Hadley was made secretary.

The following preamble and resolution were adopted.

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"Whereas, it is of vita! interest and great importance to our city that we encourage and effect the establishment and maintenance of additional mannfacturing and other industries that will give employment to all classes of labor, thereby securing a large and more stable pay roil, and

"Whereas, it seems unfair that the burden and responsibility of this work should be thrust upon any slugle body, and it is believed that the best results can be secured by a standing committee of men representing all of the various interests involved, therefore

Be It Resolved, that each organization represented at the mass meeting arranged for at this conference be requested to appoint a representative to act as a member of a standing committee to promote the establishment and maintenance of additional manufacturing and other industries in Scattle."

Readjustment of the Jackson Street Regrade Roll to Be Made Through an Ordinance and a Supplemental Tax.

Property owners in the Jackson Street regrade improvement district. extending from Fourth Avenue South to Twelfth Avenue South, are to be given protection from an arbitrary assessment made by City Engineer R. H. Thomson through the means of an ordinance to go to the city council Monday night.

This method of correcting the errors of the engineering department was suggested by Corporation Counsel Scott Calhoun at a meeting of the street committee of the council yesterday afternoon.

the assessment was spread equally throughout the district at \$9.27 a foot.

Reduction Suggested.

Corporation Counsel Scott Calhoun suggested that an ordinance go to the council making a reduction to \$6 on all property owned by persons signing the petition, taking care of the amount thus created by spreading it over the remainder of the property by means of a supplemental roll.

He said:

"Comparatively a small portion of the property in the district will be affected by a change in the assessment roll to make it comply with the provisions of the ordinance. If the ordinance proposed makes it possible to reduce the assessment on damaged property to \$5 a foot and a supplemental roll made in order to spread this excess against the other property of the district, the present roll will not be left open. It is an open question whether any case brought by property owners affected by the stipulation would not be decided in favor of the taxpayer and against the city if the roll should be opened up.

Engineer Drew Up Boll.

"It should be understood once and for all that the legal department of the city had nothing whatever to do with this assessment roll. It was prepared presumably by the city engineer, and any statement to the effect that I had anything whatever to do with it is untrue. The legal department is called on often enough and too many attempts are mady to make it the fail guy for numerous inaccuracies, but the Jackson Street regrade assessment roll was never in my office and no one connected with my department had the least thing to do with it."

This explanation was brought about by the chaim of Councilman Frank P. Mullen that the corporation counsel had directed how the assessment should be spread. He insisted that this is true, and Calhoun declared that he had nothing whatever to do with it, adding that there was every indication that Mullen's "pipe had gone out."

The suggestion of Calhoun was adopted by the committee and he and the city cugineer will draw the ordinance that will make possible a readjustment of the assessment roll in the Jackson Street district.

The real purpose of the convention is to formulate a general campaign of action and specifically to draft a set of resolutions urging Congress to enact favorable legislation for the exclusion of coolie labor from the Orient.
