Wife of Slayer of Stanford

White Testifies to Experiences in New York With Victim of Tragedy.

HUSBAND CRIES AT RECITAL OF DETAILS

District Attorney Interposes Objections, - Which Robs-Woman's Narrative of Impressiveness.

Over the objection of District Attorney William T. Jerome, who declared the recital of a story pertaining to things that happened three years before the tragedy could have no effect on the defendant's mental condition at the time he killed Stanford White, Mrs. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw took the stand at the trial of Harry K. Thaw, her. husband, today and, told again of her experience as a girl. 16 years old, in New York and of her meeting with Stanford White; of the house of the velvet swing and the mirrored room; all, she declared, exactly as she told it to Thaw in Paris in June, 1903, when he had asked her to become his wife.

The story was told to a filled court room, Justice Dowling having overruled the motion of District Attorney Jerome to close the doors to all persons not officially connected with the case. M. Break in Woman's Voice.

Young Mrs. Thaw's voice broke at one time during her recital and the defendant also wept, but the electric effect of the testimony as given last year was missing. This was largely due to the course of the district attorney, who interposed an almost continuous stream of objections and was nearly always on his feet, standing just between the witness and the defendant. The attitude of the prosecutor awoke a tone of defiance in the witness' voice and this did not aid the story but the jury and spectators listened intently.

There was no variance in the recital from last year, but it was shorter, at the instance of the court and the district attorney. Littleton resented Jerome's manner several times and once protested against the prosecutor attempting to lecture the witness.

Are Holding Mysterious Meetings at Night on Their White River Valley Farms, and Whites Are Perplexed.

LIGHTS BURNED FROM. TOPS OF THEIR HOUSES

Former State Land-Compise sioner Robert Bridges Says They Are Overrunning the Valley and Getting Control.

JAPANESE residents of the White River Valley have been showing so much mysterious activity lately that their white neighbors have become alarmed. Nearly every night the little brown men are holding meetings throughout the valley. What the object of the meetings may be is not known, but the White River farmers no longer attempt to conceal the opinion that it is for some purpose which the Japs do not care to divulge, possibly to organize for united action in the event of war between Japan and the United States.

The White River farmers have learned notice to other Japanese that a meeting is to be held, and all night long, it is said, the little brown men can be seen tramping back and forth between their homes and the meeting houses. They seem to spring up like magic when the lights are burning.

A report of the pecular actions of the Japanese gardeners was brought to Seattle yesterday by Robert Bridges, former state land commissioner, who owns a farm at Orillia. He, discussed the situation with Councilman James Conway. Bridges told me frankly," said Conway this morning. "that the situation does not look good to him. He is not willing to assert that the Japa are holding the mysterious meetings for improper purposes, but he said it certainly hooks peculiar."

"He tells me that the Japanese are now overrunning the valley. There are several hundred of them there. The meetings which they hold are attended by as many as fifty and sixty men. Bridges says it looks to him as if they are trying to obtain absolute control of the valley possibly with the object of cornering the city's vegetable supply. "They are getting control of every farm they can. Bridges refused to sell his ranch, and then they offered to rentit, and they are willing to pay high rentals, too."

POOR COOKING DRIVES MANY MEN TO DRINK

New York Jurist Says That Wives Cannot Prepare Pood and Husbands Resort to Saloons for Mourishment.

NEW YORK, Monday, Jan. 20.—That women cook so badly that they drive their husbands. to drink, was the statement made, vesterday by Supreme Court Justice Greenbung, in an address at the Hebrew Technical School for girls. After describing the excellent work being done by the school, the justice said:
"In this country the cooking is far from what it ought to be, particularly in the country districts, where nature has endowed the soil with all that should make for ideal conditions as to food. Yet, the average woman knows nothing about cooking. The cooking is vite. Children are nourished improperly. The wage earner, the bread winner, does not receive proper food to sustain him. I have no doubt that many men go to saloons at night just because they are improperly nourished at home."

DOUKHOBORS TRY TO MARCH WITHOUT CLOTHES

Authorities at Fort William on Lake Superior Have to Reep Careful Watch Over Ignorant Panatics.

DULUTH, Minn., Monday, Jan. 20.— The band of Doukhobors that recently arrived at Fort William, on the northern coast, of Lake Superior, from Western Canada, have to be watched night and day to prevent their appearance in public in a nude condition and the local public in a nude condition and the local authorities are at a loss as to what course they shall punsue in regard to the zealots. A traveier in Duluth from Fort Williams said yesterday that the authorities there are trying to arrange with the Russian government to bear the expense of transporting the Dukhubors back to Russia, but that thus far their efforts have been unfruitful. The Russian authorities asked for the names of the religionists, but the members of the sect refuse to divulge them.

The Doukhobors are without money, and the people of Fort William have cared for them. Recently, however, the lown was scandalized by the appearance of all the Doukhobors in the street in a nude condition. They were ushered back to their quarters and compelled to don their clothes.

Girl Who Confessed to Swindling to Stand Trial CONSPIRATORS IN JAIL AT

Five Italians, Two Germans, and One Canadian Are Arrested in Brazil for Conspiring to Destroy American Vessels

RIO JANEIRO, Monday, Jan. 20.—Several arrests have been made in connection with an alleged plot to destroy part of the American fleet now in this harbor.

PLOT SAID TO HAVE BEEN HATCHED IN PARIS

BEEN HATCHED IN PARIS

PARIS, Monday, Jan. 20.—The report of an anarchistic plot in conjunction with the American fleet apears to be another chapter of a welrd story which has obtained much circulation be which has obtained at matter of abundant precaution, the essential points of the story were made known through official channels to the authorities at Washington and Rio Janeiro and out of this doubtless the action of the Rio Janeiro police has grown of the Story in brief, as given by those responsible for it, is substantially as follows:

A young man of good family residing here, claims to have overheard spatches of a telephone conversation. Investigations at the cafe disclosed several characters holding mysterious meetings.

Their movements are said to have been traced and their plans in part learned as to the shipment of exexplosives to Brazil.

This, appeared to fifth the disclosures at the cafe and with the cabellistic writing, which is said to have shown that the plotters designed to plant submarine mines off Escava Island, at the narrowest points in the Straits of Magellan, using the Island as their hase of operations.

The existence of the island at this point in the straits, where the current runs almost ten miles an hour, was duly verified. How the explosives were to reach this Island from Rio Janeiro is not disclosed. There were many other details unearthed in the course of the inquiry set on foot.

The parties responsible for the story did not neglect to make the most of the Japanese scare which has affected Paris of late.

Vague references were made to Japanese names which were said to be figuring in the affair. These fantastic details were received with incredulity in most quarters but as stated the precautionary step was taken to acquaint the authorities at Washington and Rio Janeiro of the general character of the story. This has brought about much cabling, during which the Brazilian authorities have been advised with a view to their taking any precautionary steps deemed desirable. It is, this precaution doubtless, which led the Rio Janeiro police to take action as to supposed "an archists," although the anarchist phase appears to have been overlooked by the ingenuous persons responsible for the story here.
