oil refining facilities and the air field were bombed.

"At Saravai, in the northern part of Negros Island, buildings and the air field were hit."

"At Legaspi, in Southern Luzon, a number of partly concealed aircraft were bombed and strafed on the airfield, but the number destroyed and damaged was not observed.

"Near Ormoc on Leyte Island, oil-storage facilities and barracks were set afire.

"Our losses in these operations were ten aircraft but only five pilots and three flight personnel are missing."

## UNITED NATIONS

**ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, New Guinea, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Text of today's communique:**

"Philippines: Our night air patrols again struck heavily at enemy shipping in the Southern Philippines, sinking a 10,000-ton transport, ramming a 6,000-ton freighter-transport near Jolo in the Sulu Archipelago.

"Moluccas—Halmahera: Our air patrols bombed installations on Djoranda Island. A single plane ineffectively strafed Moroti shipping during the night.

"Ceram—Boeroe: Our bombers of all types attacked the Karoekoe and Namlea airdromes, oil-storage installations and runways at Boela and the barracks at Anbon. Two parked planes were destroyed, airdrome facilities were damaged further. Smoke from burning fuel rose 3,000 feet. Seventy-four tons of bombs were expended; there was no interception.

"Celebes: Our heavy units bombed bivouac and dump areas at Manado and airdrome facilities at Mapagnet with more than 46 tons of explosives. Many fires and explosions resulted; there was no interception. Night patrols harassed Kendari.

"Adverse weather hindered all air operations.

"Lesser Sundas: Our medium bombers attacked Maemere airdrome on Flores Island, damaging many installations. Patrol planes dropped bombs on Fulloro township in Timor.

"Dutch New Guinea—Vogelkop: Our fighters bombed enemy installations at Gevelink Bay, destroying a fuel dump, and swept the coastlines to the south and west, damaging barges and small craft.

"Biaik Island: Our naval patrols sank a supply-laden barge.

"British New Guinea—Wewak: Our medium units bombed enemy supply areas, starting fires.

"New Ireland: Dive-bombers attacked enemy concentrations, destroying buildings, medium and light bombers, with 53 tons of explosives, struck enemy encampments at Matchin and Choiseul Bays and destroyed two barges in the Shortland Islands."

## 4 YEARS AGO TODAY

September 29, 1940—British announce Germans lost 2,167 planes and 5,418 airmen in attacks on Britain during August and September. Madagascar receives British ultimatum to give up to break with Vichy.

London, Sept. 29.—(AP)—More than 30,000 Germans were killed in ten days ending September 26 by the Leningrad army of Marshal Leonid A. Govorov pressing against Riga after virtually capturing it, Estonia, the Moscow radio announced tonight.

Another 15,745 were captured, raising total permanent casualties in that sector alone to 45,745—the equivalent of four and a half German divisions as presently constituted.

The free Yugoslav radio, in a broadcast heard by Reuters, British news agency, said today that Partisan units have reached the approaches to Belgrade, capital of Yugoslavia.

(The Ankara radio reported this afternoon that "The capture of Belgrade has been announced by the Yugoslav Patriots.")

The German news agency, D. N. B., said today that the Red Army has made a new crossing of the Danube River south of the Iron Gate on the Romanian-Yugoslav border seven miles west of Russian-held Turnu-Severin.

German recapture of Banja Luka in Central Croatia was reported today by the German communique.

German broadcasts also asserted today that Russian troops had temporarily captured the Hungarian cities of Ezered and Gyula and the Romanian city of Oradea, but that all "were again in the hands of German and Hungarian troops" as the result of counter-attacks.

"A major-scale regrouping maneuver is going on throughout the Balkans," Berlin radio said. "Military circles said it would be premature to disclose the new German front which is being established there."

(The Nazi Party newspaper, Voelkischer Beobachter, served notice, according to a broadcast today that Germany would not "tolerate another case of Bulgaria" and, although no particular nation was mentioned, it seemed obvious the warning was directed to wavering Hungary.)

In Transylvania, the Germans said they "detached themselves to the Mures River sector without any enemy pressure," giving up Neumark.

## 30,000 GERMANS DIE IN 10 DAYS

—Say Russians

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ROME, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Some Rome newspapers viewed without enthusiasm today the prospect of Italian aid to the Allies in the war on Japan, expressing doubt Italy would be able materially to pursue such a war. Instead, greater participation of Italians in the war against Germany was suggested.

These comments were made on the declaration of President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill that one consideration in moves to effect the political and economic reconstruction of Italy would be to enable the country to throw her full available force into the war on Japan and Germany.

A new course in American literature and culture, designed to teach Americans more about their own history, will be introduced in City College, New York.

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There was no official word, however, on the activities of the small air-borne and sea-borne units which were disclosed two days ago to have landed in the Adriatic coastal areas of the Balkans.

## Hirabayashi Again In Federal Court

SPOKANE, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Gordon K. Hirabayashi, American-born Japanese, who gained nationwide attention in an unsuccessful court fight against evacuation from the Pacific Coast area, was in court again today.

Arraigned before United States Commissioner Raymond F. Kelly on a charge of failing to report for pre-induction examination for military service, Hirabayashi was bound over to Federal Court and held in lieu of \$2,500 bond.

On July 3 Hirabayashi was arrested here on a charge of failing to return a Selective Service questionnaire. The case, based on a Seattle federal indictment, is pending.

Hirabayashi was married July 29 to Miss Esther Schmoce of Seattle.

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## Bellingham Flyer Gets Three

Lieut. Donald Dunn of Bellingham was credited with shooting down three German planes during an Allied aerial assault over Halberstadt yesterday.
