

GUARD HONORS FREED PRISONERS

YOKOHAMA, Sept. 4.—The bleak misery of the Jap prison camps ended today for 452 Americans liberated from two desolate detention areas 90 miles west of here.

These prisoners were released from Tokyo Camps No. 9 and 9-B, at Ashao. They were brought to Yokohama on special electric trains, accompanied only by Japanese military officials.

As the trains rolled into the station they were greeted by a 1st Cavalry Division guard of honor, trim and stern in freshly laundered uniforms, closely pressed by hundreds of curious Japanese civilian commuters awaiting transportation to their suburban homes.

Heroes Come Shouting
The heroes of Bataan, Corregidor and half a dozen sea battles poured from the exits, shouting and laughing. They wore a weird assortment of clothing, ranging from Japanese sailors' uniforms to facsimiles of American doughboys' natty attire.

They didn't seem to notice the lack of answering cheers from the welcoming delegation. Most of us were too busy blinking owlishly to keep back the tears, to return their greetings. We were the first Americans most of them had seen in more than three years.

A score of nurses from the 42nd General Hospital did more than anyone to welcome the boys. They showed cigarettes and candy at the returning veterans until there just wasn't room for any more.

Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger, commander of the Eighth Army, stood happily on the platform, almost unnoticed by the throng. Whenever he had a chance, he shook the hand of an ex-prisoner. Of one he inquired:
"How's it been?"
A bright-eyed Yank of 21, wearing a Jap sergeant's blouse, a pair of dungarees and Japanese-made canvas shoes, saluted happily:
"Everything is quite all right now, sir."

They're Headed Home
After leaving the station the veterans were escorted to trucks which carried them to a processing center where they were given medical check-ups, food and clothing before being assigned to planes or ships for the trip home.

I scrambled aboard a truck with 20 men along with Nurse, Lieut. Beatrice Williams.

One of the men shouted at her: "Where are you from?"
"Rock Island, Ill.," she answered.
"Hey, what do you know?" he yelled. "I'm from Salem, Ill."

As the truck rolled smoothly into line, another veteran of Bataan had his say:
"Gasoline, real gasoline," he shouted. "Listen to the way these things run. No more charcoal burners."

The truck lurched around a corner and careened down the street to keep up with the procession. A 35-year-old man cupped his hands to his face to yell:
"Lord, it feels good to have a Yank at the wheel!"

Bomb Havoc Seen
The trucks moved swiftly through the streets and the former prisoners of war viewed the vast bomb devastation with awe. One of the Yanks couldn't resist the temptation of pointing a thumb and forefinger in the direction of some stolid-faced Japs and making a noise like a machine gun.

At the end of the ride the men told of life at Ashao, of working in copper mines 12 or more hours daily, of eating grass during the weeks before the war ended. But none of them talked bitterly of those things. They told about them in the manner of men discussing something unpleasant that has happened a long time ago.

The men walked into the processing center and a stubby lad, who had been staring for minutes at our helmeted escort, suddenly blurted:
"Now I know what it is. It's those helmets. They're wearing a funny kind of helmet. The last I saw were the flat kind, like they wore in the First World War."

The Japanese promise not to do it again.

In a note dated March 10, Grew protested treatment of 750 American prisoners crowded into a Japanese freighter which was torpedoed and sunk off the Philippines September 7, 1944.

Three Weeks in Ship's Hold
The prisoners starved, thirsted and suffocated for nearly three weeks. When the ship was torpedoed, they were machine-gunned by Japanese guards, acting on orders of a Lieutenant Hosimoto, as they floundered about in the sea.

Other guards threw hand grenades on the Americans trapped in the holds of the vessel. The Japanese recaptured 29 prisoners from the sea, took them to another ship in lifeboats, shot them, and threw their bodies back into the ocean.

There were less violent cases. Many messages protested lack of sanitation, food, medical supplies and clothing. One told how two Americans picked a papaya from a tree in their prison camp to relieve their hunger.

Japanese Mess Sergeant Nishitoni broke the left arm of each man with an iron bar as punishment.

Another message said the United States had intercepted orders of Japanese military authorities ordering the outright murder of individuals surrendering or captured.

Responsibility Cited
Most of the messages reminded the Japanese that they had agreed to abide by the Geneva Convention rules of warfare; many demanded that Swiss officials or International Red Cross workers be permitted to visit certain prison camps from which no information had come.

In one note, Grew warned Tokyo that the United States "will hold personally and officially responsible for this crime all of the officials of the Japanese government, regardless of position or status, who have participated in the atrocities either through neglect or from intent and will do our course bring them to judgment."

Protests in many instances improved Japanese treatment of Americans, the report said. It stressed, however, that information received by the State Department necessarily was incomplete and would be supplemented by reports from prisoners themselves as they returned home.

The document did not name any military personnel among the atrocities victims.

Japs Took Shoes
Other instances cited by Grew in his protest messages:
At Lasang Air Field in the Philippines, the Japanese put 650 American prisoners to work, although it was a known military installation.

Once a Lieutenant Hosiada forced prisoners there to kneel for a long time with their shins on the edge of a railroad track, then compelled them to run several kilometers, barefooted, over sharp coral.

From April to August, 1944, they worked on bleeding feet in the coral because the Japanese had taken away their shoes.

At San to Tomas internment camp, Manila, the Japanese killed four American civilians, Carroll G. Grinnell, Alfred F. Duggleby, Ernest E. Johnson and Clifford L. Larson.

All were interned December 23, 1944. Johnson was removed the next day and last was seen alive at a military police station in Manila. The others were taken away January 5 and never again were seen alive. The bodies of all four later were found with ten unidentified corpses buried near headquarters of the Japanese military police. The dead were wired together in small groups.

Wounded Man Slain
At Los Banos internment camp in the Philippines, an American, George I. Louis, was shot and wounded by a guard as he returned from a trip to purchase food January 28, 1945.

Major Iwanaka, the camp commandant, called in three other internees and told them he would have Louis finished off because standing orders were that guards shoot "until they kill" anyone violating the camp boundaries.

Despite pleas of the internees, Iwanaka had Louis carried on a stretcher to a clump of bamboo outside the camp grounds and shot through the head.

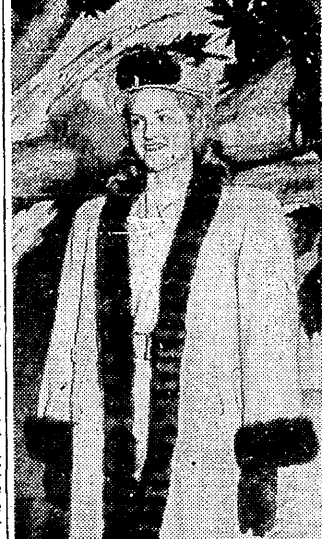
2 BATTALIONS OF NISEI GET HONOR

ROME, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Lieut. Gen. Lucian K. Truscot, Jr., presented Presidential and Distinguished Unit Citations to two American-Japanese battalions at Leghorn yesterday, and declared the combat record of the Nisei 442nd Infantry Regimental Combat Team was one which "any regiment in history would be proud to own."

The 2nd Battalion, now commanded by Maj. Robert A. Copel of Chillicothe, Ill., was cited for breaking through German defenses in the Vosges Mountains of Eastern France in October, 1944, and for spearheading the Fifth Army's spring offensive up the Ligurian coast of Italy.

The 3rd Battalion, now commanded by Maj. Ralph J. Graham of Baltimore, was cited for rescuing a "lost battalion" last fall in Alsace, France, after being trapped for a week in wooded hills. The Nisei in that operation lost three times the number of men they rescued.

Army, Patrol Seek Missing Civilian Flyer

Army planes and the State Patrol today searched for Pat Foley of The Dalles, Or., overdue since Monday on a flight to The Dalles from Kent.

Sergt. O. C. Furseth, acting head of the patrol in this area, said patrol cars had joined the search after receiving a request from the Civil Aeronautics Administration.

The missing man, Furseth said, was flying a CP-19 trainer, No. NC-49393, on a scheduled two-hour flight.

John Compton, Kent airport manager, said Foley took off about 7 o'clock Monday evening with enough fuel for a four-hour flight.

Red-Point Stretcher

Mexican Lamb Stew
1½ pounds lamb, shoulder or neck.
2 strips bacon, diced.
1 pinch marjoram.
1 teaspoon salt.
½ teaspoon pepper.
1 onion.
½ cup celery leaves.
2 cups boiling water.
2 tomatoes, chopped.
1 onion, chopped.
1 green pepper, chopped.
½ cup diced celery.
2 tablespoons milk.
1 egg yolk.
1 tablespoon chopped parsley.

Have lamb cut in serving pieces. Put into stew pan with seasonings, whole onion, celery leaves and water. Simmer gently for one hour, then add chopped onion, tomatoes, green pepper and celery. Simmer until meat is tender. When ready to serve, remove from heat, then stir in the egg yolk beaten lightly with the milk. Pour into serving dish. Sprinkle with parsley. Serve over steamed rice. Yields four servings.
