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ANARCHISTS ARRESTED FOR PLOT TO BLOW UP SHIPS

DAN CUPID IS RESTRAINED BY COURT

Further Interference on Part of Famous Little Archer With Little Miss Mildred Cross and Alfred Wise Forbidden.

LEGAL VERBIAGE PLACES DAMPER ON LOVE-MAKING

Parents of 14-Year-Old Girl Ask to Forever Abolish Attentions Lavished on Her by 27-Year-Old Man.

DANIEL CUPID, famous archer, was this morning, by order of Judge George E. Morris in the superior court, restrained from further shooting, attempting to shoot, communicating with attempts to communicate with, approaching surreptitiously or openly, in any way whatsoever giving, conveying, sending or causing to be sent any love messages, letters, tokens or other signs or manifestations of affection at or in Mildred Cross, aged 14, at or to Alfred Wise, aged 27, until the court determines next Friday the separate, individual and collective rights of all parties litigant.

So, pending the decision of Judge Morris, who after a year's experience with the default divorce docket is familiar with the wild shots one D. Cupid is capable of making, the love arrows will be sheathed and there will be a cessation of love making between Alfred Wise and pretty little Miss Mildred Cross. If the court's order is disobeyed by the world's champion archer, and there is an elopement, the stern justice gives it a contempt of court.

What Will Dan Do? So far as the records of the King County superior court bear witness this is the first time the Love God has been restrained, even temporarily, and what he will do under a court order is a matter of speculation and interest to all. Will he submit? If he does it is a precedent.

EVELYN THAW TELLS HER STORY

Wife of Slayer of Stanford White Testifies to Experiences in New York With Victim of Tragedy.

HUSBAND CRIES AT RECITAL OF DETAILS

District Attorney Interposes Objections, Which Robs Woman's Narrative of Impressiveness.

NEW YORK, Monday, Jan. 20.—Over the objection of District Attorney William T. Jerome, who declared the recital of a story pertaining to things that happened three years before the tragedy could have no effect on the defendant's mental condition at the time he killed Stanford White, Mrs. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw took the stand at the trial of Harry K. Thaw, her husband, today and told again of her experience as a girl, 16 years old, in New York and of her meeting with Stanford White, of the house of the velvet curtains and the mirrors, she declared, exactly as she told it to Thaw in Paris in June, 1903, when he had asked her to become his wife.

Young Mrs. Thaw's voice broke at one time during her recital and the defendant also wept, but the electric effect of the testimony given last year is missing. This was largely due to the course of the district attorney, who interposed an almost continuous stream of objections and was nearly always on his feet, standing just between the witness and the defendant. The attorney's protestations were a tone of defiance in the witness' eyes and this did not aid the story, but the jury and spectators listened intently.

JAP FARMERS CREATING ALARM

Are Holding Mysterious Meetings at Night on Their White River Valley Farms, and Whites Are Perplexed.

CONSPIRATORS IN JAIL AT RIO JANEIRO

Five Italians, Two Germans, and One Canadian Are Arrested in Brazil for Conspiring to Destroy American Vessels

RIO JANEIRO, Monday, Jan. 20.—Several arrests have been made in connection with an alleged plot to destroy part of the American fleet now in this harbor. The band which is supposed to have organized the plot is presumably composed of five Italians, one Canadian and two Germans.

The members of the band counted on the assistance of a Spaniard named Rochoero, who has lived in this city for a long time. A year ago, however, this man went insane, and since then he has been shut up in a sanitarium at Montevideo. In an official note, which the chief of police sent to the correspondent of the Associated Press, he says: "Some time before the arrival of the American fleet at Rio Janeiro, the Brazilian government received word from Washington and Paris that anarchists of different nationalities intended to damage one or several of the ships of the American fleet."

PLOT SAID TO HAVE BEEN HATCHED IN PARIS

PARIS, Monday, Jan. 20.—The report of an anarchistic plot in conjunction with the American fleet appears in another chapter of a weird story which has obtained much circulation here. A few people have treated this story seriously, others regarding it as fantastic, while many have dismissed the whole affair as a myth. However, as a matter of abundant precaution, the essential points of the story were made known through official channels to the authorities at Washington and Rio Janeiro, and out of this doubtless the action of the Rio Janeiro police has grown.
