McCoy, Gunner, Missing Since April, Is Safe

Flight Officer Daniel Albert McCoy, husband of Mrs. Rosalie Brown McCoy, 1115 14th Ave., who was missing over Belgium April 28, now is safe, the Royal Canadian Air Force announced yesterday.
In a telegram received from the Canadian government, Mrs. McCoy was informed that her husband "reached the United Kingdom safely on September 15." He has been overseas nearly a year, having left when his daughter, Marilyn, was only 2 weeks old. He is a gunner on a bomber.
A native of Canada, he was graduated from the Edmonton High School, and joined the R. C. A. F. in March, 1943. His wife formerly resided at Greenwood, B. C.

Produce Dealers Are Charged by O. P. A.

Charges of selling potatoes at more than ceiling prices, and of failure to inform their customers of the grades, origin and varieties of potatoes sold, were filed against two Seattle produce dealers yesterday by the Office of Price Administration.
Named in a complaint for injunction filed in United States District Court were J. W. Dimond and J. E. Meeker, who are operators of the Dimond Produce Company, 1122 Western Ave. The complaint was filed by George H. Layman, chief district O. P. A. enforcement attorney, who asked that the firm be prohibited from further violations.

Prowling Boys Find Suspected Jap Propaganda

How 15 Seattle boys, 8 to 14 years of age, spent four days prowling a little-used storeroom of a Japanese-owned hotel at 306 Sixth Ave. S., and uncovered a cache of what police believe may be pre-Pearl Harbor Japanese propaganda, was disclosed by juvenile authorities here yesterday.

The youngsters finally were apprehended when A. J. Holben, manager, became suspicious of recurring strange noises he heard coming from the back of the hotel. When he investigated he found the boys using an ax to break open the stored trunks of evacuated Japanese.

The boys fled, but several were arrested by police a few blocks away.

Questioned by Capt. G. W. Kimball, head of the Junior Safety Division, the captured youths implicated their companions. The boys related to Kimball lurid tales of finding Japanese literature, machine-gun bullets, cartridge belts and rolls of film.

N. P. Engineer Quits After 55 Years' Service

King G. (King George) Chapman drove his shiny black Diesel electric locomotive into the Northern Pacific railroad yards at Interbay yesterday afternoon. He climbed down from his cab and found himself the guest of honor at a party.
It was his last run as a Northern Pacific railroad engineer, ending 55 years of service with the road, and the party had been arranged by his associates and friends to celebrate his retirement.

Until that moment, Chapman was No. 1 engineer in seniority on the whole Northern Pacific system, the railroad's oldest engineer in point of service, and one of the oldest engineers in point of service on any railroad in the country.

Employees of the yard, old friends, J. A. Sullivan, chief clerk at the yard offices; John Marion, another old-time Northern Pacific roadman, who succeeds Chapman as No. 1 in seniority, were there to greet him, as were Mrs. Chapman and his sister, Mrs. S. J. Eddy, Portland, Or., and her husband.

And bespeaking their friendly feeling and felicitations, Marion presented him with a box of cigars and a set of fishing tackle, rod and reel, to help while away the leisure hours of retirement.

Chapman, 70 years old, went to work for the Northern Pacific in Tacoma when he was 15, and has served continuously ever since. For 20 years, from 1910 to 1930, he was road foreman in Seattle.

Then the lure of the road called him back to his locomotive cab again. More recently he has been a "traveling" engineer, and served on "transfer" duty between Seattle and Bothell.

Chapman said he plans to "take it easy" for the next two months and get a lot of sleep. Then he and Mrs. Chapman will visit their son, Harold, who lives in Los Angeles. Their home is at 221 W. Mercer St.

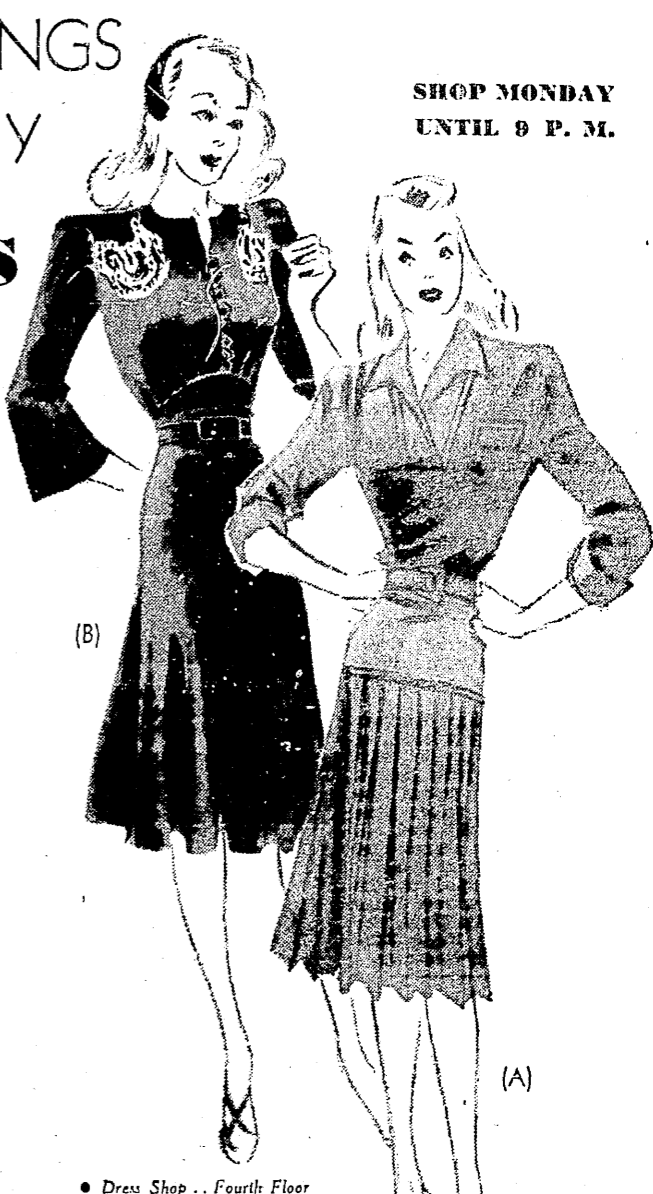

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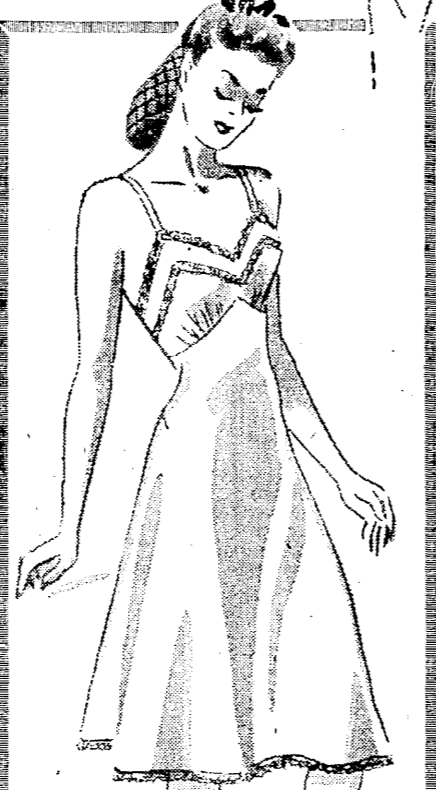
